

POWELL'S WIDOW, IN "SWEAT BOX," STICKS TO STORY

Confesses That She Knew Dr. Chisholm Well but Denies All Knowledge of Husband's Murder.

San Francisco, April 1.—Mrs. Blanche Powell today confessed to Captain of Detectives Wall a long and intimate association with Dr. Lewis Chisholm, who was held in Santa Rosa for the murder of her husband, John D. Powell. The woman made her confession after a long "sweating" at police headquarters here. Mrs. Powell, however, denied that she had any knowledge of the murder of her husband and maintained that if he had been killed for \$2000 insurance she is in ignorance of the facts.

Mrs. Powell was taken to Santa Rosa today by Sheriff Smith, where she will be brought face to face with Chisholm. Sweated by the police, Mrs. Powell declared that it was at Chisholm's suggestion that the \$2000 policy on Powell's life was drawn up with her as the beneficiary. She refused to explain why she made the first payment on the day Powell was killed, five days before it was due.

The woman admitted she burned the insurance policy on the day she was first taken to jail to confront Chisholm, at which time each declared the other to be a stranger. Mrs. Powell declared she burned the policy because she feared her acquaintance with Chisholm would get her into trouble and she did not wish to have any evidence about which might connect her with her husband's death.

John W. Powell was found murdered in a tent in Coleman's gulch, near Fort Ross, early in March. Two bullet wounds in the head were responsible for his death. A revolver was found near his body, but an inquest showed that either bullet would have caused death, making it impossible for Powell to have committed suicide.

Nurse Gives Clue.
Miss Venice Dean, a trained nurse, was responsible for Chisholm's arrest. She told the police that Chisholm tried to gain her consent to assist him in collecting an old insurance policy. When she refused to enter into the arrangement, she stated that Chisholm replied that he would get "Blanche" to assist him. This furnished the police with the clue that the murder was committed with the motive of collecting Powell's life insurance policy.

Several Sonoma county ranchers were then brought to San Francisco and positively identified Chisholm as the man who accompanied Powell when the latter applied for shelter at a ranch near Santa Rosa. Chisholm was also confronted by Mrs. Powell, the widow of the dead man, at the same time, but she declared that she had never seen Chisholm before. Chisholm was then lodged in the Sonoma county jail, where a charge of murder was entered against him.

In the meantime the police searched San Francisco for the mysterious "Blanche" whom Chisholm had mentioned to Miss Dean. The search proved fruitless until Mrs. Powell was identified. Mrs. Powell, who was arrested yesterday, was brought about by postal cards found in her trunk. They had been mailed to her by Chisholm.

Following a severe questioning the woman admitted that she was well acquainted with Chisholm prior to her marriage to Powell and frankly confessed that she was friendly with Chisholm for a long time after her marriage.

Sought Another Woman.
She stated that she left Chisholm six months ago when he became too friendly with another woman by the name of "Blanche." Mrs. Powell, who was arrested yesterday, was brought about by postal cards found in her trunk. They had been mailed to her by Chisholm.

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OREGON MEN BEAT STANFORD, U. OF W.

Stanford Beats U. of W. at Seattle; U. of O. Is Again Champion.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., April 1.—The University of Oregon last night won the annual intercollegiate debate from the University of Washington, on "Resolved, That the United States should adopt a system of ship subsidies." Oregon supported the affirmative.

Leon Ray, Oregon, opened the debate with a logical discussion of the question. He was followed by Raymond Clifford, Washington. Zimmerman, Oregon, followed and Hoover, Washington, ended the constructive portion of the debate. The battle of the rebuttal fell on the shoulders of Zimmerman and Hoover, who were the stars of the evening.

The debate drew a large crowd, showing that this line of student activity is gaining greater popularity with the undergraduates. The debate last night was one of three contests held under the auspices of the Pacific Coast Debating League, the University of Oregon and Stanford University. Each maintaining two teams, a home and a visiting team. Besides the Oregon-Washington affair in Eugene, Oregon met Stanford at Palo Alto and Stanford met Washington in Seattle.

Oregon was most feared of the trio, and so Washington pitted against her its strongest team in Hoover and Clifford. Hoover met Oregon last year and the year previous. He also represented the University of Washington in the tri-state Oregon-Washington-Montana oratorical contest, winning the event. He was a member of the intercollegiate wrestling team, last year.

Palo Alto, Cal., April 1.—A unanimous decision of the three San Francisco judges gave University of Oregon's debating duo, E. M. Collier and D. Mat-schenbacher, the debate over Eugene Tinscher and P. N. Wood, of Stanford, last night. Gustave Buchen, debate coach of the U. of O., accompanied his men here. The ship subsidies question was argued and Oregon had the negative.

Seattle, Wash., April 1.—University of Washington went to the bottom in the 1911 tri-state intercollegiate debating contests here last night. Charles McKinlay and A. R. Hilen losing to Stanford, while the school's visiting team was losing at Eugene. W. B. Owens and A. G. Bradford, of the Stanford men. A. R. Tittow, Tacoma. Judge G. E. Morris, Olympia, and Judge C. A. Easterday, Tacoma, were judges.

