

AUTOISTS TO BE IN THEIR GLORY ALL THIS WEEK

Three Big Events, Including
The Journal's Reliability
Run, and the Shows at Gar-
ages, Will Draw Thousands.

Three big events are keeping the members of the automobile fraternity on edge this week. The Journal Reliability run on Saturday, the opening of the automobile show on Saturday night and the Portland Automobile club banquet at the Commercial club Friday night are the events on which plans are being perfected today.

The Journal Reliability run for commercial trucks promises to be the largest event of its kind ever held on the Pacific coast. Over 10 cars are signed and will be ready for the starter's gun Saturday morning.

Merchants of the city are contemplating getting up parties and following the big trucks Saturday morning for the purpose of determining how the different cars behave under all conditions and it is safe to say that should the run be successful a large number of sales will result. Many prospective purchasers of cars are delaying, waiting for the result of the Journal's run and these men will no doubt comprise several of the sight seeing parties.

Test Is Severe.
The automobile men themselves look on the run with all seriousness. Weather conditions tend to make the run extremely difficult. Nine inches of snow fell in the vicinity of Troutdale and Gresham during the recent snow storm. The roads have been made very soft as a result. Loaded to their capacity the trucks will find the feat a maximum test for the cars. It is doubtful if more trying conditions could have been secured for the big run.

Decorators were at work in many of the garages yesterday preparing for the automobile show which opens Saturday evening. Cars have been hurried into the city from distant factories and visitors to the many garages will be treated to the most complete exhibits obtainable.

In decorating their garages the dealers are going to considerable expense and there is also much rivalry. It is the plan of the dealers to make the garages and exhibits so inviting as to make it worth the while of every man, woman and child to visit them. Owing to lack of space in the Armory the regular automobile show could not be held there this year and this plan has been adopted in its stead.

Transportation Service.
In order to make it possible for visitors to see all the exhibits in one evening the dealers will provide a regular automobile service between the garages. Cars will leave the different stations every two minutes or oftener if necessary.

At the Commercial club Friday evening the Portland Automobile association will inaugurate what is proposed to be an annual event—the club high jinks and banquet. Rollicking music, good singers, entertaining talkers with a number of vaudeville specialists will go to make the evening an enjoyable one for the banqueters. The Commercial club kitchen staff has promised to do its part as best it knows how and altogether a very successful banquet should be the result.

At this meeting the members of the club are planning on securing at least 25 new members. Each member is asked to bring as many of his friends as he may see fit and it is believed by this plan the club efforts will be rewarded and many new members added to the roll.

NEW POWER COMPANY MAY CONSTRUCT ROAD

Hood River, Or., Jan. 18.—The light and water plant at Hood River has changed hands once more and is now owned by the Pacific Coast Light & Power company, and it is generally understood here that this means that the General Electric company has control of the property. It is understood that if the city votes to take over the water plant that work on the electric line through the Hood River valley will be begun in the spring. It is also rumored that the new company will develop electric power from Hood River for the mission to Portland. Hood River has a 10,000 horsepower possibility per mile, according to engineers.

2 BOARDS WORK ON THE DELAWARE

But With Little Hope That the
Cause of Explosion Can
Ever Be Ascertained.

Washington, Jan. 18.—Although there is little hope that the real cause of the boiler explosion that killed eight men on the battleship Delaware yesterday will ever be definitely ascertained, the navy department today began to organize a special board of inquiry to investigate the disaster. It will probably consist of engineers from the Norfolk navy yard and from the battleships Delaware, South Carolina and Michigan.

In the effort to fix responsibility for the accident, Captain Gove of the Delaware has already appointed a board of inquiry on his ship, but the officers are freely quoted as saying that, so far, no cause for the explosion has been ascertained.

As the Delaware had 12 boilers, there is no belief that the disaster will interfere with her detail to take the body of Minister Cruise, back to Chile. Unless the navy department countermands former orders, the Delaware, with the body aboard, will start for Valparaiso January 31.

CONSECRATION OF BISHOP OF ARIZONA

Boston, Jan. 18.—With imposing ceremonies in Trinity church today, the Rev. Julius Walter Atwood, D. D., of Phoenix, was consecrated missionary bishop of Arizona, under the terms of his recent election by the general convention of the Episcopal church at Cincinnati. Bishop-elect Atwood was attended in the solemn procession by Rev. Dr. William D. Mason of Detroit, Mich., and the Rev. Dr. Henry B. Nash, of the faculty of the Cambridge Theological school.

Bishop Lawrence of Massachusetts officiated at the consecration, assisted by Bishop Hall of Vermont and Bishop Condit of Virginia. Bishop Atwood's presenters were Bishop Codman of Maine and Bishop Lines of New Jersey. The consecration sermon was preached by Bishop Greer of New York.

The new bishop is a graduate of the Cambridge Theological school in the class of 1882, and was ordained to the diaconate that year by Bishop Paddock and advanced to the priesthood the following year. He was rector of a church in Ipswich, Mass., from 1882 to 1887, when he received a call to St. James' church, Providence, where he continued to officiate until 1894. During the succeeding three years he was rector of Trinity church, Columbus, Ohio. Then, owing to the illness of his wife, Dr. Atwood went to Arizona and was associated with Trinity church at Phoenix until appointed archdeacon of Arizona. During the early years of his residence in Arizona the new bishop founded a tuberculosis hospital which has been doing a splendid work in the treatment of patients afflicted with tubercular trouble.

