

BOARD OF HEALTH WILL QUIT UNLESS GIVEN MORE CASH

Members Say They Can't Protect Public Health With Only \$5000 a Year to Spend; No Salaries Paid.

Unless the legislature appropriates more cash for health protection, members of the state board of health say they will have to discontinue their services.

"This intention to resign, they say, is not in the nature of a threat, but is merely a means of impressing on the legislature the vital importance of their having \$15,000 a year instead of \$5000. 'We can't try to protect the health of Oregon people without more money,' says Dr. Andrew C. Smith, president of the board.

"During the past year we have combated epidemics, we have warned people about their modes of living, we have done a thousand things that money could not pay for and for which no money was expected. We have come to the turning point now; that's all. Unless the appropriation is made larger I shall resign the presidency of the board at once. I do not say it as a threat. If the legislature does not permit us to do the work properly, it will be impossible to do it at all. This is a more populous state than when the board of health was instituted."

Dr. E. A. Pierce, ex-president of the health board, is extremely anxious that the state board be given more money to fight consumption in Oregon. Teaching people how to ward off the disease by proper methods of living is a first fundamental, says Dr. Pierce. Dr. E. Barton Pickle, of Medford, Dr. C. J. Smith of Pendleton, Dr. W. B. Morse of Salem and Dr. Kinney of Astoria, together with the secretary and state health officer, Dr. Calvin S. White, have all joined in the petition to the legislature to increase the appropriation, saying that with the present appropriation of \$5000 the board has been handicapped and embarrassed at every turn, and that they will have to step down unless it is increased. The Oregon appropriation is perhaps the smallest for the purpose in the United States. All members of the health board, except the secretary, serve without pay.

The bill for an appropriation of \$15,000 for next year's work is now pending before the legislature. A terse printed statement of the situation was sent yesterday to each member of the legislature, setting forth the situation and detailing the ways in which the \$15,000 when appropriated, is to be spent.

MRS. CARBONNEAU NOT TO BE ARRESTED

UNKNOWN SHIP LOST ON GOODWIN SANDS

FOREST FIRE LAW WARMLY DEFENDED

Object of Proposed Measure Is to Give Greater Efficiency, Says E. T. Allen.

Any opposition to the forest fire law now before the legislature on the ground that it places the states' forest administration into new or impractical hands is, according to the bill's many advocates, based on some mistake as to its provisions. They point out that practically all that is asked is that the present fire board and fire laws be given means of efficiency.

"The section referring to the composition of the state board of forestry is merely a reenactment of the one which has been in existence four years," said E. T. Allen, forester of the Western Forestry and Conservation association, yesterday, "substituting a member of the state senate and a member of the Oregon Forest Fire association for the secretary of state and the fish and game warden."

Remains the Same.
"The other five members of the board will remain as they have always been and there has been no objection. The change of these two members is suggested to relieve two busy state officials of duties in which they are not necessarily interested and also because it seems fair to give the agricultural and fire fighting people a voice in work of this kind."

This plan of having the state forestry board contain representatives of the several agencies devoted to and understanding forest protection is the approved and modern one adopted by many states besides Oregon and was endorsed recently by the committee on forest legislation appointed by Governor Hay of Washington.

"It is also an error to suppose that the bill will either supplant or disturb the private work of timber owners in protecting their own property. They will spend and do more, rather than less. The object of the bill is not to relieve the timber owners of any responsibility but to provide facilities for making the fire laws effective against all classes alike and to give better protection to settlers and others who are not in the position that the timber owner is to guard their lives and property. Nor is it proposed to interfere with the management of private patrimonies. They will be encouraged, that is all."

No High Salary Fixed.
"Another misunderstanding which has gained some currency is with regard to salary of the state foresters and fire warden. No high salary is fixed by the bill. It merely enforces a maximum limit beyond which the board cannot go, and the commission of the board is such as to insure that it will make the very best bargain for the state. No single interest, political or otherwise, can control it."

