


Archbishop Christie Consecrates New St. Francis Edifice on E. Pine St.

Archbishop Christie, in the presence of 2000 persons, yesterday morning consecrated the new St. Francis church on East Pine street, between East Eleventh and East Twelfth streets. He was assisted by Rev. Abbot Placidus, of Mount Angel, who celebrated the pontifical high mass, Rev. J. H. Black, the pastor; Bishop Gloricux of Idaho, Rev. J. J. Conway, assistant rector, who was master of ceremonies, Rev. Father Joseph Gallagher, president of Columbia University; Brother Andrew, president of Christian Brothers College; Rev Father Rauw, vicar general and a large number of other Catholic clergymen.

The services commenced at 10:30 o'clock and after the blessing of the church, the large assemblage quickly filled the auditorium. The auditorium and altar were ablaze with many lights. Rev. Father Black in addressing the congregation spoke of the past loyalty of the parishioners and urged them to make to, as risque. 


