

IDAHO BANKERS GIVE BAIL; OTHERS NOT YET ARRESTED

Eucalyptus Land Scandal Involves Six Prominent Men, Indictments Following Investors' Complaint.

(United Press Local Wire.)
Spokane, Wash., April 10.—Silence on the part of the attorneys for the six men connected with the American Hardwood company, indicted Saturday by the federal grand jury on a charge of fraudulent use of the mails, followed the return of the true bills. Neither would United States District Attorney Oscar Cain or any of his force make a statement regarding legal action that has placed some of the most prominent citizens of Idaho under suspicion. Attorney F. T. Post, representing Moss, Stanrod and Davenport, refused to make any statement.

A. B. Moss, banker and merchant of Payette, and D. W. Stanrod of Pocatello, banker, politician and former candidate for the United States senate, left early yesterday morning for their homes, after furnishing \$2500 bonds approved by United States District Attorney Cain. Don Davenport of this city, a broker, also furnished bonds.

Bench warrants are being issued today for the appearance before Judge Ruskin in the federal court of James Murphy of Butte, millionaire; L. B. Perrine of Twin Falls, Idaho, hotel and land owner, and P. S. A. Bickel of Juliette, Idaho, indicted on the same charge.

The indictments charge that the men made untrue representations in highly colored literature to promote the sale of stock of the American Hardwood company, a corporation organized to promote the sale of eucalyptus tree lands in Kern county, California. The indictments followed complaints made by investors.

Stanrod was president of the company, and it is alleged that he used his bank in the alleged scheme. Moss is a banker and Perrine and Bickel are prominent in irrigation schemes.

The trial probably will take place in Boise on a change of venue from Spokane.

United States senate, was found dead in his bathroom here at 2 o'clock this morning. He had been ill for months. alleged deals which preceded his election. At the first grand jury investigation in Chicago Link swore he knew nothing of bribery. Later, after another member of the legislature had confessed and when he faced a charge of perjury, Link admitted having received \$1000 to vote for Lorimer. He obtained immunity by so testifying to the state.

After his perjury indictment was withdrawn, Link issued another statement in which he said he had never accepted a bribe, but that the \$1000 received was a gift and had no bearing on the Lorimer case.

Not Affect Program.

Springfield, Ill., April 10.—The death of ex-representative Michael Link will have no effect on the progress of the alleged bribery in the election of Lorimer to the United States senate, according to the state senate investigating committee members here today. The committee men refuse to say whether Link had been summoned before them, but it is generally believed here that he was.

ROSLYN DISTRICT STRIKERS GIVE UP; SUPPORT LACKING

National Organization Refuses to Recognize Walkout, So 1500 Attend Sunday Mass Meeting and Yield.

with a chart of the building. In all probability, two or three men were implicated, for the strong box was too heavy for one man to drag. That the men were deliberate is indicated by the fact that a feast of oranges was enjoyed, leading to the belief that a third man stood guard at the door.

Probably Came From Seattle.

In the cold storage room was found a copy of a Seattle newspaper, bearing the date of March 9, in which had been wrapped the tools and the bottle of nitroglycerine.

When the door of the strong box was blown, parts of it struck the ceiling of the storage room so hard that large timbers were deeply dented. A portion of the door was found in a side of beef that was hanging near by. The walls and door of the storage room are thick and this prevented the noise from the explosion escaping.

Another Attempt Fails.

A futile attempt to rob the safe in the pawn shop conducted by Benjamin Garfinkle, 31½ North Third street, was made Saturday night, or Sunday morning. A new safe cracking instrument, which, as far as Captain Moore of the local detective force is the first of the kind to be used on the Pacific coast, was utilized.

The new safe opener is a long steel bar, sharpened along one end to a very fine edge. With this the back of the safe is cut out for a space large enough to permit the removal of the valuables. Detectives Day and Hyde in investigating the affair yesterday afternoon found that the back panel of the safe had been cut and the tool left in the basement of the building through which entrance was gained.

HELPERS FOR MARBLE SETTERS ON STRIKE

The helpers for the marble setters on the east wing of the courthouse went on a strike this morning. This necessitated the setters laying off today. Trouble arose over a demand of the helpers for \$3 a day. The contracting firm of Schenker-Blair company has the contract. The helpers organized four weeks ago, and gave notice since then that they would expect a raise from \$2.50 a day to \$3 a day. The company refused to grant it. One of the agreements with unions is that notice of a request for increase in wages shall be made three months in advance.

