

SUNNYSIDE WATER FOR 57,000 ACRES

Sulphur Creek Wasteway Is Turned Over to the Government Service.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Sunnyside, Wash., April 5.—Delivery of water to holders of rights under the Sunnyside reclamation project began today, and officials estimate that more than 57,000 acres will be actually receiving water before the close of the season. The total acreage watered last year was 51,000. Water is available for an increase of about 13,000 acres this year, of which about half will receive it. Water was first turned slowly into the main canal at the headgates near Parker on March 22. The volume was gradually increased as the flow traveled, meanwhile men puddled the newly made concrete checks. By March 30 water was flowing from wasteway into the river below Prosser, 60 miles from the headgates.

At the same time the Sulphur creek wasteway, the second largest of six along the canal, running from a point east of Sunnyside eight miles to the southward, was turned over to the irrigation superintendent. The Sulphur creek wasteway, which is to serve as an outlet for a number of drainage projects as well as a safeguard against breakage in the main canal, has a total capacity of 515 second feet. The Zillah wasteway, the largest along the Sunnyside, having a capacity of 1100.

INTERURBAN RAILWAY FOR TWIN FALLS

Twin Falls, Idaho, April 5.—That there will be an interurban line in operation by the middle of the summer from Twin Falls to the Snake river is now assured. Negotiations have been entered into by W. L. Cherry and associates for the purchase of ties and rails for the construction of an interurban line to be built this summer from this city to the Snake river canyon.

Within this loop to be circled by the carline is about 6000 acres of fine fruit land, the most of which has already been divided into small tracts and set out to fruit, and which with the advent of the road will make a wonderful district for suburban homes. The Blue Lakes and Kimberly roads will be widened into boulevards and the tracks for the carline will be laid directly in the center.

HOMESEEKERS FLOCK TO REDMOND COUNTY

KENNEWICK BOASTS POWER HEADQUARTERS

Kennewick, Wash., April 5.—Kennewick has now in operation one of the largest distributive institutions in the inland Empire. The Pacific Power & Light company has established its central warehouse here. The company has nearly a quarter of a million dollars' worth of material in its yards to be distributed to points along lines in the Walla Walla, Yakima, and Columbia valleys. The payroll for last month amounted to more than \$15,000. The company selected Kennewick as its central distributing station because of its exceptional facilities for shipping in large quantities from near-by centers in Portland and reshipping to every town in which it operates in central Washington.

EASTERN SEEDMAN WANTS WESTERN PEAS

FRUIT GROWERS WILL PLANT 80,000 TREES

Dayton, Wash., April 5.—Eighty thousand fruit trees have been shipped into Dayton in the last four days, to be used in planting new orchards between Balleysburg, three miles east of here, and Huntville, seven miles west. It is estimated by nursery stock dealers that over 100,000 trees will be used this season in the Dayton country, representing the planting of approximately 1000 acres of new orchards.

BUILD POWER PLANT NEAR CASTLEROCK

Castlerock, Wash., April 5.—Collins & Byerly have begun work on a power development on Toulle river eight miles from Castlerock on the Tower road. They expect to develop 1000 horsepower, which they will market in nearby towns. About six months will be necessary to complete the plant. Work has also been resumed at Castlerock on the double tracking of the Northern Pacific and a large force of men will soon be at work.

CONSTRUCTION BEGINS ON RAILROAD BRIDGE
