Weather Conditions.

A storm of marked energy is moving down the St. Lawrence valley and another disturbance of only moderate energy is central north of Montana. A high pressure area is central over the upper Mississippi valley and the barometer is rising very rapidly over the lake region. During the last 24 hours light rain has fallen on the Pacific slope as far south as Fresno, Cal., and general rains, which later turned to snow, have occurred in the lake region. Rain has also fallen along the Atlantic coast from Eastport, Maine, to Cape Hatteras. It is much colder in the upper Mississippi valley and the lake region and correspondingly warmer in the Canadian northwest and in the Atlantic states from Maine south to the Carolinas.

Indications are favorable for rain or snow in this district tonight and Tuesday. It will be cooler in southeastern Idaho tonight or Tuesday.

Portland and vicinity.—Occasional rain tonight and Tuesday; southerly winds.

Oregon and Washington.—Occasional rain or snow tonight and Tuesday; south to west winds.

Idaho.—Occasional rain or snow tonight and Tuesday; colder southeast portion.

Death Soon Follows Golden Wedding.—Mrs. Johanna Weddeler died January 12, after a short illness at the old homestead farm near Boring, aged 71 years. She was born in Germany and came to the United States in 1881 with her husband Christof and son Christian and settled at Boring where they have made their home ever since. They celebrated their golden wedding last year in February. Mrs. Weddeler was a member of the Evangelical Lutheran church of Graham. The funeral was held January 14, under the auspices of that church. Rev. Mr. Fraund, pastor of the church officiating. Interment was at the cemetery at Damascus.

Interpretation of Thomas Paine.—Declaring that Thomas Paine did not attack religion itself, but the impostures surrounding it, Dr. C. H. Chapman gave a comprehensive review of his life last night at Portland Social Turn Verein hall, the occasion being the one hundred and twenty-seventh anniversary of Paine's birth. Other speakers were Rev. James P. Kirby of the Universalist church of Graham, T. D. Turner, F. Niklas and Roscoe C. Nelson. Vocal and orchestral music was furnished and a patriotic tableau closed the program.

Disguised Detective Finds "Fig."—When Sergeant Riley assumed the role of Hawshaw yesterday by disguising himself as a teamster and with a terrier walking into the rooming house conducted by Mary Mason at 274 Second street, he was assured that he could get all kinds of liquor and to prove it the woman displayed about 100 pints of whiskey in her sideboard. As a result she was arrested on running a "blind pig" and the whiskey was taken to the station this morning. The woman's case was continued.

Dedication of Hotel.—The dedication of the Salvation Army's new hotel, located at 210 First street, will take place tomorrow at 3 o'clock. Brigadier Emil Marcussen, from San Francisco, the secretary for the Salvation Army social operations west of the Rocky mountains, will officially dedicate the building. Rev. Dr. Poulsen of the First Presbyterian church will preside. Surgeon Captain Bradley gives the public a hearty invitation to the dedication service as well as to inspect this new venture.

SERVICES ARE HELD FOR SAMUEL RANSOM

The funeral of Samuel Ransom, who died Saturday night, was held this afternoon at 2 o'clock from his late residence, Twenty-third and Quincy streets, and a large number of his friends gathered to pay their last respects. The body was cremated.

The services were conducted by Rev. William G. Elliot Jr., pastor emeritus of the First Presbyterian Church of Our Father. The choir of that church sang. The pallbearers were: Captain A. L. Pease, J. W. Fowler, H. T. Humphrey, A. C. Jackson, W. D. Collins and Mr. Stevenson.

Samuel Ransom was born at Brighton, England, in 1838. He came to the United States 50 years ago, and for 45 years was engaged in the manufacturing of doors and sashes at San Francisco. After the San Francisco disaster, he came to Portland, where he had since made his home. Up to the time he was taken ill he was employed with W. P. Fuller & Co.

He is survived by Frank R. Ransom, manager and treasurer of the Eastern Western Lumber company, William P. Ransom of Oakland, sons, and Mrs. H. E. Pennell of Berkeley, and the Misses Edith and Mabel Ransom of Portland.

