

HOUSE MAY PASS ALL ROADS BILLS

Marked Change Noted Among
Members in Favor of All
5 Measures.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., Feb. 9.—A majority report from the committee on roads and highways in the house will come to the floor tomorrow in favor of the five bills, passed by the senate. In the house itself, there has been a marked change during the past two days and indications point to the passage of the bills by comfortable margin. Chapman of Washington is the only member of the roads committee who is still holding out and his opposition is directed principally upon the proposal to create a state highway commissioner.

Other members of the committee last night pointed out to him that without a highway commissioner the improvements planned in Oregon would not be competently supervised. They declared that if the state engineer were placed in charge of roads construction the projects would become a tail of his department, because of the great pressure of other duties upon him.

"If you can get ten broad minded men in Washington county to tell me that a highway commissioner is needed I will vote for the bill," finally declared Chapman.

One of the members declared that even with the brief time left he would endeavor to show that he could get, not ten, but 50 thinking men in Washington county, who believed that a commissioner was necessary to carry out the roads plans in the state. They told Chapman that erroneous impressions had been scattered throughout the rural districts concerning the bills several weeks ago, but that since an understanding of them had been obtained numerous representatives who had believed their constituents were opposed to the senate bills, had learned otherwise.

More evidence of the change of sentiment in the outlying districts was shown this morning by receipt by Representative Neuner of telegrams from Douglas county. These were signed by some of the most prominent citizens of the county, who had diversified occupations and declared that many Douglas county people believed there was merit in these bills.

EASTERNERS TAKING INTEREST IN OREGON

"Oregon is being well advertised in the east and particularly are the easterners interested in what they call the 'Oregon system,'" says Rabbi Jonah B. Wise, who has just returned from the east, where he sat in the biennial union of the American Hebrew Congregation in New York. During his absence, Rabbi Wise delivered an address at the Hebrew Union college and the three congregations at Cincinnati. Rabbi Wise and Lucius Solomons, delegate from San Francisco, occupied seats of honor at the banquet given to the Union of American Hebrew Congregations. Jacob H. Schiff acted as toastmaster. One of the speakers at the banquet was Theodore Roosevelt.

Rabbi Wise says that Portland and San Francisco were the only Pacific coast cities represented at the convention, which was the largest assembly of laymen and rabbis ever held in America.

Louis Marshall, an attorney of New York, discussed the question of Russian passports at the convention, and a resolution was adopted asking that Jews entering Russia be accorded the same rights as other races. The resolution is to be forwarded to President Taft.

CLUB WILL HONOR LINCOLN'S BIRTHDAY

Sleuths Capture Opium Smuggler Suspect

In the arrest of Frank Caviness, a former Pendleton boy, the United States believes it has secured one of the most dangerous opium smugglers that has infested the north Pacific coast in years.

Caviness is now under arrest at San Antonio, where he was taken up by local police on suspicion of being a confidence man. His description had been telegraphed to other cities and was recognized by federal officers here.

Caviness is under federal indictment in Seattle charged with opium smuggling. He jumped \$1500 bail there, his partner, arrested at the same time, having been tried subsequently and sentenced to 18 months in the United States penitentiary.

Caviness is also suspected of complicity in the robbery of the steamship Humboldt of more than \$75,000 in gold bullion.

His brother, Orville Caviness, is under arrest in San Francisco charged with being one of the gang that robbed the Humboldt. Both were hangers-on in saloons and billiard rooms in Portland.

PUBLIC-SERVICE BILLS STILL DIVIDE HOUSE

Salem, Or., Feb. 10.—The public service commission bill presented by Fouts of Multnomah, excluding cities which create local commissions from its provisions, was reported back to the house yesterday afternoon by the revision of laws committee with the recommendation that the house go into a committee of the whole as a special order of business to consider it.

No vote on the bill was taken in the committee and in fact the members did not go into detail in discussing it. The attitude of the committee was that the bill is of so much importance that the house would wish to consider it as a committee of the whole and make amendments and that any time devoted to it by the committee would be a loss. The bill was afterward sent to the railways and transportation committee, to which Senator Malarkey's public service measure was also referred. If this committee takes action upon them, two reports will probably be made.

There are already signs of a division among the Multnomah members on the two bills. Collins is unalterably opposed to the Fouts bill and three others, who have not definitely made up their minds, declare they at present have leanings toward Malarkey's bill.

