Weather Conditions.

The western disturbance is central this morning over Minnesota and the barometer is rising rapidly over the North Pacific states. During the last 24 hours moderately heavy rain has fallen in southeastern Washington, southern Idaho and northern California. A heavy fall of snow has occurred in the Sierran mountains, and a slight fall of rain is reported in the Willamette valley and western Washington. It is much colder in southern and eastern Oregon, eastern Washington, Idaho and western Montana, and decidedly warmer in the Mississippi valley.

Conditions are favorable for fair weather in this district Saturday, except in northwestern Washington where light rain will continue. It will be colder tonight east of the Cascade mountains.

Pasco May Have Water System.

(Special Dispatch to the Journal.) Pasco, Wash., Jan. 20.—After a session lasting until 1 o'clock Tuesday morning the city council passed ordinance No. 118, which provides that the matter of purchasing a 600-acre water right from the Pasco Reclamation company for domestic and irrigation uses by the city, shall be submitted to a vote of the people at a special election on February 27, 1911. The contract calls for the payment of \$50,000 for this 600-acre right and an annual maintenance fee of 25 cents per acre inch, or \$1.10 for the full 24 inches.

DAIRY AND FOOD BILL NOW READY

Measure Would Abolish Office of Bailey and Let Health Body Rule.

The bill to abolish the office of state dairy and food commissioner, placing the enforcement of Oregon's health laws all under the state board of health, was sent yesterday to Senator Dan J. Maloney for introduction before the legislature, by the organizations that are interested in its passage. The bill was accompanied by letters urging its adoption. Nearly a dozen Portland and Oregon organizations approve the consolidation of the two offices and have not only passed resolutions to this effect but were instrumental in the drafting of the measure.

At the request of Mrs. Sarah A. Evans, president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, the head of each woman's club in Oregon will write letters to the legislators pleading for the removal of health law enforcement from politics or the influence of politically chosen officials.

It is stated that political enforcement of health laws in Oregon has taken toll from the lives and health of the people. The decreased list of deaths of babies

less than 2 years old in Portland, as the result of an agitation for a pure milk supply which was commenced a little more than a year ago, is submitted as evidence that only officials who can qualify for their positions by reason of character and training should be given the obligation for protecting public health. The list of deaths of babies in Portland during last summer is less than one third as heavy as it was the year before.

By a resolution adopted at its biennial meeting the state board of health, whose members are physicians serving with pay, adopted a resolution approving the consolidation of the two offices and expressing readiness to undertake the enforcement of all health laws in Oregon if it should be so decided by the legislature.

PUPIL, SCOLDED, BEATS YOUNG LADY TEACHER

John Podesta, a 14-year-old pupil in the Shattuck school, is having a hard time today explaining to the juvenile court, superintendent of schools, members of the school board and Professor Draper, principal of the school, why he made an attack yesterday upon a young

woman teacher in the school. Young Podesta is in the sixth grade, and was reprimanded by the teacher yesterday morning. He struck her several times in the face and the matter was reported to the principal. The boy was suspended. He appeared this morning before Probation Officer Teuscher and asked permission to go to another school. The matter was taken up with Professor Draper and the recommendation was made that he be not allowed to change. Mr. Teuscher advised the boy to go to the principal and other school officials and apologize. The boy said he would do so and is making the rounds this afternoon of the various persons to whom he is appealing to be reinstated.
