

PROPOSES DODGING IRRITATING ISSUE

Mahoney of Morrow Wants to Let People Settle Reapportionment.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 7.—A plan to have the people vote upon legislative reapportionment and avoid a serious difference among members of the legislature on the subject was introduced into the house yesterday afternoon by Mr. Mahoney of Morrow. He would have the constitution amended to provide for one senator from each county, four more than at present, and one representative from each county. Additional representatives would be apportioned among the counties according to population, the total at any time to be not more than 75. The proposal would be voted upon in the election of 1912 and would become effective January 1, 1914. Multnomah county would get about 20 representatives if it passed.

Representative Simpson of Linn would restrict Multnomah county to nine representatives until the constitutional change is made and introduced a bill to this effect yesterday. He would give each county in the state at least one member in the lower house. Baker would be given two, Lane three, Linn three, Marion five, Clackamas three, Yamhill two, Washington three and Clatsop two until the new plan went into effect through the approval of the people.

Many representatives declare Simpson's bill unconstitutional in that it gives a representative to some counties not having at least one sixtieth of the population.

EMERGENCY CLAUSES SWATTED BY ALBEE

Salem, Or., Feb. 7.—Senator Albee is hot on the trail of emergency clauses. Now and then a bill slips through the house with that referendum proof, proviso attached, but Albee is always waiting with the hatchet. He has an idea that there are few real emergencies. Not believing the Japanese were near, he had emergency cut out of the naval militia bill and yesterday he enforced the same rule on a bill hitting the loan sharks by prohibiting the assignment of pay checks of county employees.

Senator Barrett of Washington last night sat in judgment in the committee on judiciary on a bill he helped to pass as a legislator 30 years ago. It is Kolaher's bill repealing the grant of a franchise to the public levees of Portland to the Oregonian Railroad company, a predecessor of the Southern Pacific. Barrett was not certain whether or not he would vote to reverse his position of 30 years ago.

Abraham of Douglas and Miller of Linn exchanged thrusts yesterday in debating a bill to keep the children in school on election day and other holidays. Miller playfully remarked that he was surprised that Abraham's children needed holidays and fresh air, presuming the senator from Douglas is as airy at home as he is in Salem. Abraham came back by saying Miller is a personification of too much education, being dried up like a mummy. Miller would be just the same in 10,000 years if he were laid away, said Abraham. By-play of this sort is what makes the oasis in legislative drudgery.

The wedding gown was of heavy white Duchesse satin, in semi-empire style, heavily embroidered with silver roses. The train was eight yards long. The veil was of real lace. Lady Decies planned to wear her bridal gown at the coronation of King George and her presentation to the English court in June.

The bridesmaids' gowns were of white chiffon over white satin, trimmed with festoons of sea green satin ribbon. The gowns were in the high-waisted empire style. The hats were of white chiffon, trimmed with green. The bride's dress was her trousseau, on which was spent, according to a reliable estimate, the snug little sum of \$40,000.

Cost of Entire Affair \$75,000.
Those who like to follow the elaborate weddings among New York's millionaires estimate the total cost of Miss Vivien's transformation into "Lady Decies" at close to \$75,000, to say nothing of the "dot" of several millions more she will take her titled husband, Mrs. George J. Gould, nothing if not lavish in her social affairs, and her planning of today's wedding from first to last was in utter disregard of cost. The preliminary entertainments, the decorations of the church and house, the gifts to the wedding party and the other odds and ends brought the total expenditures up to the proportions of a good sized fortune.

No immediate plans for the honeymoon have been announced. It is probable that the couple will go to the Gould properties at Jekyll Island, Ga., returning to New York and sailing on the Carmania on February 13. They will make the Mediterranean trip and stay some time in Egypt before going to Sefton Park.

The great disparity in the ages of Lord and Lady Decies added a note of interest to their wedding. Lord Decies, whose full name is John Graham Hope de La Per Beresford, Baron Decies, of County Waterford, Ireland, first met Miss Gould while he was exhibiting horses at the New York show several years ago. She was then in short dresses, but it was seen at the outset that he was greatly interested in the child, as she then was.

Lord Decies, who is only two years younger than his father-in-law, has seen much service as a soldier, having been in the Boer campaign. Being an engaging conversationalist, it was suggested that his stories of his travels and fighting may have won the heart of Miss Vivien, for Lord Decies was a frequent guest of the Goulds at their Lakewood and town residences. Lord Decies, however, denied the impression that he had played Othello to Miss Gould's Desdemona.

Lord Decies himself thought it not

ing unusual that a man of 44 should wish to marry a girl of 18.

"Why, I am not old," he said to the New York interviewers. "In England a man of 44, especially if he has lived actively in the open air, as I have done, is considered right in his prime. Difference in ages such as between Miss Gould and myself are very common in England."

In addition to being a soldier, Lord Decies is one of the most prominent sportsmen in England. He owns a small racing stable, and is known as a cricketer and football player, a hunter and boxer. The country seats over which Lady Decies will be mistress are Killooney, Ireland; Sefton Park, Slough, England, and Beresford Lodge, Kent.

Ceremony Begins.
The doors of the church were thrown open shortly before 3 o'clock, and while the guests arrived the church choir, half hidden behind a bank of flowers, rendered the opening selections of the elaborate musical program, accompanied by organ and violin. Meanwhile every seat in the huge edifice was taken and people were standing at the back and in the side aisles.

