CHURCH SUBMITS

Naval Measure Provides for Longer Term of Enlistment Than Abrams Bill.

Balem, Or., Jan. 19 .- Representative Church of Union introduced a bill in the house yesterday afternoon for the establishment of a naval militia which he believes is superior to the bill introduced by Representative Abrams of Marion in the house and by Senator Joseph of Multnomah. He will endeavor point out the superiorities of his bill when the two measures come before the committee on military affairs, of which Representative Abrams is chair-

One improvement offered by Representative Church's bill, according to him and Harbormaster Speier of Port-land, who recommends the passage of the Church bill over that of Representative Abrams and Senator Joseph's bill is that it allows the enlisted men the same pay as that allowed to enlisted men in the national guard instead of the regular pay allowed to enlisted men in the United States navy. It makes the term of enlistment three years to conform with the regular term of en-listment in the state militia, while Representative Abrams' bill provided for a shorter term of enlistment, two years. House bill No. 20, or the Abrams bill,

provides for the services of civilians manning the training ship, while Representative Church's bill provides that the training ship shall be manned only by members of the naval militia in order to give them opportunity to receive training in every department of the service. The Church bill also allows for future legislation of the congress, for at present no national law exists placing the naval militia on the same basis with reference to the navy department as the national guard enjoys with reference to the war depart-

Senator Albee introduced a measure in the senate yesterday afternoon cor-responding to the Church bill introduced

Mr. Church and Mr. Albee believe their bills are further superior in the respect that they tend to keep the rank of officers down to a point consistent with the regulations governing the United States navy. Five members are be made members of the governing board instead of four, and they are to be given the commissioned staff rank lieutenant commanders, preventing their assuming command of the naval forces of the state. The secretary of the board must also be an officer of the line, according to the Church bill, one who is acquainted with the work of the organization. The officers of organization will also be placed under bonds if Church's bill is enacted, so that the property of the state and government will be fully protected. Church's bill carries no clause, as does the Abrams bill.

Real Hours, No Work No Pay, Are Novel Rules for Clerks and Stenos.

Salem, Or., Jan. 19.—For the first time in the Oregon legislature definite have been adopted governing clerks and stenographers employed in the house. The rules committee reported yesterday recommending that each group of three representatives shall have one stenographer and one

Clerks are required to report daily at 8 o'clock, remain on duly until 10:30, report again at 12:39 and to work until They will finish their work between 4 and 6 p. m. Stenographers will work from 9 to 11, from 1 to 4 and from 7 Employes absent during these hours are not to receive pay and they cannot remain away without permission of the chief clerk, and then only on militia. furnishing a reasonable excuse. Complaint by two representatives shall constitute grounds for discharge. The report was adopted.

The proposed measure gave opportunity for much oratory, in which Columbus and his daring and accomplishments were

Gill of Hood River and McKinney of Baker were the principal opponents of the bill, declaring there were already enough holidays. McKinney asserted there were plenty of Oregon heroes to honor who should receive consideration first from this state, and that if Columbus was to be honored, it should come from congress and a national hol-

The bill received 28 votes, with three Multnomah men who favored it tempo-rarily absent. Clyde changed his vote to no so as to be able to secure recon-sideration and the holiday may yet be

STATE GRANGE TO

Legislators and Grange Members Get Together to Frame More Satisfactory Bills.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., Jan. 19.—The state grange is lining up against some of the good road bills already introduced into the house, or to be presented. The ultimate outcome is expected to be the presentation of bills which meet with the favor of the grangers.

An unheralded meeting of a number of officers and members of the grange and ten legislators was held Tuesday night in the state house. The Pacific highway was criticised, it being declared that it was being promoted chiefly by Portland automobile owners and would become dangerous to the farmers because of use by joyriders.

"WHITE SLAVE" BILL PASSED BY HOUSE

Libby's Measure Providing Heavy Penalty for Violator; Alaska Territorial Plan.

Salem, Or., Jan. 19 .- Libby's bill, designed to abolish the raffic in Oregon and providing for severe punishment for violation of the provision, was favorably reported by the committee and the report adopted by the house.

The act is broad in its effect, deeming as guilty any person who furnishes transportation or assists in any other way in enticing a girl or woman into a esort. If the victim is under 18 a fine of not more than \$10,000 or imprisonment in excess of 10 years, or both, is provided and if the victim is over 18 a maximum of \$5000 fine or imprison-