COAL LAND DECISION MONDAY; JURORS REST

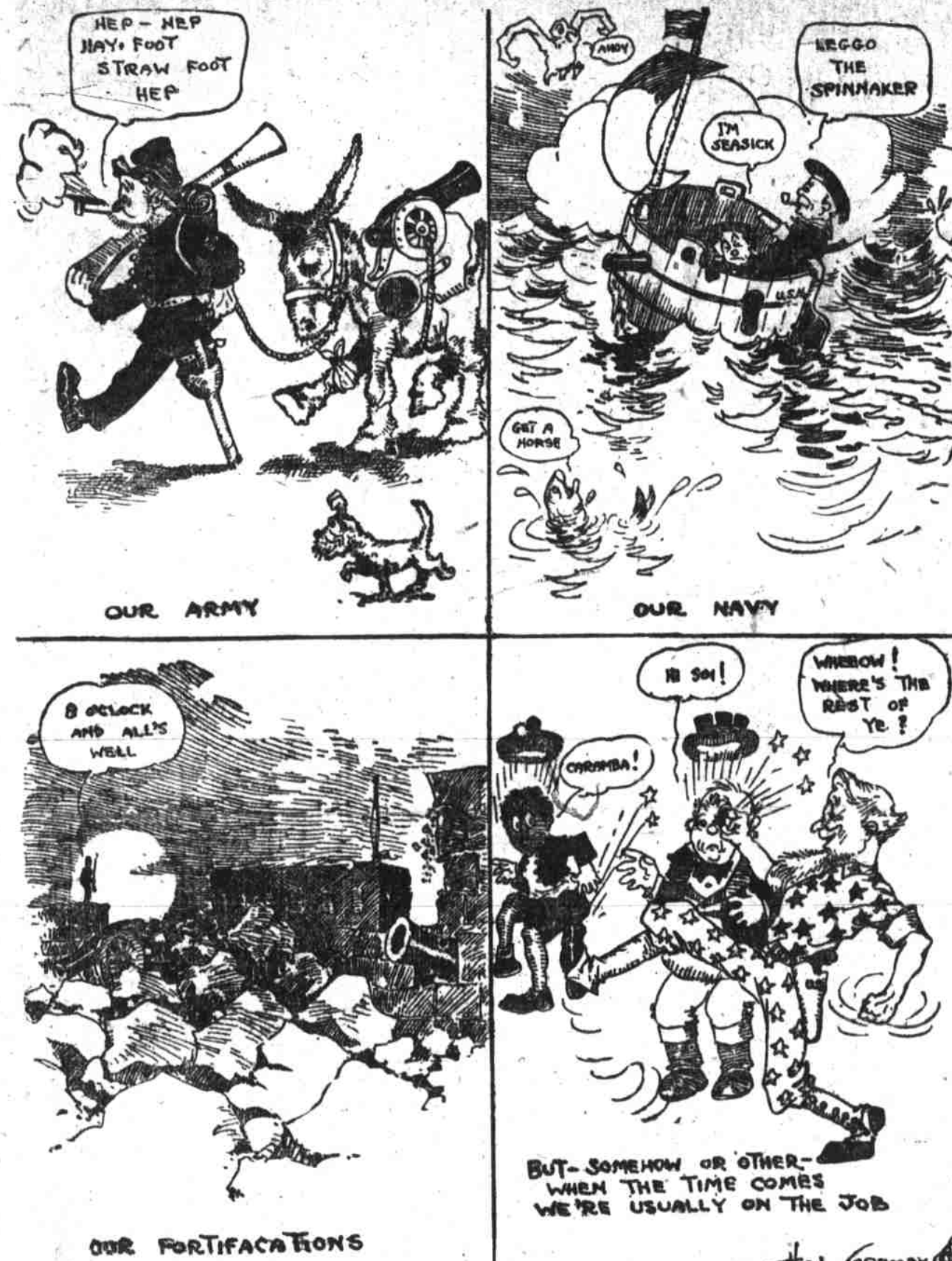
Yale - Harvard Debate.

MEDFORD IS HARD AFTER COLONISTS

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THERE IS ANXIETY IN FOREST GROVE LEST OASIS NEAR GOES DRY

Forest Grove, Ore., April 1.—Cornelius, midway between this city and Hillsboro, is in the throes of a lively municipal campaign, the main point at issue being the old one of "wet" or "dry." The election will be Monday, and not only is the "wet" faction of the town, which is in control, on the anxious seat, but quite a number of residents of Forest Grove are wearing a drawn look. This city is "extra dry," and the favorite place for procuring relief is this same Cornelius, being only a couple of miles distant, and the road being hard and smooth.

For several years the "dry" have lost but only a very few votes, and they are said to be even stronger this year. The tickets in the field for Monday's election are as follows:

Citizens, or "dry,"—President of the council, L. L. Hollinger; councilmen, W. E. Neff, J. E. Kilgore, F. A. Thomas, Charles Neep; recorder, P. E. Phelps; treasurer, H. S. Sturdevant.

People's ticket—President of council, A. S. Sholes; councilmen, C. B. Buchanan, Albert Bunning, J. A. Irmer, George Holscher; recorder, W. J. Massey; treasurer, A. S. Hendricks.

On the other side W. M. Green is candidate for mayor and F. R. Wetherbee for city clerk. G. D. Linn and A. B. Bell are running for councilmen. R. S. Bryson and Frank Reiser, incumbents, are candidates for city recorder and treasurer, respectively, endorsed by both parties.

The city several measures to be voted upon, including an ordinance prohibiting dogs from running at large on the streets; a \$25,000 sewer bond issue; a \$25,000 street lighting bond issue; the question of whether the mayor and councilmen should be regular salaried, and the question of creating a charter commission to draft a commission form of government.

The election takes place Monday.