When the strains of Henschel's "Morning Hymn" had died away the watching spectators were rewarded with the sight of a score of little choir boys in white vestments marching in through a door at the left of the chancel. Behind them came Bishop Greer in full Episcopal costume, accompanied by Dr. Leighton Parks, rector of St. Bartholomew's. Both churchmen are intimate friends of the Gould family and it was the especial wish of the bride that they perform the wedding ceremony.

Ushers and Bridesmaids.
When the bishop and rector had reached their places a hush fell over the large assemblage as the bride proceeded to make her appearance. First came the ushers, eight in number. Following the ushers were the bridesmaids in gowns of white chiffon over white satin, made with the high waisted empire effect and trimmed with festoons of sea green satin ribbon. Behind the bridesmaids were two little flower girls, little Miss Gloria Gould, the bride's youngest sister, and Miss Diana Dalziel. Miss Edith Gould, another sister of the bride, followed as maid of honor.

The Bride Appears.
The bride herself finally entered, accompanied by her father. Miss Gould looked particularly young and girlish and appeared perfectly unconscious of the interest taken in her finery. She was attired in a magnificent gown of white duchesse satin, in semi-empire style, and heavily embroidered with silver roses. The court train was eight yards long and was edged with an embroidery in seed pearls and silver, following the design of bunches of rose leaves tied together with a lover's knot. The bridal veil of Brussels net was

fastened to the coiffure with a tangle of orange blossoms. Miss Gould carried a bouquet of orange blossoms and white bride roses.

At the altar the bridesmaids and other attendants separated in a line on either side and the bride and her father passed between the lines. They were met at the altar steps by Lord Decies and his cousin Lord Alastair Graham, who acted as best man.

The Service and the Reception.
The double ring service was used. Both bride and bridegroom made their responses clearly and firmly. The ceremony itself occupied but a few moments. Immediately after it was concluded the bride and bridegroom returned up the aisle, smiling and nodding while receiving the congratulations of relatives and friends.

From the church the bridal party and guests proceeded at once to the Gould residence, 837 Fifth avenue, where the reception was held. The mansion was magnificently decorated. The salon on the first floor was adorned with palms, ferns and white roses. The ballroom and the famous "regency

room" also were filled with flowers. On the third floor the guests viewed the wedding gifts, among which was a profusion of jewels of a total value estimated at close to \$1,000,000.

Threatening Letters.
(United Press Leased Wire.)
New York, Feb. 7.—Threatening letters sent Miss Vivien Gould warning her against marrying Lord Decies are in the hands of the police. All are anonymous and their contents are kept secret from Miss Gould.

Owing to several threatening letters, Lord Decies has received from cranks professing resentment at the disparity between his age and that of his bride, an unusually heavy police guard was provided, and no outsiders were allowed to gather at the door of the church.

Albany Citizen Dies.

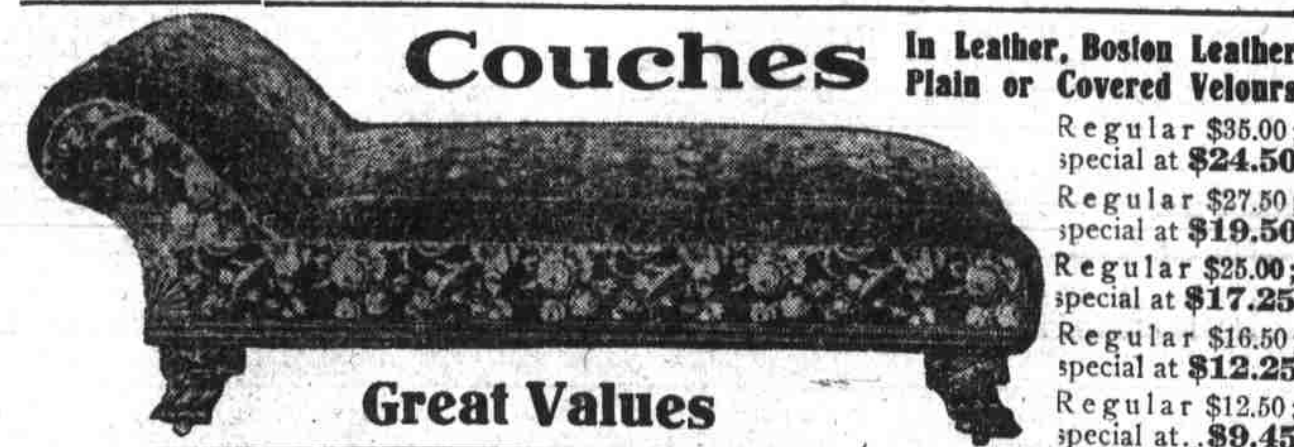

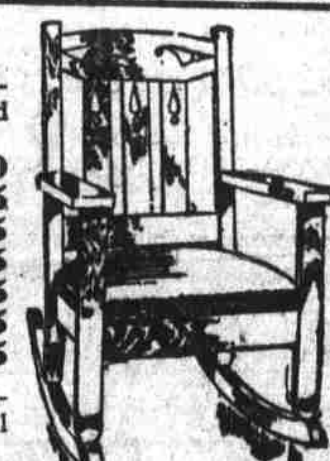
