Weather Conditions.

The Colorado disturbance has moved eastward to Missouri, and a new low pressure area has made its appearance over the central plateau states and a moderate high pressure area covers the east gulf states. During the last 24 hours rain or snow has fallen generally in northern California, the central plateau states, and in nearly all of the northern states east of the Rocky mountains. It is much colder in Wyoming and northern Colorado, and also in the lower lake region and Ohio valley. The temperatures have risen decidedly in Alberta, western Montana, and the New England states. Sharp frosts occurred this morning in Washington, Idaho and Oregon.

Conditions are favorable for fair weather in this district tonight and Friday, except in northeastern Washington and extreme northern Idaho, where cloudiness will increase and will probably be followed by showers tonight.

Small Blaze—Fire broke out this morning at 3 o'clock at 171 East Hill, Ingworth avenue in a store room that has been occupied by Case Bros. Grocery company, the origin of which is a mystery. The grocery company, which is moving to other quarters, had but very few articles in the store, most of which were either destroyed or ruined by the flames and smoke. But little damage was done to the building. Rats gnawing at matches that might have been left on the floor seems to be the only plausible explanation for the fire, for no one had been in the store room since early yesterday.

Juras was found while in the act of following the young woman and while he was in her presence she accused him of annoying her on several occasions.

Continuance Granted—The case of J. P. O'Brien, the general manager of the Harrison lines in Oregon, who was arrested Tuesday on complaint of Councilman Ellis, charged with laying tracks without securing a permit to do so from the city, will be heard in the municipal court on Saturday. The case was set for the morning, but another continuance was asked and granted. The charges are that O'Brien authorized the laying of tracks in Woodlawn addition without proper steps having been taken with the city.

Attorney Bower Dies—Attorney J. M. Bower, formerly in the law firm of McDougal & Bower, died in New York city April 1. He was well known in Portland, having practiced here for a number of years prior to his leaving for the east. He was the chief counsel for the Dundee Railway company. Attorney Bower left Portland about 10 years ago, and located in New York city. He was about 60 years old, and died from a cerebral trouble.
