THOUSANDS EXPECTED AT LOS ANGELES SHOW

Los Angeles, March 4.—When the doors of the Pacific Land and Products exposition, the latest enterprise of this city in the interests of the west, are opened on March 15 everything will be in readiness for the 200,000 visitors expected. For the first time the resources of the Pacific coast and Rocky mountain states and the west coast of Mexico will be thoroughly exploited. The scope of the land show is very

broad. Its plans provide for the advertising of the soils and land products of the west. No particular section will be favored. Colorado, northern and southern California, Utah, Montana, New Mexico, Arizona, Idaho, Washington, Oregon and Mexico will display their resources under conditions just as favorable as will attend those of southern California. Lecturers will explain the properties of the various soils and their products every day and night the show is open to the public. In many ways it will be the greatest educational enterprise the west has yet known. The value of the soils, how the best results may be obtained and where the most accessible markets are located, will be fully described. In addition, advertising literature will inform intending settlers where lands are, how to get to them and how much it will cost to establish a home or a farm. No essential detail will be overlooked in this great campaign of education for the benefit of those who are seeking to invest money in the west.

DEDICATE ELKS' NEW HOME SOON

Furnishings Arrive From East for Vancouver's \$60,000 Temple.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Vancouver, Wash., March 3.—Two carloads of furniture and fixtures from Chicago for the new Elks home reached Vancouver Tuesday. The work of installing the furnishings which cost \$10,000 will begin next week and it is expected will be completed in about two weeks, so that the opening and dedication of the temple will take place probably in the early part of April. The furnishings are rich and handsome. The furniture for the main lodge room is mahogany with plush upholstery, for the lounging and club rooms mahogany with leather upholstery, for the ladies' room mahogany with plush upholstery in the empire style of Louis XVI and the billiard room will be in oak. Everything is the very best, no pains being spared, nor money in the selection of the choicest pieces of furniture. When the Elks' new home is completely finished and the furnishings are

all installed, the building and its furniture and other equipment will have cost close to \$60,000. There are, of course, larger Elks' homes on the coast, but there is none that is more modern or more convenient or more handsome or complete in appointment and equipment.
