

SHADES OF MYERS HOME DOWN; CALLS ARE UNANSWERED

District Attorney Believes Him Still in City, However; The Grand Jury Will Probably Bring in Indictment.

F. N. Myers, the missing banker, will probably be indicted by the grand jury in connection with the failure of the Mount Scott bank at Lewis, of which he is president.

These deposits are said to have been made a day or two before the bank was closed by order of State Bank Examiner Will Wright.

The charge against Myers in connection with the Italian-American bank will also be taken up by the grand jury. An indictment in this connection will be merely supplementary to the warrant which has been issued accusing Myers of illegally accepting deposits in this bank.

"There is little doubt in my mind but that Myers is in hiding in the city," said the district attorney today. "I have been informed that he was here on Sunday. Myers could not possibly hope to escape the warrant which has been issued. He has a family and must take care of it. In doing this he cannot escape detection."

Members of the detective department are continuing their search for the banker, but have obtained no clue. He has a number of friends in the city and it is suspected that he is concealed in the home of one of them, the fact that he was not at his own residence at 681 Gilsan street having been established by the search made yesterday.

The shades at the Myers home this morning were down and there was no answer to rings of the door bell or telephone calls.

M. O. COLLINS ON PORT OF PORTLAND

Successor of Captain Crowe Is Another of Committee of Fifty's Men.

Governor West this morning announced the appointment of M. O. Collins as member of the Port of Portland commission, to succeed Captain Albert Crowe, who has resigned.

Mr. Collins is one of six recommended to the governor by the committee of 50, which, together with other Portland organizations, made recommendations.

Three of the members were appointed by Governor West, the three members of the old Port of Portland commission having so far failed to qualify. They are W. D. Wheelwright, C. F. Adams and J. C. Alsworth.

The governor has written each a letter urging him to accept the appointment and unless the appointment is accepted within a week the governor will feel it his duty to appoint others in their places.

"I think I'll accept the position offered by Governor West," said Mr. Collins when notified of his appointment. Mr. Collins is manager of the Hawthorne estate.

"W. D. Wheelwright says no persecution caused the resignation of Captain Crowe from the Port of Portland commission. I dare him or the Chamber of Commerce to put Captain Crowe on the stand to prove this," said Judge M. G. Munly today.

"Captain Crowe will not, I am sure, disclose the names of his persecutors unless required to on the witness stand. But I know that when he would tell some astounding things—Captain Crowe is the victim of the persecution of a commercial mafia."

Judge Munly insisted in a further statement that Mr. Wheelwright was not acting in good faith with the governor, inasmuch as he had accepted a commission on the new Port of Portland commission, and had then been one of the most active to prevent its becoming operative.

Judge Munly declared that "it is a conspiracy to Kierlanize the port of Portland." The committee of 50 will take action to lay bare the whole scheme, added Judge Munly.

In an interview with a Journal representative at Kalama, Wash., today Captain Crowe reiterated that the Chamber of Commerce had nothing to do with compelling him to resign from the port commission, and added that his reason for resigning was because of Wheelwright and Alsworth, who refused to serve with him, or to serve at all on the commission if he did not resign.

Judge Munly said that Captain Crowe's insurance business had been threatened and that in other ways his personal interests were menaced if he persisted in keeping the governor's appointment.

Judge Munly also, on behalf of the committee of 50, charged the Chamber of Commerce with having violated an agreement made with the committee. He said that W. B. Ayer, Henry Ladd Corbett, and Dr. Andrew C. Smith had conferred with the committee as representatives of the chamber and said that the old port commission of which C. F. Adams is president, would all resign, provided the governor were permitted to elect their successors, instead of putting them on an elective basis as the new port law proposed.

Jamison has played two years as forward on the team. He is Oregon's highest field point winner and was this year chosen in all selections as All-Northwest forward. He is a varsity and All-Northwest basketball player holding down the initial spot for the lemon yellow nine.

Jamison, also, is a member of the varsity football team playing in the position of left end, and a team-mate with "Brick" Michael. He is a junior in the department of pre-medicine, and a member of the Sigma Chi Fraternity.

The prospects for a winning team for next season are unusually bright. Only five of the varsity team will be in college besides all the members of the second squad. The varsity men who will return are Jamison (F), Walker (F), Simms (G), and Elliott (G). DUNNING DEMANDS MT. CALVARY LINE

Will Call for Revocation of its Franchise Unless It is Begun at Once.

"It is high time the United Railways company should be compelled to comply with the terms of its franchise and build an electric line to Mount Calvary. I shall introduce a resolution in the city council calling upon that body to revoke the entire franchise obtained by the company unless the Mount Calvary line is begun immediately."

Councilman G. D. Dunning thus delivered himself yesterday afternoon at the city hall.

"The company was to have completed a line of track to Mount Calvary more than a year ago, but has not done so. It failed to do so on time, and applied for an extension. The council granted an extension of one year and a further extension of 90 days, and still there has been no effort on the part of the present holder of the franchise to comply with its provisions."

"It is possible that the Oregon Electric company, which took over the franchise of the United Railways, believes that it is not liable to perform the work the latter company should have done under the franchise. If so, the Oregon Electric is badly mistaken. The city council has power to revoke the franchise on all city streets, and I shall ask for such revocation unless the holder of the franchise makes haste to construct the Mount Calvary line."

Conferences are still continuing at Calgary, Alberta, between the mine owners and the workers in the mines. The open shop is the principal point in dispute.