Bishop Atwood was an intimate friend of the poet Whittier and has written several books on his life and work of the famous poet.

TWENTIETH SESSION OF TUSKEGEE CONFERENCE

Tuskegee, Ala., Jan. 18.—The twentieth annual session of the Tuskegee Negro conference opened at Tuskegee institute today with a large and representative attendance. The feature of the program was a symposium on the subject of the negro as a farmer. The question of making tenant farming more profitable both to the landlord and to the tenant was discussed at length. Attention was paid also to the methods for making truck farming, cotton raising, fruit raising and livestock and poultry breeding profitable to the negro farmer. Booker T. Washington in his opening address said the value of the discussions lay in the good the delegates got from them to carry home.

Tomorrow the annual Workers' conference will be held at the institute. Indications point to an unusually large attendance of persons directly engaged in negro education and interested in the uplift of the colored race.

COLD STORAGE STUFF LIMITED BY THIS BILL

Sacramento, Jan. 18.—Eggs that were laid in the days of the Pharaohs cannot longer be placed on the California markets as "strictly fresh" if the senate decides to adopt a recommendation in a report on the high cost of living, made today. The committee recommended a time limit of 60 or 90 days, after which neither cold storage eggs, butter nor any foodstuffs should be marketable. The report was placed on file the bills in accordance with its suggestions will probably be introduced soon.

Monaco Constitution Rejected.

Paris, Jan. 18.—Prince Albert's plan for a constitutional government of the principality of Monaco, in which Monte Carlo is situated, presented to the French constitutional council engaged in trying to regulate the affairs of the little country, was today rejected as unfit. A committee was appointed to urge that another draft of a constitution be submitted by the prince.

TWO MEN SHOT, 1 BEATEN IN ROW

Quarrel Over Postoffice Box
Results in Battle; None
Fatally Injured.

Wallowa, Or., Jan. 18.—Three men laid up, two with bullet wounds in the face and one badly beaten about the head, is the result of a quarrel over a postoffice box in the town of Lostine. The injured men are W. W. Winnings, A. Willette and J. Nolan.

The trouble arose over a dispute between Winnings and the postmaster at Lostine. A Willette is a son-in-law of the postmaster and he took up the postmaster's side of the argument and it is said, struck Winnings, whereupon Winnings pulled a gun and shot his antagonist twice in the face. Young Willette's father then struck Winnings on the head with a crowbar. J. L. Nolan, a bystander, attempted to separate the men, when Winnings' gun was accidentally discharged and a bullet grazed the man's cheek. None of the injuries will result fatally.

DESPONDENT MAN LEAPS FROM CLIFF EDGE; DEAD

San Francisco, Jan. 18.—Working on a clue supplied by an unsigned note found in his pocket, the police are endeavoring to identify a man who late yesterday jumped from the edge of a 200 foot cliff on Telegraph hill and was killed.

All marks of identification had been removed from the man's clothing. With a stone for a table, just before he jumped, he wrote:

"Judging by the distance I am going to travel, this attempt should be a complete success. I leave here to go to the devil. Best wishes to a few of you."

BONES OF OLD MONSTER DUG UP IN RIVER BED

Stockton, Cal., Jan. 18.—The discovery of portions of the skeleton of a prehistoric beast, lifted from the bed of the San Joaquin river by the bucket of a dredger, prompted a search for the remaining parts of the skeleton. Today the dredge will cut the bed of the stream deeper. C. H. Brandt, who found the bones, will send them to the University of California. The bones are now on exhibition here.

Alabama Bankers Meet.

Montgomery, Ala., Jan. 18.—A discussion of the "bank code" bill to be presented at the state legislature now in session was the principal feature of the annual convention of the Alabama Bankers' association at its initial session this afternoon. President W. L. Lancaster presided over the gathering and one of the notable speakers was Clark Williams, comptroller of the state of New York. The convention will conclude tomorrow with the election of officers for the year.

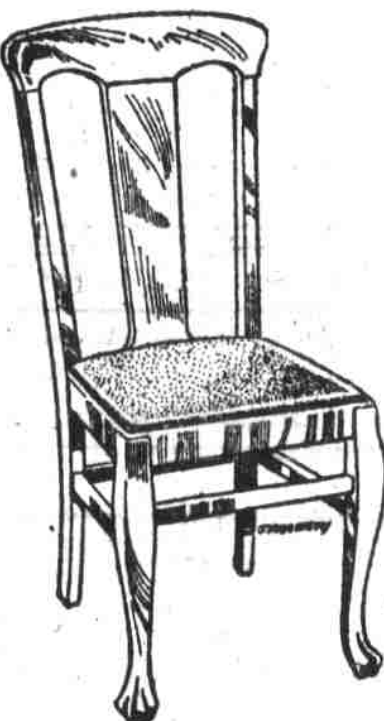
