LABOR LEADER ON LORDS' VETO FIGHT

Laborites Would Still Hold the Balance if the Nationalists Dropped Out. (United Press Leased Wire.) London, March 31.—Methods of attack upon the old time prerogatives of the house of lords were discussed today by Ramsay MacDonald, leader of the labor party in the house of commons.

The Irish party wants only home rule for Ireland. When it gets that, it is possible it will drop the fight against the lords. This, however, would leave the labor party holding the balance of power and compel the Liberals to treat with it.

"The parliament bill is the first step," said MacDonald. "Real reform is impossible so long as the house of lords is armed with the veto, with which to thwart the legislative efforts of the government. The Tories are attempting to kill the measure with amendments. The lords will oppose every attack upon them and the king will be

compelled to create 500 new peers to outvote them.

"King George, when Prince of Wales, was a Tory in his sympathies, but I believe he has tried to overcome his partisanship. If he should refuse to create the peers the present ministry must resign. The Tories could not carry on the government with the majority against them, hence parliament would need to be dissolved and a general election called."