FALLS TO DEATH OFF BALLAST DOCK

Another life paid toll to the Linnton ballast dock this morning when Captain Louis Fraud, an ordinary seaman on the French bark Bossuet, died at 4:30 o'clock a. m. today as the result of a fall from the dock last night. Fraud was a native of Nantes and was 22 years of age.

According to Captain Letroquer, master of the bark, Fraud had just finished dinner and was going ashore. As he passed the end of the dock in the darkness he fell at about the same spot where Chief Mate De Harde of the German ship Elfrida fell and was killed or drowned last week. He fell a distance of about 12 feet to a landing for small boats and from there into the water. Fraud was badly injured about the back, on his right shoulder and on his right leg. He managed to grasp a rope hanging over the end of the dock with his left hand and hung on until one of his shipmates climbed down the rope to his assistance. The sailor held Fraud above the water until a boat could be put out from the Bossuet. The injured sailor was taken to the cabin of the bark and placed in a berth and the nearest doctor called. The coroner was notified this morning and the body of the sailor will be brought up here for burial.

This is the second death within a week at the same place. Chief Mate De Harde fell falling from the dock last Tuesday night on his return to his ship Elfrida.

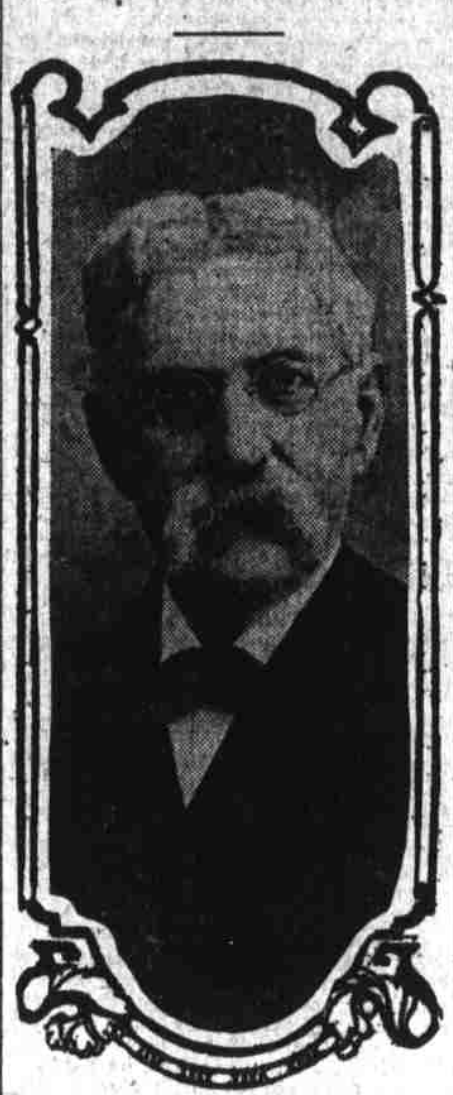

JOSEPH MEYERS IS DEAD, AGED 75

Widow, Formerly Mrs. Zenaide DuRette, and Six Sons Survive Pioneer.

Joseph Meyers, 75 years of age and for more than 50 years a resident of Oregon, died at his residence, 1034 Williams avenue, Saturday night. The immediate cause of the aged pioneer's death was cerebral hemorrhage, although he had been in bad health for more than a year.

Mr. Meyers was born in Germany in 1836 and came to this country when 17 years old. He first settled in California where he engaged in the mercantile business. He was married in California in the late 50's and six sons were born, all of whom are living. In 1860 he came to Portland and engaged in the cigar business at Front and Morrison streets, where the St. Charles hotel now stands. After remaining in business in this city for 20 years, he moved to Salem and established the Meyers Mercantile company, which is now known as Joseph Meyers & Sons. This business has grown to be one of the largest business enterprises in Oregon.

While nothing was ever given out by the family or the express company concerning the reported loss of the property it is believed that it was recovered.