A meeting of the helpers and the marble setters is being held this afternoon to adjust the affair. There are six helpers and six marble setters out.

ORDERS CONNECTIONS TO SEWER SYSTEM

Plumbing Inspector William Hey has ordered a number of residents on the Hawthorne estate to be connected with the city sewer system. N. C. Collins, agent for the estate this morning, registered a counter complaint that the sewer crossing Hawthorne avenue is leaking, the seepage from it polluting the spring on the Hawthorne tract. The remonstrance of Mr. Collins will be investigated.

CHARLES A. WILLIAMS, SEATTLE TIMES, DIES

Seattle, Wash., April 10.—Charles Alfred Williams, aged 42, for 20 years a well known newspaper man, and a hero of the Minneapolis Tribune fire of nearly 20 years ago, is dead at his home here today. As a result of injuries received in the fire, where he stuck to his post till the last minute, Williams has had numerous operations, the last of them causing his death. He was on the editorial staff of the Seattle Times.

Boy Burns in Lodging House.

Bellingham, Wash., April 10.—Emanuel Andriadakis, known as Mike John, an 18-year-old boy, was burned to death Sunday morning in a fire that destroyed the lodging house at 1514 D street. Harry Merrick, rendered insensible by the smoke, was dragged to a window by his brother George, and both escaped uninjured. A fourth lodger, name unknown, escaped through a window after throwing a chair through it. Mike John and the two Merricks were bootblacks of the city. The dead boy was a clever amateur wrestler.

LAFFERTY INTRODUCES LAND COURT MEASURE

(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)
Washington, April 10.—Lafferty today introduced bills to eliminate from national forests all non-timbered lands and to eliminate from reclamation projects all lands not in prospect of immediate use; to create a land court in every land district with a court of land appeals in Portland, and in the enlarged homestead act to all semi-arid lands not susceptible of irrigation. He introduced a resolution to distribute irrigation funds among states in proportion as each contributes and to transfer from the federal government in trust to the states all national forests with a national commission to govern and see that terms are complied with by states. One bill is to permit commutation clause to apply to all entries.

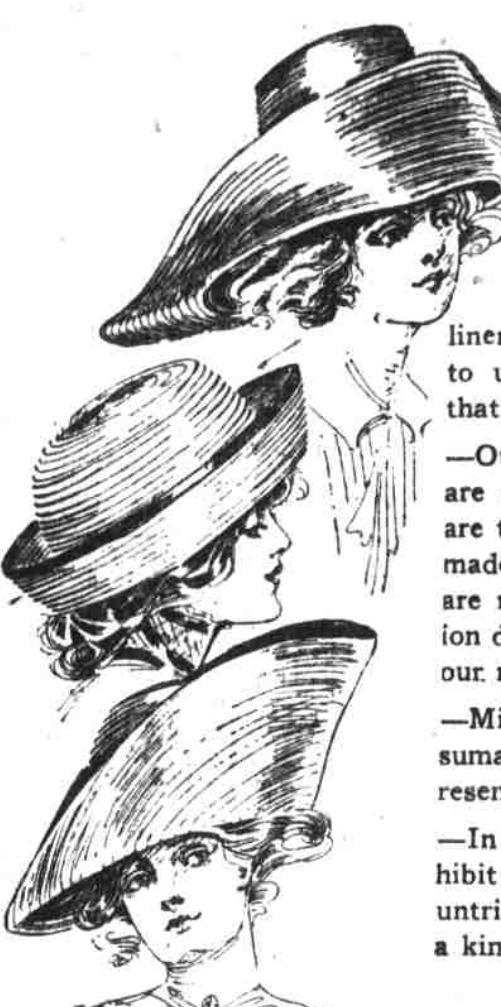

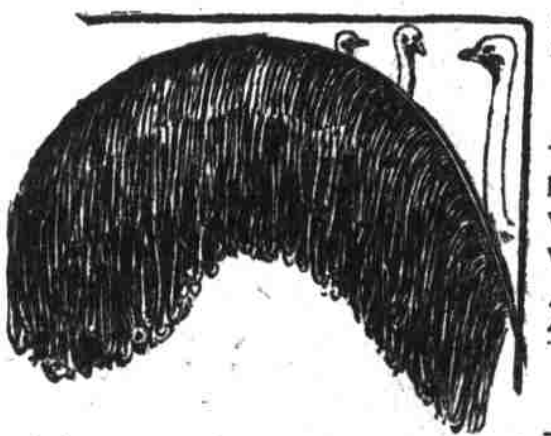
