

TWO DOZEN BILLS PASSED BY SENATE

Action on Five Is Postponed and One Measure Is Killed.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—Twenty-four bills were passed by the senate yesterday afternoon, five others indefinitely postponed and one failed to pass, a total of 30 disposed of in four hours' work.

Among those passed were bills by Representative Cushman providing for the designation of a fiscal agent for Oregon in New York and by Representative Gill to put "gallon houses" out of business.

The Cushman bill was explained by Senator Bean as a plan for saving considerable money to the state and municipal governments. He stated that one fourth of 1 per cent interest is now charged, but the Chase National bank of New York is willing to handle all this business without charging commission.

The Gill bill requires application to be made to the county court for a license to sell liquor in quantities of one gallon or over in the same manner that petitions are filed for saloons selling small quantities. This gives the right of remonstrance. Senator Sinnott said that many "blind pigs" are carried on in his section under the guise of gallon houses.

Three companion bills fathered by Senator Calkins were passed which will make easier the suing of foreign corporations doing business in Oregon. These bills authorize suit to be brought in any county where the company sued has an office, and makes the service of summons easier. Other bills passed by the senate were as follows:

S. B. 125—By Sinnott, to prevent deduction of weight of sacks in grain sales in absence of a specific contract.

S. B. 192—By Sinnott, permitting counties to levy a tax for county libraries.

S. B. 120—By Abraham, increasing pay of county judge of Douglas county from \$1200 to \$2000.

S. B. 165—By Chase, adding a deputy for county clerks in Coos county.

S. B. 191—By Joseph, providing for liens on boats in cases of damages caused by death.

S. B. 161—By Wood, providing a method of county division or annexation by vote of territory affected.

H. B. 125—By Abrams, requiring the secretary of state to file a list of corporations, being a bill prepared by the secretary of state.

H. B. 232—By Belknap and Thompson, to prevent the pollution of the Deschutes river.

H. B. 182—By Abrams, relating to charitable foreign corporations, being a bill prepared by the secretary of state.

H. B. 236—By Brooke, abolishing the Malheur irrigation district, which was never fully organized.

H. B. 203—By Brooke, repealing sections of law made inoperative by rulings of department of the interior, a bill recommended by the state land board.

H. B. 280—By Jones, repealing a law relative to license for sale of opium because of confusion caused by other laws of the same import.

H. B. 185—By Seals, fixing salaries of officers of Tillamook county, with provision for a referendum in that county if petitioned for by 25 per cent of the voters.

H. B. 110—By Chambers, for the protection of crabs in Lincoln county.

H. B. 87—By Steelinger, relating to engineers of donkey engines to 18 years of age or over and signal boys 15 years or over.

H. B. 123—By Peterson, to provide for discharge of judgments against bankrupts.

H. B. 161—By Belland and Leinenweber, authorizing sale of the pilot schooner San Jose.

S. B. 82—By Carson, imposing a license fee upon all water powers.

S. B. 194—By Carson, regulating fees charged for copies of public records.

HOMESTEAD LIEN VETO IS UPHOLD BY SENATE

Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—Governor West's veto of Senator Nottingham's bill making homesteads specifically liable for liens by material men was sustained by the senate yesterday afternoon.

Instead of securing the two thirds vote needed to go over the head of the governor, Nottingham mustered only 13, while 15 voted to uphold the governor. The vote was as follows:

To sustain the governor—Albee, Bean, Dimick, Joseph, Kellaher, Lester, Locke, McColloch, Miller, Norton, Patton, Oliver, Parrish, Von der Hellen, President Selling—15.

To override the veto—Abraham, Barrett, Umatilla, Barrett of Washington, Burgess, Bowerman, Calkins, Carson, Chase, Hoskins, Merriman, Nottingham, Patton, Wood—13.

Absent—Hawley and Sinnott.

"Third House" Convenes Thursday.
Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—Clerks employed in both houses will have fun with the legislators Thursday night by holding a session of the "third house." At a caucus last night Charles W. Garland was selected temporary speaker. Fred Drager, chief clerk of the house, and C. J. Mahoney, clerk of the senate ways and means committee, are the candidates for speaker.

Mahoney's opponent charges that he has already traded most of the committee's money in return for votes, while Drager's friends have dubbed him "the second Allen Eaton" in their campaign and are promising no places.

Barry Made Assistant Clerk.
Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—W. H. Barry of Portland, a well known figure behind the desk in former sessions, was appointed assistant chief clerk of the senate yesterday by President Selling after a resolution creating the office had been adopted. He has served as chief clerk in past sessions and his services in the last two weeks of the session were relied upon as a precaution against possible mistakes.

Bills Introduced in Senate and House

S. B. 273—By judiciary committee, creating county depositories and requiring deposits therein by county treasurers.

S. B. 274—By committee on commerce and navigation, substitute for S. B. 4, prohibiting possession of liquor on trains.

S. B. 275—By Malarkey, providing the method of drawing town plats.

S. B. 276—By Merriman, prohibiting advertising for treatment for certain diseases.

S. B. 277—By Oliver, providing for relinquishment of certain lands in Union county.

S. B. 278—By Von der Hellen, increasing salary of school superintendent of Jackson county from \$1200 to \$1800, and providing at \$300 per year.

S. B. 279—By Lester, permitting counties to expend \$1000 per year for advertising resources.

S. B. 280—By Carson, relating to manner of taking depositions.

S. B. 281—By Carson, relating to exemption of mortgages and mortgage notes.

S. B. 282—By Hoskins and Barrett of Washington, fixing salaries of officers of Yamhill county.

STATE EXAMINER BILL MUTILATED TO DEATH

Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—Amended and then amended again until it is limping, Senator Sellings' bill providing for creation of the office of state examiner is likely to be killed off by request of its author, who feels that its value has been fatally impaired.

