

GPSY SMITH WILL COOE; AUDITORIUM TO RISE FOR 8000

Cost of Meeting Will Probably Be \$7000, Which Churches of City Are Expected to Underwrite.

An auditorium seating 8000 to 10,000 people will be built especially for the Gypsy Smith meetings in Portland next November. The plan for the great building was approved at a meeting of 100 ministers and laymen at noon today in the Y. M. C. A. auditorium. A personal letter from the famous evangelist was read by Dr. William Hiram Foulkes, in which Smith stated that there was no place in the world to which he yearned to come so much as to the Pacific coast. It was finally decided that the Gypsy Smith meetings shall be commenced November 11, probably continuing until November 27. Smith will also lead great revival services in Seattle, Spokane, San Francisco and Los Angeles. Representatives of each church present pledged the congregation to bear its pro rata of the expense. Dr. Foulkes said that \$125,000 was to be raised to entertain the national Elks when they come to Portland in 1912. He said he thought the Gypsy Smith meetings would be important and much less costly and that the church people of the city should bear their portion of the expense gladly. Dr. Foulkes' remarks were applauded. He told of a personal meeting with Gypsy Smith and his father at their home in England.

Charles N. Womacott of the Gypsy Smith executive committee detailed a plan for having each church or individual underwrite the entire cost of the meetings. Dr. Foulkes said that the cost of the meetings, it is estimated, will be something like \$7000. Usually collections taken at the meetings, it was said, more than meet the entire cost. The capacity of a city's greatest auditorium is taxed and penitentiaries speak in a building holding less than 6000.

William M. Ladd, chairman of the general committee on finance, said that he would refuse to handle the prospective cost in any other way than by having it provided, or underwritten, that every cent would be assured. Dr. Benjamin Young, chairman of the Gypsy Smith committee, presided today and introduced the speakers. Dr. Young said the coming of Gypsy Smith to Portland would result in great good. On this tour Smith comes only to the Pacific coast. He will be accompanied by Mrs. Smith. Their traveling expenses will be divided among the five Pacific coast cities where he will hold revival meetings. Dr. Foulkes said today that Smith was coming to the Pacific coast at his own desire. He has engagements for five years ahead in England. His finances are conducted in an unusual manner, yet penitentiaries to the people to whom he speaks. A council of free churches in England has charge of the financial part of the work. Smith is paid a salary of but \$5000 or so a year. After the expenses of an evangelist, Smith is a city are paid out of the collections, 50 per cent of the remainder goes to the council of free churches and the other 50 per cent to the local ministerial association.

PROCEEDS OF LECTURE WILL GO TO CHINESE

Ben Selling, who is raising the fund for the Chinese famine sufferers, went to Salem this morning on official business. The fund was augmented yesterday by \$101 contributed by the First Congregational church. Rev. Luther R. Dyott, pastor of the church, expects that individual members of the church will make further contributions by check during the week.

A special meeting of the board of the First Presbyterian church was held yesterday morning to discuss what the church should do for the starving Chinese. It was decided that Dr. Foulkes, pastor of the church, should give a lecture on the Passion Play Tuesday evening, March 21, in the auditorium of the First Presbyterian church, the proceeds to go to the fund.

Dr. J. H. Cudlipp of Grace Methodist church announced yesterday that his congregation will take up the question of contributing to this fund some time this week.

FOUR CONVICTS FROM PENDLETON TO PRISON

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Pendleton, Or., March 13.—Sheriff Taylor and Deputy Blakeley left this morning for Salem, having in their custody four men convicted at the recent adjourned term of court and who were sentenced to terms in the penitentiary. The prisoners were Daniel Ragan, sentenced to five years for burglary in a boxcar; Phenev and Allen, sent up for breaking into a section house, and Christopher Columbus Taylor, sentenced to one and one-half years for forgery. Harry Luton, Indian, was sentenced this morning to a year and a half for stealing a horse, and William Brown drew an indeterminate sentence for burglary of a boxcar. Roy Neal of Stanfield was given four years for forgery, but has applied for parole, which will likely be granted.