"There is absolutely no provision in the bill either now in the Oregon legislature or in Washington which would use in other states. It merely proposes to give the people of Oregon the protection that our neighboring states gladly give the lives and resources of their citizens and is particularly similar to the successful Washington law with a few improvements suggested by Governor Hay's commission."

FEDERAL COURT SENDS DAMAGE ACTION BACK

Judge Bean in United States court has remanded the suit of Thomas C. Foster against the Coos Bay Gas & Electric company and W. A. Hargrave to the state court of Coos county for trial. The suit was first brought in the Coos county district court and is a personal damage action. Though the corporation is a Washington one, Hargrave, the superintendent, was made a party to the suit and hence it was brought in the state court, but removed to the federal court upon application of the defendant.

This action of Judge Bean in remanding the case to the state courts for trial is important because it shows that federal judges will probably hold that where an employee of a defendant company, who is a resident of Oregon, is made a party defendant in a suit, the case properly can be tried in the state courts. The corporations have been eager to get all damage suits into the federal courts since the passage of the three-fourths majority jury law in Oregon, the federal procedure still requiring a unanimous verdict from the jury.

COAL MINERS HOSTILE TO CIVIC FEDERATION

Columbus, Ohio, Jan. 31.—The convention of the United Mine Workers today took a decided stand against the National Civic Federation when, by a vote of 446 to 344, it voted to amend the constitution to provide that members of the Civic Federation should forfeit their membership in the union.

John Mitchell, former head of the miners' organization, and now vice president of the American Federation of Labor, is chairman of the trades department of the Civic Federation, and the vote of the miners is considered a rebuke to him by the organization which he helped to make a power in the industrial world.

A roll call was demanded when the proposed change came up, each delegate being forced to go on record.

PAROLED GIRL IS RETURNED TO SCHOOL

Centralia, Wash., Jan. 31.—Mildred Hanning, the girl who fled from the state training school because she feared a beating at the hands of the officials, was arrested yesterday and returned to the institution. The girl is said to be but 17 years of age and the warrant charged her with delinquency.

The girl admitted that she had twice attempted to take her own life. She is still almost prostrated with fear and many well-to-do families of this city have offered to give her a home.

Former Waitress Sues for Legacy.

Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Jan. 31.—Mrs. Rachel M. Osborne, formerly a Poughkeepsie waitress, today took steps to collect two-thirds of an estate estimated at \$100,000 left by Joseph P. Morris, a civil engineer. When Morris left for Wellsville, Pa., two years ago the waitress was Miss Doughty, but she has married since. He told her she had captivated his heart, but the waitress was engaged to Albert Osborne. Recently Mrs. Osborne was notified that Morris had left her his property.

GARBAGE EXPENSE INCREASES DAILY

City Crematory Man Says He Was Wholly Deceived by Builders of Plant.

"Expenses of cremating the garbage of the city are increasing every day and I can't tell when the limit will be reached," said City Crematory Superintendent Harry N. Napier this morning. "When I submitted my estimate for the crematory for January," he continued, "I based it on the maximum cost per ton, as guaranteed by the Public Works Engineering company, constructors of the new incineration plant at Guild's lake."

"The estimate I submitted to the city health board was \$2300, but since then I have been obliged to put in an emergency estimate of \$1500 and now find even this additional sum will not be enough."

"The new plant has not burned all the garbage brought to the crematory incinerator and it has been necessary to operate the old plant. The total expense for this month will exceed \$3800, as against \$1301.45 last January. While the expense has been nearly triple that of January last year the number of tons of garbage consumed has not been even double the amount burned a year ago this month. The average number of tons of refuse incinerated during the present month has been 72 a day. The old plant handled 38½ tons per day last January."

Owens River System Assured.

Los Angeles, Jan. 31.—The New York syndicate holding an option on \$4,896,000 worth of Owens river water supply system bonds today paid for \$186,000 worth of the bonds, with \$24,480 accrued interest. This transaction, together with the announced intention of the syndicate to take over the entire amount of bonds covered by its option, insures the completion of the Owens river project early in the summer of 1912.

