Jacob Asher Shot in Hand—Jacob Asher met a serious accident Monday at a store, 242 First street. A bullet, discharged while he was examining a revolver, lodged in his left hand. The bullet was removed.

Flax Convention is Planned—Within a short time, when all necessary data will have been collected, flax enthusiasts of the state will hold a public meeting in the convention hall of the Portland Commercial club in an

endeavor to stir interest in flax culture. The committee appointed at a recent meeting of persons interested in the growing of flax in Oregon, has taken up the work of getting data from government and state officers. "Within a few days," said Dr. E. A. Pierce, one of the committee men, "we will have a mass of facts about flax to spread before the public."

Confesses to Stealing Tools—Detectives Tichenor and Howell this morning arrested E. Hunsaker, tool thief, who on the night of January 7 stole three sets of tools from a house under construction at East Sixteenth and Bybee streets, belonging to W. D. McMillan. A. M. Johnson and E. Richmond. The man was arrested at Madison and Front street as he was coming out of a second hand store with a suit case in which two saws belonging to McMillan were carried. He confessed to the robbery.

Grand Jury Reports—Four true bills and two not true bills were returned yesterday evening by the grand jury in a partial report of their work during this term. The true bills are against John Doris and John Boto, burglary from a car on the A. & C. railway; Ira L. Felps and Alice Dalrymple, statutory offense; Joseph Fryer, forger; and Frank Stone and Marion Turner, holdup. The not true bills were against Bessie Henry, accused of taking \$10 from Michael Pappas, and Walter Bromhall, accused of taking one dozen eggs.

Professor Foster was the principal speaker. About 60 persons were present. General Thomas M. Anderson and Dr. D. L. Kiehle, both of the University of Minnesota, were guests, each making a speech.