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ARMY TO STAY IN FIELD ALL SUMMER

General Wood Declares That All Officers Will Visit Border Camps.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 13.—General Leonard Wood today declared that the Mexican frontier army would remain in the field all summer. "It is the first time we have had an army division in the field for a long time and we will make the most of the opportunity," he said. "It is the department's plan to have every general officer visit the camp before the maneuvers have ended. After General Carter has had two months of command, some other major general will be designated to succeed him. The brigadiers will also be relieved in turn."

Augusta, Ga., March 13.—After a 20-minute secret conference with President Taft over army mobilization affairs, it is reported, Assistant Secretary of State Huntington Wilson this afternoon denied there was any significance in the interview.

"I came to Augusta to visit my wife, who is ill," Wilson said. "I just dropped in on the president." Wilson also denied that the Mexican situation had estranged the president and Secretary Knox.

TWO NEWSPAPER MEN IN MEXICO MISSING

San Diego, Cal., March 13.—W. Dixon Van Blarcom Jr., city editor of the San Diego Tribune, and Harry Eiler, a reporter on that newspaper, crossed the Mexican line and went into Tia Juana, Mexico, in an automobile. They were expected to return last night, but had not been heard from at noon today.

At the American custom house on the American side at Tia Juana, it was said that they might have gone on to Ensenada, the capital of Lower California, but the theory was not generally accepted here.

COHN LOOKING FOR YOUNG MEN

Portland is the meeting place today of two of the owners of the Northwestern league teams—Joseph P. Cohn of Spokane and Dave Dugdale of Seattle. Ostensibly, the two baseball magnates are here to buy real estate. Cohn admits, however, that there is no bar to talking shop while he is in this city, so talk shop he will when he and Mr. Dugdale get together this evening on the latter's arrival from Seattle. Mr. Cohn, accompanied by his wife, reached Portland this morning. They are registered at the Portland hotel.

RALPH, AS SPEEDER, JUST COMMON CLAY

Having Ear of President Taft Does Not Save Him From \$35 Fine.

That getting the private ear of a president with a promise to deliver Oregon votes by wholesale and otherwise doesn't include particular consideration for the vote hunter, even when he burns up speed records and ordinances getting about his work, was demonstrated in municipal court today, when the national Republican committee failed to save Ralph E. Williams from a \$35 fine as part payment for harm done the city's peace and dignity when Mr. Williams speeded on Williams avenue last Friday.

When the case was first called Mr. Williams constituted his own representative in police court. Any apology he might have expected because Patrolman Sims had rudely interrupted his merry whirling at Union avenue and Skidmore street, was not forthcoming. Judge Tawell looked stern as he set the case down for March 13. He looked fully as stern when the case was called this morning. But Committeeman Williams did not appear, and the sternness was lost on Attorney John M. McCue, who, with a delegated meekness, pleaded guilty and paid the fine.

Fine weather brought the speeders out in fine style yesterday, but Motorcycle Patrolmen Sims and Evans were on duty, and their labors enriched the city treasury considerably.

R. R. Applewall was captured at Belmont near Fifteenth street by Sims and was fined \$25, but sentence was suspended.

George Clark of 156 East Fifty-seventh street was going 28 miles an hour at Hawthorne and Fortieth streets, and was arrested by Evans. He paid a fine of \$25.

Robert Johnson was captured by Evans at Twenty-eighth and Belmont streets and paid a \$35 fine. Pete Sorrenson paid \$35, and W. Rafter paid a \$25 fine.

Complaints have been made against numerous other Sunday speeders, and they will appear in police court tomorrow.

TEAMSTERS AVOID GENERAL STRIKE

Adams Express Men Make Their Fight Alone; Police Reserves Are Held.