Mr. Meyers was a Mason and a member of the A. O. U. W. The funeral, which will take place from the family residence at 12:15 o'clock tomorrow afternoon, will be in charge of the Masons. Following the services at the residence, the body will be conveyed to the Portland crematorium for the last rites.

BAD AUSTRIAN WOULD NOT VACATE PROPERTY

Bend, Or., Jan. 30.—Dan Madah, an Austrian who has been conducting a mess and bunk house here, was placed in jail with a charge of assault with a dangerous weapon hanging over him.

The trouble grew out of an attempt to execute an attachment by the deputy sheriff, Ray Wilkinson, when Madah refused to deliver over the property. Wilkinson giving him till 4 o'clock to vacate, and when he went back with three other special deputies to execute the attachment, Madah with a knife in his hand refused to turn over the property, and showed signs of fight. North Carolina fruit dealers have written to the Portland Chamber of Commerce asking to be placed in touch with dealers in apples. They say they have heard of a great deal about the excellent apples grown in Oregon and believe they would find a ready market for them over there.

"We want apples good in color and of uniform size and apples that will keep," says the letter, "and believe that you can fill this bill."

It further states that New York state Baldwin apples cost in carload lots delivered in North Carolina from \$4.50 to \$4.75 per box, but these apples are not very good in color and the quality is quite indifferent.

The chamber has also received a letter from a hotel man in Paris who plans coming to Oregon to engage in business. He asks for information along that line.

A prominent London shipping firm seeks information about the cost of piloting, loading and discharging of cargoes on the Columbia river.

The chamber and the Portland Commercial club receives hundreds of pieces of literature on Oregon are sent out by these two organizations every day.

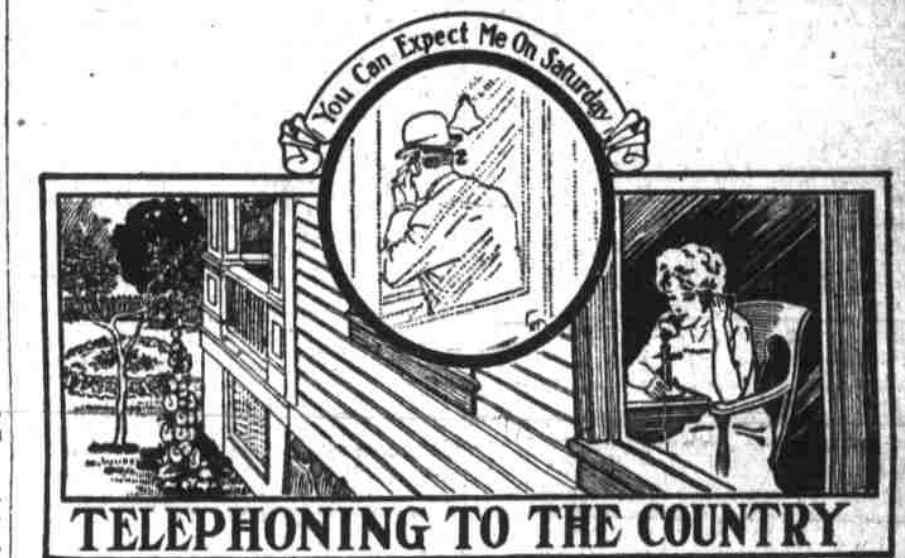

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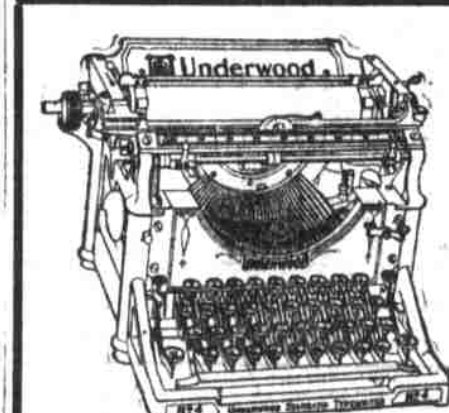
TELEPHONING TO THE COUNTRY
