Hints for Sewing Room

Sewing machine needles may be used much longer if, when the points begin to get dull, they are rubbed on a piece

As good as a patent ripper is a steel erochet book, which will catch under threads, pull out bastings, etc., in double quick time.

When drawing from linen in hemstitching, save those long, even threads, as they come in handy when mending table linen.

Keep a pair of tweezers in the work basket and see how useful they are to pull out stubborn ends of basting cotton, particularly when the machine stitching has run over the bastings. Filling Window Boxes.

When filling window boxes one is confronted with the necessity of selecting flowers that are not only effective, but constant bloomers from the beginning to the end of the season. When one has several boxes, some are usually exposed to a hotter sun than others, so that the flowers selected must also not be too sensitive to sun or shade. This is quite important.
