

MAY WIDEN SCOPE OF LIABILITY BILL

Senator Joseph Would Make
the Defense Harder in Dam-
age Suits.

Salem, Or., Jan. 31.—A wide extension of the liability of the employer by removing the protection of the rule of contributory negligence in all cases, is proposed in a bill introduced by Senator Joseph of Multnomah.

As the law recently enacted by the people stands, it removes this defense as between the employer and employee for all purposes except in mitigation of damages and except in certain specified cases. The Joseph bill goes much further by making the defense unavailable to the employer as between employer and the public. It allows evidence to be introduced as to contributory negligence in mitigation of damages only, and not in any case as a matter of defense.

The law recently passed, for instance, would make a streetcar company liable to a motorman, notwithstanding contributory negligence on his part, but would not make it liable if a passenger negligently contributed to his own injury. The Joseph bill would relieve this defense and the company will become liable to the passenger or person crossing the street on the same basis as to the employee, regardless of the old doctrine of contributory negligence.

STEINER APPEALS FOR HIS CHARGES TO COMMITTEE

"For God's sake, gentlemen," he cried, "whatever you do to me, do not hammer those poor unfortunate out there. I have stood alone in this matter. No one has taken their place beside me and I tell you it is enough to make a man desperate and I have reached that stage. But if you make a criminal offense to exceed the appropriation when 1600 helpless ones are crying for assistance, it will be awful. Such legislation belongs to the dark ages."

Offers \$1500 to Charity.
As he finished Dr. Steiner drew \$1500 in bonds from his pocket and handed them to Senator Albion, chairman of the joint committee.

"If I have uttered a single untruth tonight," he explained, "I earnestly wish that you give this to the Y. M. C. A. of Portland, the Y. M. C. A. of Salem, the Salvation Army, or any charitable institution you may see fit."

Dr. Steiner brought with him a written statement and when he started to read it the attention of those in the committee room was at once seized and held in a tense grip until he had concluded. He was followed by State Treasurer Kay and R. B. Goodin, chief bookkeeper of the asylum, whose statements and figures combined with those of Dr. Steiner were intended to confute every charge made by Senator Joseph in his speech before the senate and those of the investigating committee.

Nottingham Makes Admission.
At one time Dr. Steiner turned from his statements to Senator Nottingham, member of the ways and means committee, and asked:

"You know and you will admit, will you not, that you told me that you thought the asylum should have an automobile?"

"I will admit I said after you had bought it that it might be a wise expenditure," said Senator Nottingham, after a pause.

"I do not wish to accept the responsibility of holding these bonds," declared Senator Albion as he handed them back. "There has been no question about your integrity, doctor, and Senator Bowerman paused twice in his speech in the senate to explain this. You will have a fair hearing from the senate and house on this subject, I know, and can see no reason why either house should object to it."

State Treasurer Kay followed Dr. Steiner and presented figures contradicting statements of Senator Bowerman and the investigating committee. He also asked for fair play on the appropriations.

Kay Makes Statement.
"It will be the policy of the board of control to conduct all institutions without a deficit in the next two years," he stated. "But if you tie our hands after cutting down the estimates and unforeseen circumstances arise and you make it a misdemeanor for us to exceed appropriations, we shall refuse to accept the insane turned over to us by the judges. We could not accept them, for there is no more room at the asylum and if these people are uncared for it will not be our fault. We are only the agents of the people."

Kay spoke of the refusal of the ways and means committee of the last session to authorize an appropriation to furnish the new receiving ward which had been completed. He asserted that it had been necessary to place beds in the corridors of the old receiving ward and that two or three beds were placed in every one of the small rooms.

Shows Bowerman in Error.
On the charge that the asylum had turned over patients to the school for feeble minded, he declared the law had been followed in every respect. Inasmuch as it permits that imbeciles, idiots and feeble minded can be sent to the institution. He declared they could not be returned to the asylum, because it had reached its capacity.

He also produced figures showing that the Oregon asylum cost less per capita to maintain than any other institution of its kind, except the Georgia asylum, where most of the patients were colored. He produced a statement from the architect, showing that where Senator Bowerman had charged that \$12,000 had been spent for marble in the new receiving ward, only \$1600 had been expended. Figures were also produced to refute the charge that it cost \$1.50 for every dollar's worth of pro-

duce raised on the farm. Instead these figures as given in detail to the committee indicated a profit of more than \$38,000, including the interest on the estimated value of the land.

Dr. Steiner's statement in full was as follows:

"Your part of legislation in this legislative session is purely one of business administration, and out of respect to you and your valuable time I shall confine my remarks to the least time possible. I shall refrain from any personalities excepting those which apply to business in connection with the purpose for which you have summoned me. I want it understood now that the truth, and nothing but the truth, will be said by me; I shall, also, demand the same from any man speaking in reference to asylum affairs.