Politics interred into the amendment of the bill. Abraham and other Republican senators objected to the appointment of the examiner by the governor and amended the bill to make the office elective. They fixed the term at two years and provided that the first examiner should be elected two years hence, not being willing to concede a temporary appointment to Governor Wood.

Senator Sellings last night told the revision of laws committee that if it was afraid to allow an appointment by the governor and have no examiner at all for two years, he would be opposed to the bill. He contends the officer is needed now and after the multitude of amendments is not disposed to favor the mutilated bill.

ASTORIA APPROPRIATION BILL GOES TO GOVERNOR

Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—The senate yesterday concurred in house amendments to Senator Lester's bill appropriating \$50,000 for the celebration of the John Jacob Astor centennial at Astoria next August. The amendments reduced the contingent amount necessary to be raised by Clatsop county and the city of Astoria from \$50,000 to \$40,000. The bill now goes to the governor for signature.

Joseph's bill making the state, county or municipality liable for material where public officials fail to exact the bonds required by law was reconsidered after being defeated on motion of Senator Bean and was sent back to committee for amendment.

Garland Is Chief Jester.

Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—C. W. Garland, clerk of revision of laws committee of the house, will be speaker of the "third house" at its session next Thursday night. This will be the night of jollity for legislative employees, who are prone on such occasions to imitate the peculiarities of the law makers.

Garland was selected last night at a meeting of the third house steering committee, of which Bert Wardford is chairman. Credentials and receiving committees were appointed. The candidates for permanent speaker besides Garland are William Drager, chief clerk of the house; W. H. Barry, assistant chief clerk of the senate, and C. J. Mahoney, clerk of revision of laws of the senate, with chances apparently favoring "Bill" Barry.

BARRETT COMPLAINS OF PANAMA ROAD'S RATES

HOUSE ADDS 13 TO PASSED BILLS

Kills 3: For State Auditor, for Compulsory Requisitions, for County Recall.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—A spectacular battle in the house over Brownhill's bill to give home rule to counties in respect to county officers not holding their positions by virtue of the constitution marked yesterday afternoon's session. The bill failed to pass by three votes, there being 25 in favor of it and 28 against.

"Power in the hands of the people is just as safe as in the hands of the legislature," declared Brownhill in the course of his remarks. "And I tell you gentlemen the time will come soon when the legislature will be put out of business unless it does better. I personally am willing to trust any one of my constituents."

Thompson, Buchanan and Neuner were the principal opponents of the bill. Clemens of Multnomah spoke briefly against it and was attacked by Fouts, who expressed surprise that a representative elected on the "people's rule" platform should speak against a home rule bill.

The second bill relating to Multnomah county libraries was passed during the afternoon. It was presented by Representative Ambrose and gave the Multnomah county court authority to make a half mill levy for the purpose of maintaining libraries and erecting branches.

Cottel of Multnomah spoke against it, but later changed his mind and voted for its passage. It received unanimous approval.

Senator Abraham's bill to force the governor to issue requisitions when requested, whether he deems it wise or not, was defeated.

ABSENTEES HIT BY BROWNHILL'S BILL

After 30 Days Salary Stops, in 60 Days Office Becomes Vacant.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—A bill prohibiting a public officer from drawing his salary if he is absent for more than 30 days and declaring his office vacant if he is away more than 60 days in a year was introduced in the house this afternoon by Representative Brownhill. It reads as follows:

"If any person holding any elective or appointive office or public position within the state of Oregon shall be absent from his office year for more than 30 days in any calendar year he shall not be allowed to receive any payment or compensation for the time of such absence exceeding 30 days. If such absence shall exceed 60 days in any calendar year, his office shall thereby be vacated and the vacancy shall be filled in the manner required by law in the case of a vacancy in said office or position caused by death or resignation. Any such absence for more than 60 days is hereby declared to be delinquency in public office."

It will perhaps be thought that my bill is aimed at the Legislature of State Benson," said Brownhill, "but that is not the case. I merely propose that state officers shall be placed on a business basis. In ordinary business life if a man is away from his position for more than 30 days his salary is cut off. We are sent here by the people to help give to the state a business administration, and I think every man who is faithful to his constituency ought to vote for such a bill."

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PEOPLE'S VOTE ON TAXES DISPLEASES

Senate Would Resubmit One Amendment Passed and Two Defeated.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 8.—Upon the theory that the voters of the state were misled by the ballot title of the so-called "poll tax amendment," adopted last November, the senate yesterday voted unanimously to submit at the next election a new amendment to repeal the one recently enacted. At the same time the senate voted to submit once more the two other amendments defeated at the last election, popularly known as the grange amendments. Upon these there developed a difference of opinion. Brownman and several other stalwarts declaring that the decision of the people was final with them. The decision of the people on the "poll tax amendment" is not final, they explained, because it was not understood.

Dimick of Clackamas turned loose a flood of denunciation of Joseph Fels and the single taxers. He said the single tax is favored by a few agitators, a few theorists, a few Socialists and the tax dodgers. He could understand, he said, why the owners of skyscrapers, the owners of factories and of big stocks of merchandise, as well as the railroads, will favor single tax, because it lifts the burden from them and places it upon the farmer and small home owner.

McColloch of Baker talked in favor of submitting the amendments to the people, explaining that in his opinion the amendment permitting experimentation with the single tax should be repealed, and that the other amendments defeated last year should be adopted. He pointed to their approval by the tax commission in 1905, and said that they accorded with the ideas of tax experts everywhere.

The vote in favor of submitting the two amendments known as the grange amendments to the people again was as follows:
