

MEXICAN REBELS PROSPER; FUNDS BEING RECEIVED

No More Barefoot Marches,
for Now Everyone Has
Shoes, and Almost Every-
one Rides a Horse, Too.

(United Press Special Wire.)
San Diego, Cal., March 30.—No more barefoot marches under starvation conditions for the insurgents under General Berthold, for according to reports which came from the south today, they are living on the fat of the land and every man has a horse to ride and another to pack his baggage.

Confirmation of the Alamo attack and capture last Monday was received from Ensenada today. The rebels secured \$18,000 from Beltrán, the big merchant of Alamo. In addition to the money they get everything in the line of clothing and provisions that they wanted. All now are eating well and wearing new clothing.

Rebels Scouting.
Scouting insurgents are ranging through the country toward the port of Santa Thomas, directly west of Alamo. The port is 66 miles from Ensenada and has telephone and telegraph connection.

Ensenadans believe that the insurgents may seize the port and strongly entrench it and environs, so that they can hold it against the Mexican warship Guerrero, which is now at Ensenada. With sufficient entrenchments they could be safe from the shells of the warship and at the same time annihilate any landing party from the Guerrero.

With the port as a base and with ample supplies of funds, provisions, ammunition and horses, the insurgents in Lower California has apparently just started.

There is no doubt that Berthold will be chief in command, Ensenadans assert. Berthold's wife, it is reported, is with him. For weeks she has waited in cognito at Ensenada, knowing his plans better than anyone else and keeping the secret so well that the Ensenadans did not know who she was until after her departure for Alamo last Tuesday, the day after the capture.

Nothing is being done at Ensenada toward the retaking and relieving of the 800 citizens of Alamo. Only 100 soldiers remain in the capital city, practically all the force having been dispatched to Mexico.

MEXICANS THOUGHT TO BE GATHERING FOR PEACE TALKS

El Paso, Texas, March 30.—To allow those who have fought for the insurgents to have some part in the consideration of peace terms is believed today to be the purpose of the concentration of all available insurgents in northern Mexico near Chihuahua.

The fact that there has been no recent fighting around Chihuahua, is believed to mean that the insurgents are engaged in the selection of a new cabinet as an evidence of good faith on the part of the government.

It is also pointed out that in case negotiations fail, the concentration of Mexican forces near Chihuahua would result in an immediate movement against that city.

SCALDED IN BATH HOUSE, FILES SUIT

Ernest Wells Asks \$10,828
Damages From George
Hill, Proprietor.

For burns received from steam while taking a bath in a Russian bath house at 595 Front street, February 19, Ernest Wells has started suit for \$10,828 damages against George Hill, proprietor of the establishment. Wells has been in the hospital. With a party of friends he had been automobile riding and went to the bathhouse late at night. Wells alleges the steam used for the bath is generated by dashing water upon heated iron bars. The steam escapes in the room where the bath is lying on a bench. The complaint recites that the furnace was overheated, and the attendant inexperienced, when he took the bath. The steam was expelled in such volume as to cause burns of the third degree. Water also flew from the heated iron bars, and fell upon Wells.

There were some others injured in the affair, and a physician called. Treatment was given Wells in the bath establishment for a few days, but he was later removed to St. Vincent's hospital, where the best medical treatment possible was required to save his life. Others burned by the steam were treated in their homes.

Wells is 29 years old, and has been employed in a real estate office in the Abington building. He sets forth in the complaint his bill for medical attention was \$828. His injuries have caused him to lose \$10,000.

HAWTHORNE BRIDGE CASE GOES TO COURT

City Attorney Grant was given right yesterday by a ruling of Presiding Judge Gantenbein in the circuit court to maintain the suit against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company in the Hawthorne avenue bridge case. The company sought by demurrer to have the city attorney thrown out of the case.

Arguments were made by Frederick Holman for the company. City Attorney Grant and Assistant City Attorney Benbow representing the city. The suit was brought in the name of Attorney Grant in behalf of the city, and is to test the right of the company to use the new Hawthorne avenue bridge under the franchise for the old bridge. The old franchise required the company to pay the city \$130 a month, and the new franchise requires \$15,000 a year. The company is opposing this bitterly.

City Attorney Grant brought quo warrant proceedings to determine by what right the company used the bridge. The company claimed Grant had no right to bring such action. Judge Gantenbein held he had. The company asked for 10 days in which to prepare and file an answer to the original complaint, and this was allowed by the judge.