Target Shoot for Eugene.

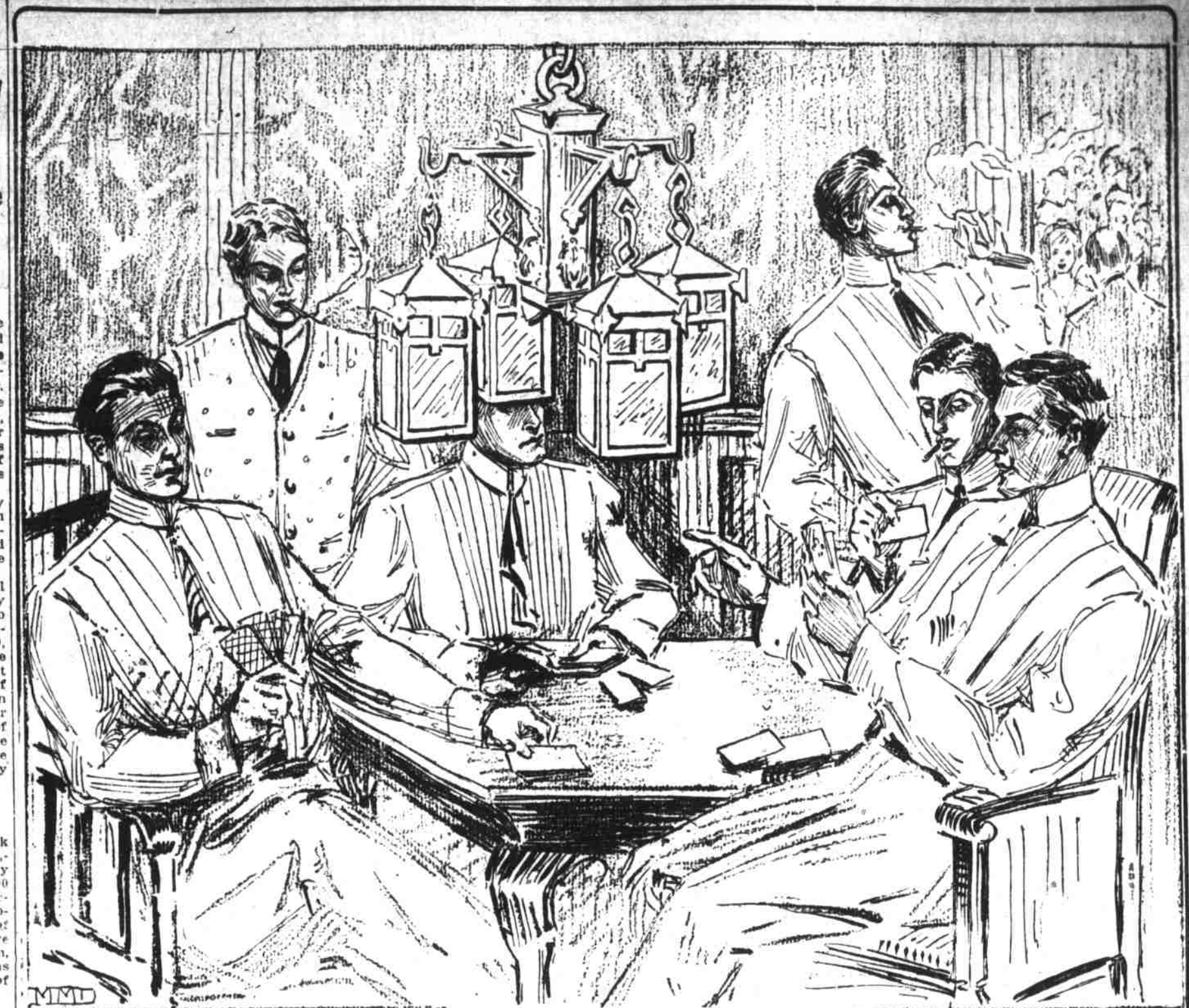