REPORTS FILED ON EAST OREGON ASYLUM SITE

Salem, Or., Feb. 10.—Both reports on the eastern Oregon asylum site, one by the legislative committee favoring the Bowerman purchase and the other by the committee of physicians declaring this site unsuitable were submitted to the senate yesterday and filed without comment. 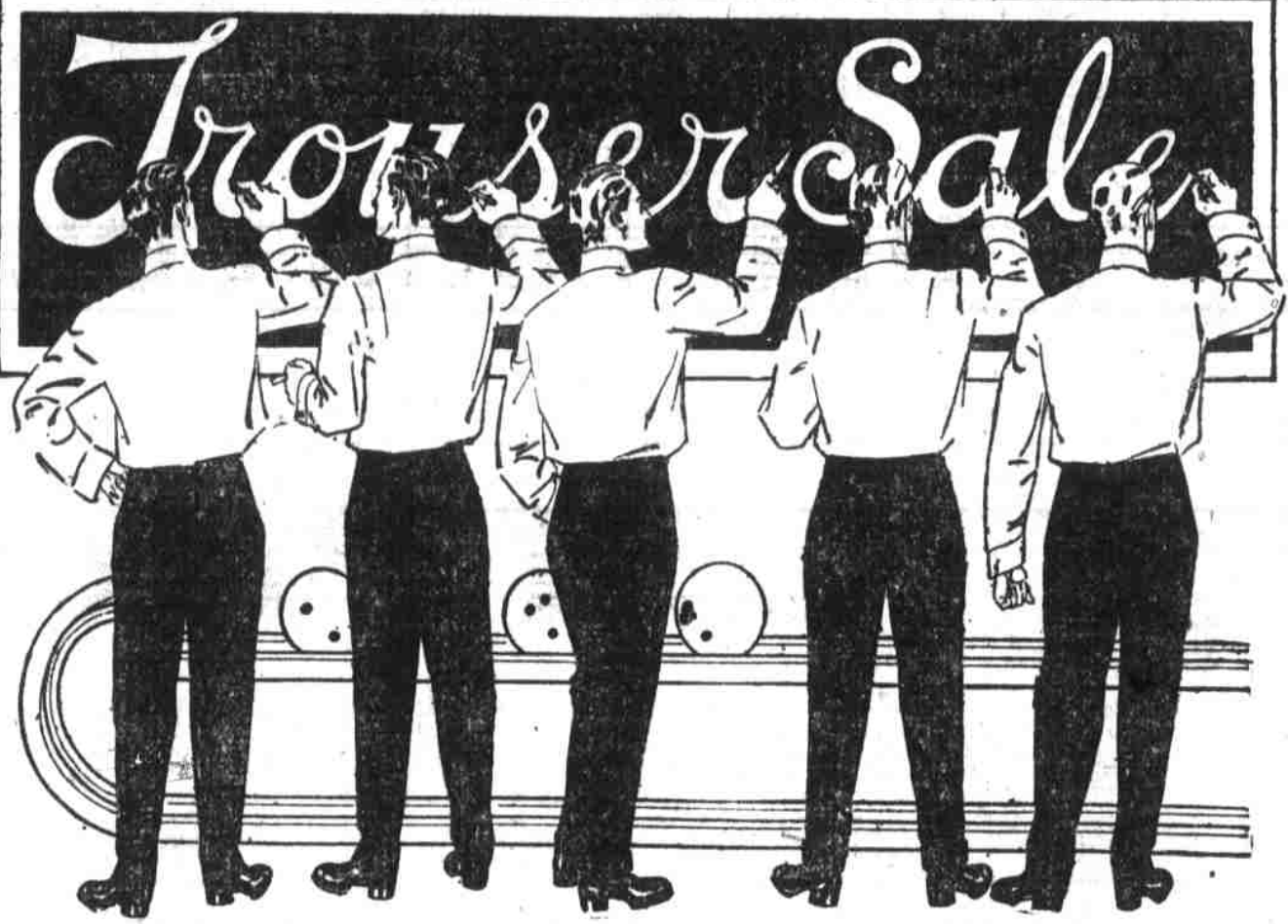

Senator Locke introduced a bill to provide \$5000 to protect the state from danger of bubonic plague and other Asiatic diseases. This bill follows the recommendations of Dr. Martin R. Edwards of the medical department of Harvard university. The bill provides for expenditures of money by the state board of health.

Senator McColloch introduced a companion bill to the parole bill passed a few days ago making it possible to parole prisoners before they reach the penitentiary when convicted of a felony for which the maximum penalty fixed by law is not exceeding 10 years.