The company is now using the bridge by virtue of an agreement with Mayor Simon and the company officials that service shall be given, and the question of payment determined in the suit.

MARION GRAND JURY FINDS 6 INDICTMENTS

Salem, Or., March 30.—A Woodworth was indicted by the grand jury for this county today for an alleged crime against his young daughter, Della Woodworth. The indictment sets forth that the alleged crime was committed on March 28.

Fred Betchen and Mrs. Josephine Rule, who are alleged to have eloped from a town in Nebraska and come to Woodburn, the latter leaving her husband and several small children, were indicted for a statutory crime.

Indictments were also returned this morning against Willis McIntyre, accused of larceny from a dwelling in having entered the home of P. W. Brown and taken a pair of shoes; against Charles Lowe, on a charge of obtaining money under false pretenses; against G. Williams, accused of forgery; and John Wallace, charged with the larceny of a coat and a fountain pen, property of Howard Woodworth.

RUNAWAY TARGET IS SIGHTED OFF PORT

San Diego, March 30.—The naval target which was lost by the collier Glacier a few days ago, and which has been sought ever since by practically the entire Pacific torpedo boat fleet, was sighted near San Pedro harbor at 2:30 p. m. yesterday, according to a report received here by the government wireless station today. The torpedo fleet immediately raced toward San Pedro, but had not found the target this morning.

HOLTZMAN MURDERER SUSPECT NEAR DALLAS

Another faint hope of locating the murderer of little Barbara Holtzman more than two weeks ago developed last night in a report from the chief of police of The Dalles that a suspect was working on a farm in Washington about seven miles from The Dalles. Detective Coleman was sent to the place last night to investigate. The detective started on the trip into the country this morning, but will not return until 5 o'clock.

The description of the suspect tallies nearly with the man wanted.

IDAHO GOVERNOR SIGNS DEED FOR 10,000 ACRES

Boise, Idaho, March 30.—The deed from the state to the Payette Lumber company by E. M. Hoover, transferring 10,468.56 acres of state land in Boise county for \$108,214.84, was signed this morning by Governor Hawley and will also be signed by Attorney General McDougall.

The governor explained that the making of the deed was the only thing left for the present board to do, in view of the fact that the deed was made by the old board, and the act of signing the deed was purely a ministerial act. The deed is closed under the decision of the supreme court in the Hoover

case, to the effect that the board had nothing to do but compute the interest. The principal originally was \$104,665.60, and carries interest at 6 per cent from the decree of the court rendered July 10, 1910. The land board made the sale in the fall of 1909.

This land lies in the federal grants for the state charitable institutions, the normal school and public buildings. The supreme court decided that these lands are not "school lands," and therefore are not protected by the restrictions limiting sales.

ASTORIA BOND ISSUE OF \$18,000 WORTHLESS

Astoria, Or., March 30.—Eighteen thousand dollars' worth of street improvement bonds, sold in 1907 in connection with the improvement of Irving street, are now declared worthless, the city intending probably to refuse responsibility, in accordance with a committee report of councilmen Tuesday evening. The committee found the city had no authority to draw these bonds in 1907.

GIVES HIS VIEWS ON COUNCIL CREST DEAL

Portland, March 30.—To the Editor of The Journal—Regarding published statements of certain members of the park board in reference to negotiations toward the purchase of Council Crest during the latter part of 1910, I request in justice to myself and others interested to briefly state the following: It is easy for those not owning property desired for public purposes to talk of high prices.

The fact in this case is that the ownership of Council Crest endeavored repeatedly to dispose of the 25 acres comprising this property to the city at prices varying from \$25,000 to \$100,000. Scant courtesy and blank refusal was the result of their efforts. Like other high class property, values have greatly increased during the past four years. Council Crest is no exception. A lease was formally made to me following the city's refusal to purchase. The transaction was open and above board. The lease was recorded and publicly given the matter in the newspapers at the time.

"I did not lease Council Crest with the intention of disposing of my interests to the city or others. The property and lease are now desired for a great scenic park. I have been requested for and have submitted prices to one of the park commission, who stated to me at the time that the price was reasonable. These propositions were submitted

first, to turn over the lease at once in payment of \$50,000; second, to permit three more years' operations and payment of \$10,000, and last to permit four more years' operation, ending October 31, 1915, and payment of \$35,000.

As my net income for the first year's operation, 1909, was \$10,000, it is left to any fair minded person to determine the justice of being accused of trying to hold up the city.

I should be pleased at any time to take up any business like proposition to dispose of my lease to the city, and same will not be based upon any holdup game.