New York, March 13.—The general strike of teamsters of New York, Hoboken and Jersey City predicted for today failed to materialize. Following a meeting of unions affiliated with the United Teamsters, it was announced this afternoon that a general strike would not be ordered at this time, and for the present only Adams Express employees are affected in the disagreement. Only 50 of the company's wagons were operating in New York today.

To prevent rioting police reserves have been stationed at frequent intervals in the downtown districts and strike pickets are kept moving.

TRAINLOADS ARE NOW ENROUTE FOR OREGON

Reports from railroad centers in the middle states indicate that the rush of homeseekers to Oregon during the coldest period will be far beyond expectations. The rush became effective March 10 and several trainloads of people are now speeding westward with others following them daily.

H. A. Jackson, assistant general freight and passenger agent of the Great Northern Railway company with headquarters in this city, stated this morning that every indication points to a very heavy movement during the coldest period.

"The movement has exceeded expectations," said Mr. Jackson this morning. "The overflow of the night of the 11th and morning of the 12th on our line required 13 extra sleepers. Great Northern No. 1 of the 12th from Chicago left in two sections and indications are that No. 3 will run two sections. Our correspondence and inquiries indicate that the majority of parties inquiring are bound for Oregon."

GOOD THOUGHTS COST GIRL \$1300

Obedying "Suggestion" to Loan It, She Goes to Court to Get It Back.

It was the law of suggestion, as conceived by "New Thought" followers, that Miss Jennie Elsner claims E. R. Charles, connected with the Electric Garment company, secured \$1300, which he has failed to pay, she says. The case is on trial today in the circuit court before Judge McGinn and a jury.

Miss Elsner and Charles were members of the same psychological research society in Honolulu. She said soon after they became acquainted, he asked to borrow \$300 with which to start in business and that while he asked only for this amount, he mentally suggested to her that he should have more. The suggestion was that the proper amount would be \$1300.

Since they had been friends and as it was the custom of the members of the society to wish each other good thoughts each evening upon retiring, she drew \$1000 from the bank and gave it to him. The next day, Miss Elsner stated, it occurred to her to have him sign some kind of acknowledgment. He signed two notes.

She stated that soon after receiving the money their friendship appeared to wane. The Charles family decided to come to Portland and she paid their fare. This was in January, 1907. However, before leaving, Miss Elsner said she had told a friend about the loan and he insisted that Charles pay the money to her before leaving the island. Since Charles did not have the money, Miss Elsner agreed to get \$1000 and give it to Charles, who was to pretend to pay the money back to her in the presence of the friend. This would allow them to leave for Portland. After arriving in Portland, the plaintiff said their visits grew less frequent and the money has never been paid.

WHO'S WHO, RIDDLE IN KARNOPP CASE

"I'm Not" Vehemently Says Prisoner as He Offers Witnesses.

George F. Karnopp, who is on trial in the municipal court this afternoon, accused by the manager of the Breslin hotel with collecting rents from patrons at the house without authority, and by G. Eweis with passing a forged check for \$5 on him, is bawling his defense entirely on the fact that he has been mistaken for another man, and that he is not G. T. Hubbard, who is really wanted for the various offenses. Since the arrest of Karnopp early last week the question of identity has puzzled the officials. The Breslin manager and Eweis say he is Hubbard, but Doctors Gillespie and Applewhite, who attended Hubbard several weeks ago when he applied to the county court for admission to the insane asylum, claiming he was almost insane from insomnia, both say Karnopp bears no resemblance to Hubbard.

All the alleged offenses were committed prior to a week ago last Sunday, but Karnopp insists that he was not in Portland at the time and had not been out of Spokane for six months. Mrs. Karnopp is here and will testify to that and Karnopp says he is prepared to bring witnesses from Spokane.

The state will have considerable evidence in the shape of hand-writing in which Karnopp's notebook, his signature on the hotel register and on the forged check figure.

