

### DAIRYMEN, DOCTORS, DINNER, DYNAMITE

#### Meeting of First and Second at Third May Produce Fourth.

Explosion of dynamite, figuratively speaking, is promised at the dollar dairy dinner to be held soon at the Portland Commercial club. Medical men of the state are to tell what they think of the dairymen and dairymen to express their opinion of the medical profession, particularly as to the stand they have taken recently in the operation of dairies.

The Commercial club will remain neutral in the anticipated duel of words, which, Manager C. C. Chapman this morning said, he believed would be most interesting.

"The banquet will be given simply to bring together the various factions, if they may so be called, with a view to accomplishing something that will benefit an industry that some day promises to be Oregon's best," said Mr. Chapman. "The dairy industry is languishing, falling behind what it was a few years ago, and it is time that the reason for this be brought out. Bring out the facts, strip them to the bone, and let's have results."

It is said that the big condensed milk and cream factories are suffering because of the disorganized condition of affairs, farmers are disposing of their dairy cattle and if this thing is to continue it will not be many years before Oregon will be unknown as a dairying state. It should rank among the first.

"Medical men say that the dairies are conducted poorly, the majority of them. Dairymen contend that the medical men are not acquainted with actual conditions, that their ideas are not practical. Between them stands the dairy inspector's office, which, as conducted, has only aggravated the situation."

Many prominent speakers, representing all interests connected with the dairy industry, will attend the banquet; creamery men, farmers, medical men, scientists, business men and milk consumers. All sides will be heard, and it is believed that some kind of a foundation may be laid upon which this important industry may be given a chance to come into its own.

Oregon is an ideal dairy country, so experts have told us, and we need harmony and system. The big condensed cream and milk manufacturers are taking advantage of the chaos existing out here, making every effort to drive out Oregon competition in the open market.

The date for the banquet has not yet been set.

Galveston, Texas, Feb. 13.—Murder of a Mexican merchant, Alguales Saldon, in Puebla, Mexico, by adherents of President Diaz, is reported here today by Dr. H. A. Bates of San Antonio.

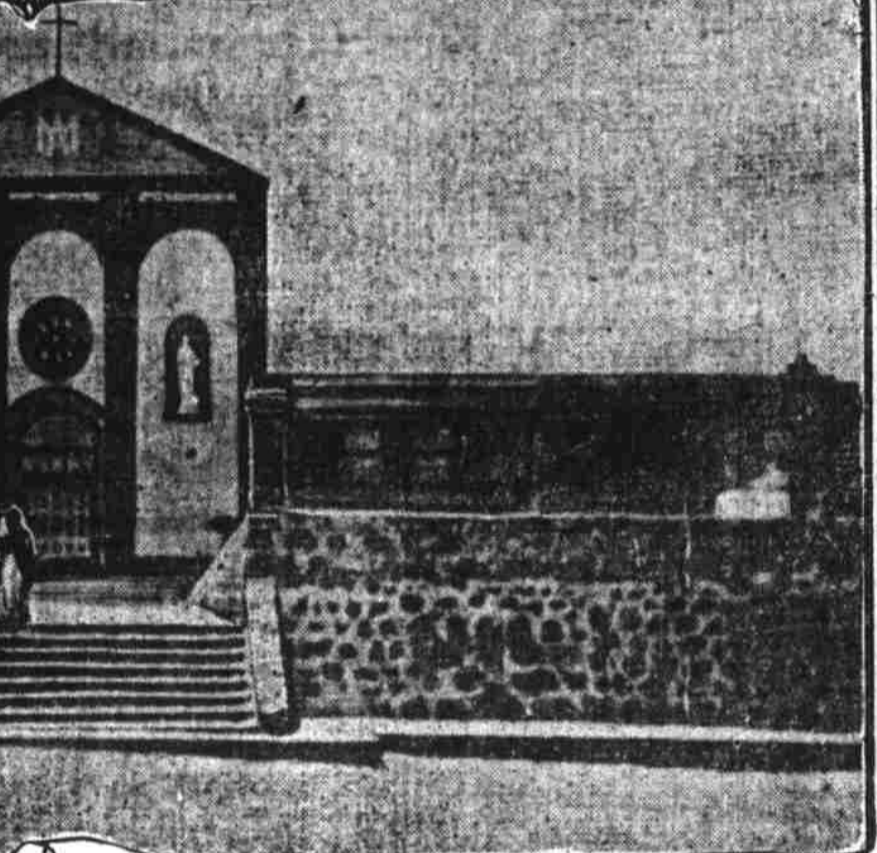
The physician says the Diaz adherents discovered that Saldon was acting as treasurer for the insurrectos. Searching his home, they found \$1500 and certain revolutionary documents.

When the Mexican troops first reached Saldon's home and he refused to surrender, they opened fire with machine guns, riddling the residence. Finally a charge was made, and when the house was entered Saldon and his family were found hiding in a cellar. When Saldon was stood against the wall before the firing party his wife stood near by, and as he fell to the volley he reeled forward and expired in her arms.

