GERMAN OFFICERS CRUEL; MISTREAT A NAVAL RECRUIT

Two Petty Engineer Officers Sentenced to Seven Years' Imprisonment for Inhuman Conduction to New Stoker.

Berlin, Feb. 4.—At a naval court-martial held at Kiel two engineer petty officers of a torpedo boat were sentenced to seven years' penal servitude each for brutal treatment of a stoker, causing the latter's death.

They are accused of having whipped the boys with a horsewhip, beating them with stocks on the soles of the feet and kneecaps, of placing chains on the wrists and ankles of boys suspected of attempting to escape, and of chaining another youth in a cellar to a ring fastened in the wall.

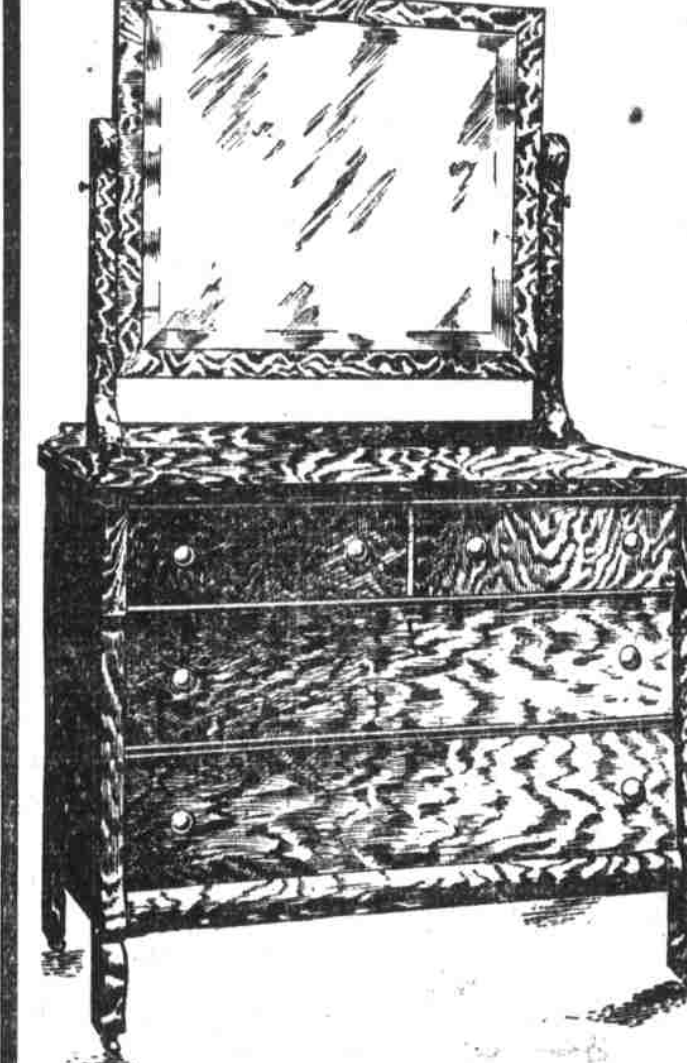