MANAGER OF STRANDED COMPANY CRIES FRAUD

The case against C. G. Pulsifer, manager of a theatrical booking agency in the Marquam building, who was arrested yesterday by Detectives Helyer and Malone on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses, will be heard in police court tomorrow. Pulsifer was arrested on complaint of George Simmons, who complained that he purchased the management of a theatrical company from Pulsifer for \$100, but when he was ready to assume the duties of manager, was told that the "Love in the North" company had failed to organize, and was given the "Soldiers' Compact" company, which stranded in McMinnville after a one night stand.

When Simmons returned to Portland for a settlement with Pulsifer he was told that the company had stranded and that he was therefore not entitled to any return on his investment. Simmons took the matter up with the district attorney and secured a warrant. He based his charge on the allegation that he had bought an interest in one company and was assigned to another, and that when he complained of his treatment he was told the company in which he supposed he was investing never existed.

9 HOUR CASE LOST BY GOVERNMENT

Supreme Court Declares That Service Need Not Be Continuous

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 13.—The government lost its case against the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe R. R. for alleged violation of the hours of service law in a decision by the supreme court of the United States today. The government claimed that the railroad worked its train dispatchers from 6:30 a. m. to noon, and from 3 p. m. to 6:30 a. m. in violation of the law prohibiting continuous employment for more than nine hours, contending that while the actual time of employment was only nine hours, the men worked for a period of more than 12 hours. The court held that this claim was untenable.

JUDGE WOLVERTON IS ON LOCAL BENCH AGAIN

United States District Judge Wolverton returned from California today, where he has been sitting in the United States circuit court of appeals. Judge Bean is in Boise, Idaho, sitting in the United States circuit and district courts, and will be detained in Idaho from two to three weeks, according to a statement from the bench made by Judge Wolverton today. Decisions in federal cases heard during Judge Wolverton's absence in California by Judge Bean were read for Judge Wolverton today. Judge Wolverton stated that he had so many cases upon which to give decisions that he could hear only the most important matters in the next week.

TRIES TO STOP PLAY BY WIRE MESSAGE

Another chapter was added to the story of the quarrel between C. William Kolb and Max Dill, erstwhile partners in the theatrical business, today when Kolb wired to attorneys in Seattle requesting them to obtain an injunction restraining Dill from staging a play which Kolb says he wrote. The latter appeared at the Orpheum in Portland last week.

JESSE WADDELL IS NOT DEAD; DRUNK INSTEAD

Jesse Waddell, at one time a well known sign painter and tenor singer in the city, who was reported to have died some months ago at the hospital, was arrested yesterday for being drunk, and was lodged in the city jail. He was released this morning by Captain Siover. Waddell was at one time quite prominent in Portland.

WILD WEST SHOW IN CAFE IN PARIS

Gentleman From Missouri Becomes Chivalro; Shot With His Own Gun.

(United Press Leased Wire.) Paris, March 13.—C. R. Dunbar of Alton, Ill., was shot in the hip early today in a fight in the fashionable Cafe de Paris. The dining room was filled with after-theatre diners and a small panic followed the sounds of the fight and shooting.

Dunbar was with a woman, a member of an American vaudeville team. A man named Morris, who was dining near, with a Miss Leonard, said something to Dunbar's companion. Dunbar drew his revolver and fired twice. The second bullet entered Dunbar's hip when Morris forced his hand downward in a struggle for possession of the weapon.

600 INSURRECTOS ATTACK OJINAGA

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, March 13.—Six hundred revolutionists have attacked Ojinaga, across the border from Presidio, Texas, according to a dispatch received at the state department this afternoon.

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MRS. MELBER PUT BLAME ON LOVER

Detective Tells of Her First Words Following Arrest for Murder.

Albany, N. Y., March 13.—"Merciful heaven! If my little boy has been murdered, Fred Teller is responsible for his death."

According to McGuire, Mrs. Melber denied her identity at first, claiming that she was Edith James of Rochester. Later, he said, she admitted she was Mrs. Melber, and then charged Teller with being responsible for the murder of her son. Teller is the man she wished to marry.

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
