

MILLIONAIRE SAID TO WANT "AWFUL" PORTLAND CLEANED

Burns Detectives and Paddy Maher on Gumshoe Search for Graft, Backed by Capitalist, Is Report.

The reason for looking the other way to clean up all places where gambling is going on, to close the resorts and to stop the sale of liquor in places where parties have no license, was not in any way the result of the threatened investigation of affairs by the private detectives from the district attorney's office. I do not admit in my order that such things exist, but I state that if they do exist I want them stopped," said Chief of Police Cox this morning.

"My ideas regarding the restricted district are liberal ones, and I am in favor of such a place under proper conditions. Remembering that it is a necessary evil, I have been somewhat lenient with the offenders when they have kept their proper places, but I have been informed that they have been taking advantage of the police department and that must be stopped."

The assertion has been made by numerous people that the order of Chief Cox yesterday was a warning to the offenders to get under cover, but the chief is emphatic in his denial of this.

Who is the mysterious capitalist who is hiring a score of sleuths to obtain evidence against the alleged violators of the city's statutes? Who is paying Detective Burns' men, who, it is reported, are carrying on a private line of investigation of the alleged grafting among the police and other city officials?

And last, but by no means least, who is Paddy Maher gum-shoeing for this secret, and at the same time, open crusade against the houses of ill repute and the alleged selling of intoxicants minus the required license? These questions are being asked by many interested citizens since the news of the proposed investigation leaked out.

Maher, it appears, is the man who, some few days ago, went to the district attorney's office and stated that he had evidence that somebody was pulling down a little "protection" money, that reports were running in various parts of the city, and that liquor was being sold without the necessary license being in evidence.

He was told that if he would produce the evidence it would be placed in the hands of the grand jury, and Maher went out, presumably to acquire more evidence.

Still, that doesn't answer the question: Who is the capitalist? It doesn't tell who is the employer of Maher, who is supposed to be working for the county court. Nor does it answer the second query: Who is paying Detective Burns' men?

For the report, is in circulation that Burns—his of the land frauds fame, he of the Ruff-Schmidt embezzlement, he of the Seattle scandal—is on the job; that he has five or six—maybe a dozen—men at work, obtaining evidence of vice and corruption in Portland.

But Maher, it is stated, is not working for the district attorney, nor in conjunction with that office. An investigation will be welcomed at the county court, but Maher is not working for the ordinary mortal to properly catalogue Maher.

**SOME DISTRICTS NEAR
SPOKANE FEEL EIGHT
BELOW ZERO WEATHER**

(United Press Leased Wire.) Spokane, Wash., April 13.—Severe damage to the peach and cherry crops in the vicinity of Spokane is predicted by farmers, as a result of the frost of last night. The temperature at some points dropped to 8 degrees below zero. Farmers expect to get but half a crop of peaches and are even less hopeful of the cherry crop. For other fruits and products the outlook is gloomy. Most produce has not attained enough maturity to be seriously affected by the frosts.

**YAKIMA FRUIT CROP'S
FATE UNCERTAIN; HAIL
AND SNOW EXPERIENCED**

(United Press Leased Wire.) North Yakima, Wash., April 13.—With two nights of severe frosts, with a 20 minute hail storm on April 12, and a snow storm the next, the fate of the fruit crop in the immediate vicinity of North Yakima seems to be problematical. Growers are divided in their opinions about the outlook for the season. One orchardist says all his peaches are gone, while another finds his unharmed. The cherries and apricots are thought to have suffered and some damage to the pears is feared.

**BASSETT MANSLAUGHTER
CASE GIVEN TO JURY**

The case against H. H. Bassett for manslaughter, in which he is implicated in the death, last September, of Mrs. Frances Roberts, was given to a jury at 10 o'clock this morning. The case was heard in the circuit court by Judge McGinn. Bassett is accused of being responsible for the woman's condition, wherein Mrs. W. T. May and C. H. Francis were called to perform an alleged illegal operation. Bassett called the physicians to attend her. Her home was at the Cascade locks, where her husband now lives. She had frequently met Bassett, and they were stopping in Portland at the Baranoff hotel in the north end. The two physicians have also been indicted for the death of the woman.

STATE'S RIGHTS IS OLD-TIME THEORY

Cornell's President Says That Jefferson, if Alive, Would Change Opinions.

Charlottesville, Va., April 13.—"Jefferson, if he were alive today, would insist upon a strong, active central government for the protection of the rights of the public against consolidated capital," expressing thus his conviction that those have changed since Jefferson enunciated the doctrine of "states rights," President Schuyler of Cornell university, speaking at the Founders day exercises of the University of Virginia here today, went on record as an advocate of a policy of governmental centralization. He said:

"The framers of the constitution meant to organize a government of the masses, not of the classes. That is why executive privileges were conferred upon the president and the senate. Since that day the people have made the electoral college a mere rubber stamp and are gradually controlling the federal government."