Nearly what is all this agitation about? Purely a political effort to embarrass the incoming board, Governor West, Tom Kay and Governor Benson (that prince of men, who is still sick, but improving, and unable to protect himself), in carrying out their trust for the people of Oregon. I request of you in that spirit of American fairness and justice that you listen to me that all sides of the case may be heard before judgment is passed. I have tried to get a hearing before this legislative body that the truth might be stated, but up until this time have had no possible way of being heard.

May Be Honest in Belief.
"Senator Bowerman is a man whose honesty in commercial affairs I think no man would dare to attack, but who can play the game of politics stronger and harder, even against his friends, than any man in Oregon. After his impassioned remarks, lawyer of ability as he is, had I been guilty of a penal offense I would have been convicted in that senate and with the people in the lobby within a minute's time. I will not even invent his motives. He may have been honest in his belief, but I will show at this time and give you figures and facts in refutation of his statements and to the satisfaction, I believe, of all the people of Oregon, and show that he, at least, has been mistaken.

"His statistics and remarks were largely based upon the investigating committee which is at this session on the subject of the Oregon asylum. No. 25: 'Be it resolved by the senate, the house concurring, that the president of the senate be, and he is, hereby authorized and directed to appoint three hold over senators, who in turn shall select between November 15, 1908 and November 30 of that year, three duly elected representatives; and the six thus appointed shall convene at Salem, not later than the 20th day of December, 1910; at which time the superintendent of the various institutions, president of the board of regents of the several schools and state board of agriculture, for maintenance of which state money is asked, shall prepare and submit to said committee their estimate for maintenance, new buildings and betterment for the biennial period ending December 31, 1912; and, thereupon, said committee shall visit and carefully examine into the needs of said institutions in and near Salem and prepare and submit to the legislative assembly, on or before January 20, 1911, a report showing the cost of such constructions, improvements, repairs and changes that they shall have determined and agreed upon as being necessary and required by said institutions and schools for the two years then next ensuing.' Filed in the office of the secretary of state, February 23, 1909.

Investigation Is Hurdled.
"Now, then, what did this committee do, and how thorough is their capacity to pass judgment on matters which they so hurriedly went over, to recommend to this ways and means committee, or, even to vote intelligently on these matters at issue.

"On the 27th day of December I drew Governor Bowerman's attention and Senator Nottingham's to the fact that their committee had not notified the various schools and institutions to appear and that the matter had been overlooked and there would be the same old jumble and inattention to business at the legislature. A part of this committee appeared a few days before the session and hurriedly went over the institutions in and near Salem and prepare and submit to the legislative assembly, on or before January 20, 1911, a report showing the cost of such constructions, improvements, repairs and changes that they shall have determined and agreed upon as being necessary and required by said institutions and schools for the two years then next ensuing.' Filed in the office of the secretary of state, February 23, 1909.

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tutions at Salem. They spent a part of a day at the main building and one of the members insisted on going to the farm and going through that on the same afternoon that he might get back to Portland, where the political pot was boiling.

"Dr. Wood insisted that it would be too late and that they take another day to go to the farm, upon which they agreed and left and asked me to meet them at the Hotel Marion the next morning with the big red automobile, which has, also, been an item of their report. We went out to the farm and, in the short length of time which we had, covered what we could. But one of the members after luncheon insisted that he had to catch the 3 o'clock car to get back to Portland, and, instead of going thoroughly over the farm, or through a single ward in the whole institution, I returned them to the city for their car.

False Report Spread.
"In a demagogic report and speech, in which they have appealed to what they have made me appear as a spendthrift of the people's money and I present these facts for the best interests of Oregon and hope that they will think it out.

"The laboring people and farmers evidently had their judgment formed at the last election as to whom they wished to direct their state affairs.

"I am glad, indeed, Chairman Albion and members of this committee, that you have abolished the trust chamber system of committee meetings and have given us the chance to meet you in the open and talk things over, and what is said and done to be a matter of public record.

Purchase of Automobile.
"Now, as to the special investigating committee's report in reference to asylum matters: Considerable stress is laid upon the fact that I asked the last session ways and means committee for an automobile. I did this at the request of the board. It was refused in the special appropriation. After several months the matter was discussed by the board and myself that it would be a business proposition to purchase an automobile, as there was much construction going on at the farm and main building and that it would be a very proper item of expense compared with the results to be obtained.