### IDAHO DIVORCE LAW NOW UP TO GOVERNOR

Boise, Idaho, Feb. 13.—After the house had accepted amendments to the bill revising the Idaho divorce laws, the measure went to Governor Hawley for his signature today. The bill requires one year's residence in the state before action for divorce can be begun and also requires three months' residence in the county in which the suit is filed.

Governor Hawley sent a special message to the legislature, suggesting an appropriation for the celebration of the fiftieth anniversary of the organization of the territory of Idaho. It is proposed to hold the celebration at Lewiston in 1913.

### HOLES IN SELLWOOD STREETS STILL THERE

Although the city engineer has notified several times of dangerous holes in Sellwood streets he has done nothing to repair them, according to a statement made by the Commercial club of Sellwood in a communication filed in the city auditor's office this morning.

"At our last meeting," reads the letter, "the secretary was instructed to notify the mayor and city council of the condition of streets left by the Pacific Constructing company when putting in a sewer in the western district. In many places cross walks were taken up and not replaced, stone gutters at corners were torn out and not replaced. Also there are numerous dangerous holes in many of the streets."

"The city engineer has been notified several times, but has done nothing, hence our appeal to the mayor and city council."

"As the conditions we have named still exist we beseech you to require either the contractor or bondsmen to make good the defects mentioned."

### SADDLE DEALERS IN CONVENTION

#### Wholesale Men of Pacific Coast Meet to Discuss Trade Topics.

Wholesale saddlery dealers of the Pacific coast are gathering in Portland today to attend the annual convention of the Pacific Coast Wholesale Saddlers' association, the sessions of which are to begin tomorrow morning in the Hotel Portland. The convention will last over Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday.

Included in the association are the larger wholesale saddlers in Seattle, Portland, San Francisco, Sacramento, Stockton and Los Angeles. W. F. Davis of San Francisco is the president. The conventions are held alternate years in San Francisco and Portland.

"We meet to discuss our business of the year and to arrange for ordinary questions that have arisen," said President Davis at the Hotel Portland today, "and our discussions are confined to matters of interest to the trade only. The conventions are largely an opportunity for us to get together and compare our experiences."

It is possible some action may be taken at this session relative to proposed changes in the tariff on hides. ### FRA DESCRIBES AN EDUCATION OF H'S

#### Wants Oregon to Know Mrs. Jonathan Bourne Is One Disciple.

"Fra Elbertus" Hubbard got into town this morning with his new educational scheme, which, he said, all simmered down, meant the working of heart, head and hand together. He said Mrs. Jonathan Bourne, wife of the senior Oregon senator, was a disciple and that she was at his colony at East Aurora, N. Y., binding books with her own hands.

"Put it in the paper like that," he said.

The Fra didn't want to see any reporters until 11 o'clock. Perhaps he had looked out of the window and seen the rain-snow falling, for he wore a pair of mountain boots and a soft shirt. He was reading proof sheets of "The Fra." His "new education" theory runs something like this: "In order to preserve sanity and health you've got to make your motions equal your emotions. Your emotions must find some expression for their emotions."

"The new idea is for women to work with their hands. We do bookbinding at East Aurora and we teach it, too. You can say that we have 500 persons employed in our plant. In time I believe that every factory will be a school and every school a factory."

"If you feel deeply, you must paint or sing or sculpt, or do something with your hands. Otherwise your feelings will gnaw your heart out. The happiest people are those that work. Mrs. Bourne knows this. She is a woman of great sensitiveness, is of great delicacy and is capable of deep feeling. She has discovered that society is not enough. The new education is founded on the theory that we've got to work to preserve our faculties."

Elbert Hubbard is in vaudeville now. He says he likes the work. He says he goes out on the stage, makes a few remarks, springs a couple of funny ones, then goes off the stage. "We had a record week in Denver," he said.

"Human beings attend vaudeville shows," he asserted. "And if you have anything to say, they will listen."

He is staying at the Cornwell.

"I am tired loafing," said Major Kennedy today, "and I am moving my books and other paraphernalia to the office of Attorney John C. Shillock, where I will take up the practice of law."

When asked if he proposes to take any further legal steps to enforce his order of removal against Judge Tazwell, Mayor Simon said this morning he had nothing to say.

### MANN IS CANDIDATE FOR MUNICIPAL JUDGE

John D. Mann this morning filed in the city auditor's office a notice of his intention to become a candidate for the Republican nomination for municipal judge at the primaries in May. This is the second official announcement of candidacy to be made for any office. Edward Williams made the first one. He is also a candidate for the municipal judgeship.

Mr. Mann promises if elected to conduct the office in an efficient and impartial manner and to enforce the law with equal justice to all. He says he is in favor of Statement No. 1 and the direct primary and would let the people rule. He wants the motto, "Equal Justice to All" placed opposite his name on the ballot.