"I see no immediate prospect of a return to a simple and economical administration of the government while a revision of the tariff may leave us with a diminished income to meet increasing expenditures. In the ground of financial necessity an income tax soon may become a part of our financial system."

**JOSSelyn ANSWERS
LOMBARD CHARGES**

President H. S. Josselyn of the Portland Railway, Light and Power company refutes the charges made by Gay Lombard, former councilman at large and candidate for the nomination of mayor, that he had been purposely misled into voting for the tender ordinance.

Mr. Josselyn has gone a long distance out of his way in trying to impugn the motives of a person for political purposes," said Mr. Josselyn. "There was nothing whatever covered up or mysterious in the proposed ordinance, and the law has now before the city council is exactly like the first in effect, except that it provides for a certain number of tenders to be installed each month, in accordance with the wishes of Mayor Simon, as expressed in his veto message. Neither the first nor present tender ordinance grant any rights to operate freight cars that is not enjoyed by the company in its east side freight yards, the exceptions of others to the contrary notwithstanding."

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**MEDFORD BURGLARY
EPIDEMIC UNCHECKED**

Medford, Or., April 13.—An epidemic of burglaries has broken out in the city during the past week, culminating last evening in the burglarizing of the furniture store of Weeks & McGowan, where much loot was secured. During the week a dozen residences have been entered and pilfered of varying amounts. The police have as yet not been able to secure any clue. Every tramp or vagrant found within the city has been given the "On your way" order, but burglaries seem to keep up without diminishing.

**REGISTRATION BOOKS
WILL BE KEPT OPEN
NIGHTS THIS WEEK**

Voters are taking advantage of the scheme of the county clerk in keeping the register open nights this week. Last week the daily record showed there were from 75 to 90 men registering. Since Monday the record shows an average of 200. Yesterday there were 230. The books will be open each night this week until 9 o'clock. This is for the city election this spring. All voters who have changed their address, or whose name is not on the registration books should register if they would become eligible.

**EX-CHIEF WAPPENSTEIN
WILL PLEAD SATURDAY**

Seattle, Wash., April 13.—Former Chief of Police Wappenstein has until Saturday to plead to the last two of four indictments issued against him. These charge the collection of \$1100 for protecting a resort in the restricted district and extorting \$2500 from the Pacific Coast Steamship company for protecting the docks. When Wappenstein appeared in court yesterday his attorney argued for a little more time to file demurrers.

Jury Allows \$7500.

H. L. Jackson, who sued the East Side Mill & Lumber company for \$7500 damages for the loss of an arm while working for the defendant, was today awarded that sum by a jury in Judge Gates' court.

Situation Is Critical.

Washington, April 13.—Insurrectos are threatening the west coast cities of Mexico and the situation there is most critical, according to a report today to the state department by United States Consul Alger at Mazatlan.

BENSON HAS GRIP AND IS VERY WEAK

Is Not at Present Dangerously Ill; Mrs. Benson Expects Recovery.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Redlands, Cal. April 13.—Secretary of State Benson was taken ill with grip a week ago, since which time he has been confined to his bed at his temporary home. He is not at present in a dangerous condition.

There is possibility of a fatal outcome owing to his weakened condition, but he is today a little better. The danger lies in possible relapse, in his weakness to rally from the attack Mrs. Benson says she is not alarmed, and expects him to recover, though she is anxious.

Salem, Or., April 13.—Chief Clerk H. H. Corey of the secretary of state's office says that Mr. Benson has been suffering from an attack of grip for the last month, which has gone rather hard with him because of his weakened condition after a long illness, but that there is no cause for alarm. Dr. Steinberg, who is attending to him, has been visiting to Secretary of State Benson at Redlands had been contemplated for the past three weeks. Mrs. Ruth Benjamin, mother of Mrs. F. W. Benson, died recently at San Francisco. For that reason also was Dr. Steinberg's visit made at this time.

**CONFESSES TO THEFT
OF MANY SUIT CASES**

**DUNLAP CONVICTED AS
WHITE SLAVE DEALER**

W. E. Dunlap was found guilty on five counts in the United States court today of violating the white slave traffic law. Dunlap was charged with bringing Mrs. Anna Renfro from Denver to Los Angeles, and thence to Portland, for immoral purposes. Dunlap was a witness for the government in the case, but recently attempted to shield Dunlap in her testimony.

The maximum penalty for Dunlap's offense is ten years on each count—or 50 years in the federal penitentiary.

FREE JOHNSON EASTER MORNING

Fighter Makes Eloquent Plea to Court—Will Be Released Sunday.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, April 13.—Jack Johnson's gift of gab today cut down his 25 day jail sentence for automobile speeding.

When the prizefighter was brought up in Judge Treadwell's court to be sentenced and fined \$100 for a former offense, he made a long plea for mercy. "I think I had enough of the jail, yeh heh, I don't like it no how," Johnson said. "I am sure I will do my best mind paying this \$100 if you'll only count down my term. I don't like to stay in jail over Easter. Can't you see your way clear, Judge, to turn me loose?"