"The vouchers for the same speak for themselves. They are correct or I would not have signed them; but, I defy any man in Oregon to state that I ever rode for personal pleasure a mile on the state's gasoline. Senator Bowerman knows that when he had me called from the hospital to take him to McMinnville during the campaign that I drove the car to the garage, had it filled and paid for it out of my own pocket. Mr. Beale, on the floor of this house, will tell you that he saw me pay a merchant at Tillamook out of my own cash for a trip.

"I instructed Mr. Strang, our chief engineer, and Armine, who have charge of the gasoline at the hospital, to be certain that I never consumed any of the state's gasoline. I admit that a part of the wear and tear may be due to some of these trips which I have mentioned, which is a trivial matter. But who in the legislature will stand up and state that this car has not been used for conveying patients from adjacent counties, taking patients hurriedly to trains and traveling agents who must travel, and properly so, to bring in committed patients, the steward and bookkeeper out making necessary purchases for wood, supplies, etc. cetera.

Quick Service Demanded.
"I maintain that this is a very proper investment and can show it to any fair minded man. This is not an ox team age and people demand service which only telephones, automobiles, electric utilities, etc., supply. But, before purchasing this, I consulted with the senators on this holdover committee. Dr. Wood told me that he thought it was all right and proper; he also told R. B. Goodin, who is present at this time, the same thing. Senator Nottingham told me that it was all right. Governor Bowerman has told me that, in his opinion, it was proper that the hospital should have this automobile. Who questions it on the basis of business?"

"Now, as to the furnishing of the cottages: Early in the year I instructed my wife, as well as the wife of Dr. Griffith (a man who has grown old in 20 years' service of the state, to the value of which thousands of people in Oregon will attest) that they would be limited to \$1200 for furnishing their cottages, an amount which no one can criticize who has furnished a house in the last year or two. They selected the things which they chose fit to satisfy our demands.

Economy of Good Carpets.
"The Wilton rug of \$155, which was so dwelt upon, is a big carpet running through two rooms and is not an extravagant article, but, in the long run, economical. The property is there and the people, I assure you, have had a good run for their money. In the list were some champagne glasses for Dr. Griffith's cottage, which were referred to in a speech, leaving the innuendo that we were riotously living on the fat of the land.

"In all of Oregon where is there a person who will state that a bottle of champagne was ever opened in my house? If the doctor chose to on some occasion, it was his own concern, if at his own expense. In fact, these were used only for sherry.

"Dr. Tamieste, another estimable member of the staff, was living in rather a neglected house and was permitted to expend \$232.70, which is, also, charged up to Steiner. I have no excuse to offer for this; it is very proper that men of worth serving the state should be paid commensurate with their services; if not, such men as Dr. W. T. Williamson and J. F. Calbreath and men of their stripe, will not long stay

to take care of these poor God-abandoned creatures.

Spent Money Honestly.
"I refer you to page 523 of the general laws of Oregon, 1909, where you have included, item after item, in lump amounts, without designating any special amount for any one specific item. It might be that this could have been procured, but the law itself is what we followed. We went as far as we could with that money; spent it honestly and judiciously, combined with the judgment of some of the best minds of Oregon, in the interests of the taxpayers and, above all, the patients.

"Much stress has been laid on deficiency. On page 21 of my last biennial report we asked for \$502,500 and were cut down to \$490,000 by this same kind of snap judgment and were told that if there was a deficiency to bring in the bill. We are asking for 1736 patients, a per capita of \$14, which makes a total of \$583,296. If you want us to give these patients less to eat, less warmth, less clothing and less careful and tender nursing, less medical service, and so on, cut it down. But I will not stand for it. I have been until the last few days alone in fighting for the patients. Get a new man if you want him, but I stand for the principles of doing the most good for the least amount of money for these patients.

"These are a part of the things I have wanted to tell the legislature about.

Ready for Investigation.
"I am willing to do everything practical for the patients and ask your operation to bring about the best results. Send out, if you wish, an investigating committee, that is what we court; but send out one on the square and who have time to really investigate and come with constructive and not obstructive criticism.

"To convince you of my sincerity of purpose, I herewith hand you \$1500 in trust to give to the Y. M. C. A. of Portland and Salem, if I have said an untruth, or if a penny can be shown against my integrity."

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CALIFORNIA SENATE PASSES RACE BILL

Sacramento, Jan. 31.—Without a word of debate the Walker-Young anti-race track bill passed the assembly yesterday afternoon by a vote of 58 to 5. Assemblyman Young allowed his measure to die on the file and the assembly passed the companion bill by Senator Walker, which stops racing in California 15 days after the measure is signed by the governor.

This bill amends the Walker-Otislaw, passed last session, in such manner that oral betting will be prohibited. The

framers of the law say they feel confident that pool-gambling and all sorts of race track gambling will be forever abolished within the state.

The measure had already passed the senate.
