Weather Conditions.

A weak high pressure area overlies the North Pacific States, and another high pressure area of only moderate strength overlies the upper Mississippi valley. The barometer is relatively low over Texas, and a storm of decided character is moving down the St. Lawrence valley. During the last 24 hours showers and thunderstorms have occurred in the Ohio valley, and snow has fallen at a few places in Montana, Wyoming and Colorado. The temperatures have risen decidedly in the upper Mississippi valley and in the Middle Atlantic States, and they have fallen from 10 degrees to 30 degrees in the Ohio valley, Missouri, Arkansas, Oklahoma, northern Texas and New Mexico. Heavy frosts occurred this morning east of the Cascade mountains, and light to heavy frosts were reported at many places in western Oregon and western Washington. Conditions are favorable for fair weather in this district tonight and Saturday, except along the Washington coast, where showery conditions will prevail.

Open Offices Here—Two new names have been added to the Portland legal roster with the opening of offices by Jay Bowerman and C. D. McArthur, former speaker of the house of representatives and secretary to Bowerman when the latter was acting governor. Bowerman has moved his office here from Condon. McArthur formerly practiced law in Portland. While the two political associates are not law partners, both have taken quarters in the Yeon building.

Will Discuss Poultry—"The Poultry Industry in Oregon" will be the subject of a free public lecture delivered in the auditorium of the Portland Men's Christian Association tonight at 8 o'clock by Professor Alfred G. Lunn of Oregon Agricultural college. This will be the first of a series of five addresses on poultry culture by Professor Lunn, all of which will be under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. and the Portland Junior Poultry club.

Kid to Grand Jury—Jim Gernabos and Zass Golados, the two Greeks who made the brutal assault upon Policeman Nelson last Monday night in Gernabos' restaurant at 25 North Fifth street, will have to appear before the grand jury on a charge of assault with intent to kill. The two men were arraigned in police court this morning and made many excuses for their assault but in spite of their testimony, the men were held.

Shot Through the Leg—While Albert Creed and Ed Faulkner were showing Ench Fincher, a porter at the Rainier hotel, how to operate a new automatic revolver, a cartridge exploded and the porter was shot through the leg. Detectives Carpenter and Price arrested Creed and Faulkner on a drunk charge and they will be given a hearing next Monday. In the meantime they will have to raise \$250 bail each for their release.

Fire Damages Hotel—Fire which started in the basement of the Rhineland hotel at 253 Front street yesterday afternoon did about \$1000 damage before the fire department was able to gain control of the flames and for a time the entire structure seemed doomed to destruction. The origin of the fire is not known, but it is believed to have been due either to rats gnawing at matches or crossed wires.

Pledged anew to fight for the 1912 grand lodge, new officers of Portland lodge No. 143, B. P. O. Elks, were installed last night. K. K. Kubli, exalted ruler, spoke of the effort that would be made under his leadership to bring the Elks of the nation to enjoy the hospitality of Portland next year. A greater effort than ever before would be made, too, he said, to exemplify the principles of the benevolence, brotherly love, friendship and patriotism which are the basic beliefs of the order.

For the newly elected officers, the year will be big in honor and work. The certainty that an invitation, properly extended, will bring the national convention of Elks to Portland next year has spurred all to the utmost effort. W. R. Apperson, retiring exalted ruler, was elected delegate to the national convention this year in Atlantic City. Upon Mr. Apperson will devolve the duty of delivering Portland's invitation to the grand lodge. With the duties of the exalted rulership lifted from his shoulders, Mr. Apperson said he would find more time to seek additions to the entertainment fund which, with Sol Blumauer as chairman of the finance committee, has nearly reached \$35,000 on its way to the \$125,000 goal.
