

HAYS SAYS NO MERIT IN STRIKE

President Lynch of I. T. U. Expected to Take Action on Printers' Case Today

(United Press Leased Wire.) Chicago, March 1.—President James Lynch of the International Typographical union is expected today to take action on the strike of 250 union printers, which has crippled the Hearst newspapers here. Members of the American Newspaper Publishers' association think Lynch will order the printers back to work pending arbitration.

The Hearst type, today is being set by union printers in the office of the Chicago Journal, and National Organizer Turner threatens to call a strike of the Journal's printers if this plan is continued. The publishers' association declares that if such a strike is called they will lock out all the union printers in Chicago.

All the city papers today are confined to four pages until the Hearst printers return to work, thus curtailing all work to a minimum.

Taking advantage of the other papers' difficulties, the Daily Socialist today issued a large paper and circulated it broadcast.

When the Socialist reached the streets employees of the circulation departments of the other papers, against the orders of their employers, slugged the Socialist newsboys and destroyed their papers. Members of the German and Bohemian Turnvereins and Socialists generally volunteered to slug the sluggers and there were scores of free fights throughout the city.

Indianapolis, March 1.—Vice-President Hayes, of the International Typographical union, today declared that international officials of the union regard the strike of the Hearst printers in Chicago as unwarranted. He says the strike will not be supported.

"We shall do everything possible," said Hayes, "to effect a settlement of the Chicago printers' strike, but it will not be supported. The men, I believe, have a grievance, but they have adopted the wrong method."

Hayes declared that if a strike were called upon the Chicago Journal, it would be entirely without the consent or approval of the international union.

MRS. CUDAHY THINKS SHE COULD WRITE A NOVEL

(United Press Leased Wire.) Kansas City, Mo., March 1.—Mrs. Jack Cudahy, whose husband seriously slashed Banker Jere Ellis when he found the couple alone at night in the Cudahy home, announced today that she was considering the writing of a novel based on her experiences.

"Surely," she said, "I could make a most thrilling story of the things that have happened to me since my husband and I separated; the silly comments of my friends, the astonishing things said to me and about me and also the proposals I have received. They were ridiculous. And they came from men in Kansas City, in New York—everywhere; from old and new acquaintances and from total strangers."

Mrs. Cudahy declared that she had made any move toward reconciliation with her husband, but she also denied a published statement that she would not consider a reconciliation.

DOCTORS PUZZLED BY CRAZY WOMAN'S ANTICS

ART ASSOCIATION DESIRES INCOME

If a plan being formulated crystallizes, the Portland Art association may soon appeal for an appropriation to extend the work of the museum and the schools. Action may be taken at the next meeting of the board of trustees, March 12. Between \$3000 and \$10,000 yearly would, those favoring the proposition say, put the association on a satisfactory financial footing. Private subscriptions have so far largely been the basis of support. The paid attendance is comparatively small, the subscribers' attendance has also fallen. The establishment of a fund for the purchase of original oil paintings is desired.

Those who want to see the work expanded believe that city and state, following the example set by the United States and European governments, might well set apart a moderate sum for the advancement of art in Portland and Oregon.

RECLAMATION MAPS FOR BOARD OF CONTROL

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.) Washington, March 1.—The memorials to congress adopted by the Oregon legislature at the session just closed, asking for the enactment of a parcels post law, and that the reclamation service turn over to the state board of control the plans, specifications and estimates of the Owyhee reclamation project, have been filed with the proper officials of congress.

Salem, Or., March 1.—It is the custom of the reclamation bureau to sell at a nominal figure to anyone interested sufficiently to buy them the maps, surveys and specifications that have been prepared by the engineers of the United States reclamation service for any project that may have been abandoned. The department has abandoned the Owyhee project, for which specifications had been prepared, and in order that the property owners within the proposed Owyhee segregation may have the benefit of these government specifications, should they desire to organize a project with private capital, the legislature at its last session was asked to memorialize congress, which it did, asking that these maps and surveys be turned over to the state board of control for safe keeping.

The late legislative session also memorialized congress to enact a parcels post law.

ROYALTIES CAN'T ALL LIVE AT BUCKINGHAM

(United Press Leased Wire.) London, March 1.—The lord chamberlain's department, which is held responsible for the smooth running of the coronation ceremonies in June, has received so many acceptances from royalties that there is no place for them all in Buckingham palace. In its embarrassment it has announced that some of the minor royalties will have to be "boarded out." All the large London hotels have been notified that the best accommodations must be held for King George's guests during June.

The Buckingham Palace hotel, which is near Buckingham palace, will receive the largest number of these royal guests.

PINKERTONS IN SEARCH OF DRUMMOND JEWELS

(United Press Leased Wire.) New York, March 1.—Pinkertons took a bath today in the search for jewels valued at \$130,000 that were stolen Saturday from the stateroom of Mrs. Baldwin Drummond on the Hamburg-American liner Amerika.

As Mrs. Drummond has an insurance policy of \$100,000 on the gems, she is taking the loss philosophically.

Nevada Wants Twain Statue.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Reno, Nev., March 1.—Nevada may yet secure the statue of her famous pioneer, Mark Twain, despite the refusal some time ago of the board of capital commissioners to receive the gift of \$25,000 offered by the late H. H. Rogers to be used for the construction of the statue.

Homer Davenport of New York City is endeavoring to interest capitalists in the east who were friends of Mark Twain when the latter lived in Nevada and secure subscriptions from them for the project.

