

BALLINGER AIDED JUDGE HANFORD'S LAND COMPANY

He Wrote Commissioner Bennett to Expedite Patents for Federal Jurist's Irrigation Project.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Washington, April 7.—The sweeping decision of Judge Hanford at Seattle, relative to Alaska coal lands, recalls that on March 18, 1908, Mr. Ballinger, after his retirement from the general land office, wrote Commissioner Bennett asking him to expedite the patent to lands of the Hanford Irrigation company, a company of which Judge Hanford is a member and the man from whom the corporation takes its name. The letter appeared in the proceedings at the Ballinger investigation. It is also recalled here that at the A. V. P. exposition in September, 1909, Judge Hanford made a speech in which he bitterly assailed Pinchot and "his theoretical ideas of conservation."

Other data from the Ballinger inquiry appears on page 9 of the published proceedings in the testimony of Horace Tillard Jones, now of Portland, Or. Mr. Jones said:
"We went to Juneau, Alaska, for the original records in the coal cases of Christopher and Simmons, wherein it appeared that perjury had been committed, and also a conspiracy under section 5440 of the revised statutes; that you could make a case of conspiracy against the parties to defraud the government of its public lands. And I had a conference with Mr. Todd (federal district attorney at Seattle) and he told me it was useless to bring the matter up before the court because Judge Hanford was constitutionally opposed to land fraud trials generally, and he would not take action on the case, and that he (Todd) did not want to be humiliated by taking the case up with Judge Hanford, and he advised me to submit the matter to the commissioner of the general land office and have him confer with the attorney general of the United States and get the attorney general to direct him (Todd) to bring proceedings against these parties."
When called to the witness stand, Todd admitted having the conversation with Jones, but denied the portion relating to Judge Hanford.

Hunt Club Wants Road Rocked.

BREWER SURRENDERS SELF

over the return of Ellis Wainwright, millionaire brewer, to St. Louis after an exile of nine years, to face bribery charges, Ex-Governor Folk of Missouri declined to comment today on the case. The indictments against Wainwright were the result of Folk's "boodler" crusade in 1902, when he was circuit attorney in St. Louis.
"I do not care to discuss the case at this time," said Folk, "as Wainwright's unexpected return is a great surprise to me. I may discuss the matter later when I have had time to do a little thinking and refresh my memory on this particular case."

Folk received a telegram from Circuit Attorney Jones of St. Louis asking him to assist in the prosecution of the Wainwright case. Folk would not say whether he intended to accept.

Indicted for Bribery.
Wainwright was indicted in connection with alleged bribery to secure a franchise for the Suburban Street Railway company, which controls part of the St. Louis street car system.

It was the first of the St. Louis graft cases and involved, besides Wainwright, a majority of the members of the city council and the house of delegates, and Charles H. Turner and Henry Nicolaus, officers of the Suburban company. Eight persons were convicted and sent to the penitentiary and two others are still fugitives from justice.

The indictment was returned in 1902. It was charged that Wainwright was a party to a scheme to bribe city officials to grant the franchise, and that a fund of \$125,000 was raised for that purpose. Of this sum, evidence adduced at other trials showed, \$75,000 was to go to the house of delegates and \$50,000 to the city council. The money was loaned by the German Savings Institution on a note signed by Turner, Nicolaus and Wainwright.

Turner turned state evidence. Wainwright was away when the indictment was returned. Nicolaus was acquitted, the court holding that though he signed the note it was not proved that he had guilty knowledge of the purpose to which the money was to be used. The money was put in two deposit boxes. Delegate J. K. Morrill held the key to the box containing \$75,000 and Councilman Charles Kratz held the key to the other box, in which \$50,000 was put. Kratz fled to Mexico.

Morrill turned state evidence, and his testimony, together with that of Turner, resulted in the conviction of the councilmen and delegates who were sent to the penitentiary. At that time there was no extradition treaty with Mexico, and President Roosevelt secured the adoption of one especially that Kratz might be brought back.

Folk Tried Cases.

The cases were tried by Joseph W. Folk, at that time circuit attorney. There is no statute of limitations affecting the Wainwright indictment and he may still be brought to trial. However, a number of the principal witnesses are dead, among them Turner and the cashier of the German Savings Institution, through whom the original loan was negotiated. Other witnesses have removed from the jurisdiction of the court. If the case is brought to trial it will be prosecuted by Circuit Attorney Jones, a Republican.

Resides being a director of the Suburban Street Railway company, Wainwright was also president of the Brewing association. He was released today under \$20,000 bonds, furnished by three brewers.

LA FOLLETTE GOES AFTER TAFT WITH SHARPENED STICK

Bases His Argument on Lorimer Scandal and Declares Grave Doubts as to Veracity of President.

(United Press Special Wire.)
Madison, Wis., April 7.—Basing his argument upon the Lorimer scandal and the statement of Edward Hines, the Chicago lumber magnate, that President Taft, through, former Senator Aldrich, had asked for the election of the "Blonde boss" Senator Robert M. La Follette's organ, La Follette's Weekly, today goes after the chief executive with a sharp stick. In barely parliamentary language it declares grave doubts as to his veracity.

"When an eminent gentleman like Hines," says La Follette's organ, "swears to a statement of fact, it is to be deplored that his statement should be denied by the president."
Hines swore that he did what he could to have Lorimer elected, because Taft wanted Lorimer elected. This Taft denies. But Aldrich is silent. Should he see fit to speak, Aldrich probably would dispel the doubts Hines' testimony has aroused.
"It is also remembered that Lorimer in the senate made Aldrich the bell weather whose vote he purposed to echo. Those with good memories recall that Taft more than once, notably when the Kirby shorthand notes were produced at the Ballinger investigation, and again when the troops were rushed to the Mexican border, issued statements at variance with the facts. Perhaps he deemed it advisable to do so, and felt that the circumstances justified him, but it is difficult to see what are the circumstances justifying lack of candor in the present instance."
