

JAPANESE TREATY INTERESTS CANADA

Britain's Pact With Empire of Mikado Draws Attention of Ottawa Assembly.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
Ottawa, Ont., April 7.—Canada's interest in British treaties with Japan, is practical, inasmuch as for several years past it has been the policy of the British government to consult the dominion government as to whether Canada wished to be included in her foreign diplomatic engagements. In the house of commons yesterday there was accordingly a particular significance on the question which M. George Foster put to the government. He drew attention to the fact that a new treaty had been effected between Great Britain and Japan and asked if the government would inform the house as to Canada's position under the new pact. Mr. Fielding, the finance minister, replied that for the present Canada was not included in the terms of the treaty. The government was now considering whether it would be advisable to accept the terms of this imperial convention or enter into negotiations with Japan for a separate and distinct arrangement between Japan and Canada.

LOCAL AUTO CLUB NAMES NEW BOARD

Contribution Toward Kelso Road Is Made at an Enthusiastic Meeting.

As forecasted in The Journal last Sunday morning, but one of the old board of directors of the Portland Automobile club was re-elected at the annual meeting held in the convention hall of the Commercial club last night. W. J. Clemens, the vice president, was the one member to be re-elected.
Howard M. Covey, H. L. Keats and Frank C. Riggs of the Automobile Dealers' association, R. D. Inman, a former member of the board of 1908; John S. Beall, prominent good roads booster, Oliver K. Jeffrey, George Knight Clark and T. Irving Potter, real estate men and all enthusiastic motorists, and W. J. Clemens, who this year superintended the issuing of the Portland Automobile club tour book, form the new board.
That the members themselves favor a progressive policy was shown when, after listening to the appeal from State Senator Stewart of Kelso, Wash., they voted an appropriation of \$500 towards the completion of the road between here and Kelso. Besides making this appropriation a committee will be appointed by the president to take up the solicitation of funds for the further increasing of Portland's gift and it is expected that \$2500 will be raised.
The club was reported in a prosperous condition, having \$3219 in the treasury and having added a material number of new members to the list. The assets of the club total \$13,000. The retiring directors are Julius L. Meier, M. C. Dickinson, Elliott R. Corbett, F. B. Riley, Lewis Russell, Dr. Andrew C. Smith, W. B. Mackay and E. Henry Wempe.