ROADS MEN SURVEY WRECK WITH GRIEF

"Farmers Did It," Declares Dr. A. C. Smith; Webster Regrets Veto.

With a show of bitter feeling, the Oregon Good Roads association surveyed the wreckage of the campaign for better built highways in Oregon, when a meeting was held last night in the Beck building. Dr. Andrew C. Smith, the president, said:

"The representatives of the farmers defeated the good roads campaign. Hereafter we shall not ask the assistance of the farmers in the effort to obtain systematic, permanent road making in Oregon. We shall depend upon the people who really pay the taxes, the people of the towns, the business interests."

Judge Lionel R. Webster, chairman of the executive committee, stood alone in defense of the four highway bills adopted by the legislature and vetoed by the governor at the recommendation of the Good Roads association.

"I disagree with the association. I positively differ from all of you," he exclaimed. "I think the vetoing of the highway commission bill a great mistake, just as I believe that the bill itself was the greatest piece of legislation we have had in years. If allowed to operate, the bill would have resulted in the establishment of a bureau of information, where the people would have been taught proper road construction. Ignorance of road construction methods has been and is Oregon's pitiful condition."

Although the association members have apparently spent \$8000 or more in a year to further the good roads campaign, and have no results to show, save the mutilated and rejected highway bills and the more or less awakened public sentiment, not one present at the meeting even suggested that the organization be disbanded and the campaign abandoned.

Upon motion of John S. Beall it was agreed that the organization be continued.

CLIFFORD SIFTON BOASTS OF CANADA

(United Press Leased Wire.) Ottawa, March 1.—In anticipation of important developments the galleries of the commons were crowded when Honorable Clifford Sifton arose yesterday

to continue the debate on reciprocity. Sifton said he could not fully agree with the leader of the party with which he had been identified practically all his life. This would demonstrate the seriousness with which he regarded the issue.

After explaining why he left the Liberal party 20 years ago, he said, among other things, that "man for man, today, the people of Canada are better off than the people of any other country in the world and Canada is developing very rapidly."

STEAMFITTERS SAID TO ASK \$6.50 A DAY

Although steamfitters deny it, information has come from good authority that the Steamfitters' union has made a demand upon master steamfitters for an increase in wage. It is said the workmen have asked that their daily wage be raised from \$6 to \$6.50 for a seven hour day, and that the demand will be arbitrated some time this week.

BURNED MILL WILL NOT BE REBUILT AT ONCE

M. F. Henderson, vice president of the Oregon & Washington Lumber company, said today that he fixed \$125,000 as a conservative estimate of the damage done by fire yesterday to the company's plant on the river front in South Portland.

"We hold about \$40,000 in insurance," he said.

Mr. Henderson said the lumber business was not sufficiently active to warrant immediate rebuilding of the mill. W. A. Dempsey, president of the company, who is ill, does not know of the fire. Mr. Henderson said today that Mr. Dempsey's physicians had thought the best plan would be to tell him of the destruction of the mill until he was stronger.

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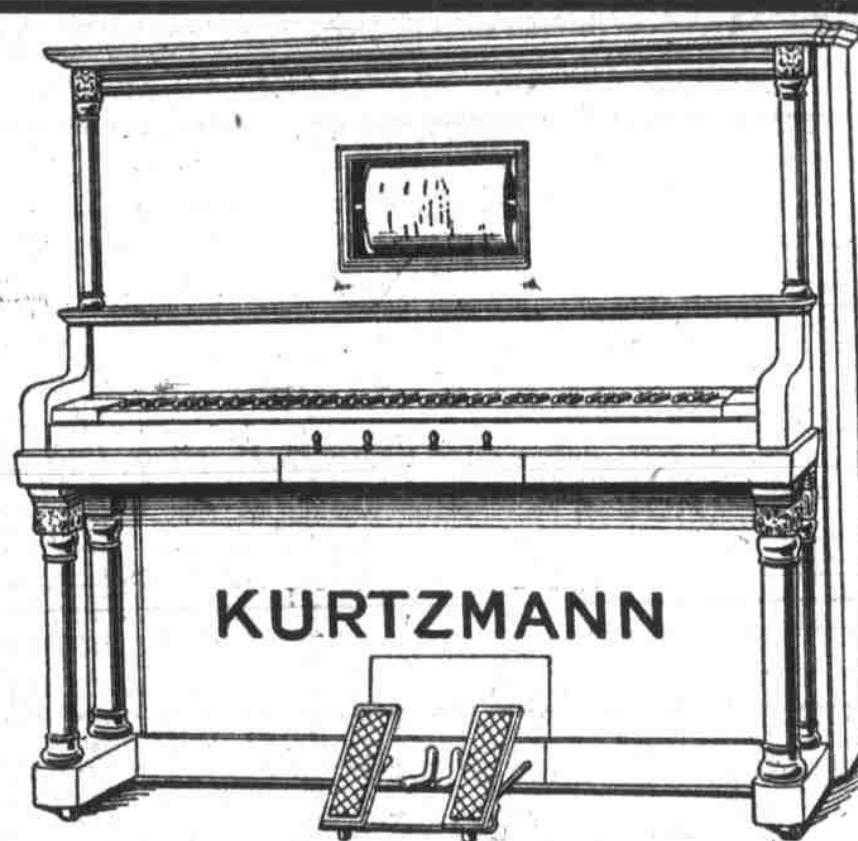
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