Pleaded at Length.

Johnson pleaded in this strain at great length, making strong promises of good behavior if clemency were shown him.

Touched by the plea, and possibly with the season in mind, Judge Treadwell finally relented. "I hope you have had your lesson, Johnson," the court said. "I am sure I will do you good. I am told you have behaved well in the jail and with the hope that you will never appear in another police court, I will sign the order for your release at sunrise Easter morning."

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"Want to Get Out"

"First of all I want to get out! Then there will be plenty of time to look around and start something else. No, I have not decided to cut out flying. I'll like to go at some speed, but, believe me, I am sure I will do you good. Strong of the University club today wrote a letter to Mr. Beckwith stating that the club would appreciate very much to have an opportunity in assisting in arranging for the social entertainment of Governor Wilson. Mr. Beckwith has given him the assurance that the Commercial club will be glad to confer with the college organization in regard to the matter.

**SCARED HORSE SHIES,

FALLS DEAD ITSELF**

BRICK TO BE SOLD FROM STATE PLANT

Governor Finds Union Makes No Objection and Will Relieve Shortage.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Salem, Or., April 13.—Because of a threatened brick famine at Salem and the demand being made upon the state's manufacturing plant at the penitentiary, operated with convict labor, Governor West, who has hitherto refused consistently to sell brick made by convict labor, has now decided to sell from the state's plant. Before making this decision, however, the governor addressed a communication to the local Bricklayers' and Masons' union in regard to the matter, and a letter was received by him today, signed by Secretary V. A. Hueston and President George Vlasak, setting forth that the local Bricklayers' and Masons' union would have no objection to laying brick made at the penitentiary plant as long as there was no private concern in this vicinity to supply the demand. The matter was taken up at a recent meeting of the union. The state has about 1,350,000 brick available for the local market.

**ADmits TO POLICE HE
KILLED HOLTZMAN GIRL**

Declaring he was the man who had murdered the little Holtzman girl in Lower Albina last month and asking to be locked up, a man about 50 years old gave himself up to policemen Galbraith and Hepler this afternoon. The man gave the name of Jack Jones and was intoxicated when taken to jail.

In a general way the prisoner is said to answer the description of the fiend who assaulted the little Holtzman child and then strangled her to death in an east side rooming house. He was so concerned, after this time I'll bet a dollar or two that there's no hurry burning of gasoline for me. I've had enough of the jail hotel. Never, never again."

**BOY NAMES MOREHEAD
AS SLAYER OF MOTHER**

(United Press Leased Wire.) Tacoma, Wash., April 13.—Coroner Shaver is this afternoon holding an autopsy over the body of Mrs. James Buchanan, who, according to the story told by her 4-year-old son, was beaten to death with a boat oar by Roy Morehead at Gig Harbor, near here, late yesterday. Morehead is held in the county jail without bail.

The child was the only witness to the tragedy, and gave the alarm to two police officers who ran to the scene and saw Morehead taking away the pieces of a broken oar. Morehead denies that he struck the woman with the oar.

The tragedy is alleged to have been the culmination of a long standing feud between the families over the boundary of their land.

The boy says his mother went to the beach to drive up their ducks, and that Morehead, who had his boat on the beach, threw rocks at the ducks. Words ensued and then, the child declared, Morehead took an oar and beat his mother over the head with it.

Morehead came to Tacoma and went to the home of his father-in-law, J. B. Thompson, an ex-sheriff, and telephoned his whereabouts to the sheriff.

HENRY WITNESS HELD IN CONTEMPT

When Landlord Is Arrested Abductress Voices Disapproval.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, April 13.—For refusing to answer questions promptly, Peter Deane, a witness in the case of Mrs. May Henry, divorced wife of Albert J. Henry, the Seattle bank clerk, charged with having kidnapped her two little children, was ordered under arrest by Judge Morgan this afternoon for contempt of court.

Deane is the man who rented the apartment in which Mrs. Henry and her children were found with J. Foster Kelley, the Seattle banker.

Deane testified that he received \$200 from Mrs. Henry's attorney for the rental of the apartment. Mrs. Henry voiced aloud her disapproval of Judge Morgan's action in ordering Deane into custody and was herself threatened with similar treatment unless she kept quiet. Kelley, who is still held in custody, being unable to furnish \$2000 cash bail, was present at the hearing, but had nothing to say.

**PORTLAND DOCTORS
ASKED TO JOIN ARMY**

That there is something more than mere "Jingoism" in the news dispatches to the effect that the maneuvers of the United States troops on the Mexican border portend a possible struggle between this country and some other power for the possession of the Isthmus of Panama is the opinion of Dr. George B. Story of the city health board. Dr. Story this morning received a letter from the office of Surgeon General Torney of the United States, offering him a commission in the United States medical reserve corps.

"I regard this letter as being peculiarly significant at this time," said Dr. Story today. "It indicates to me at least that there is method in the war maneuvers. It shows that the government is in earnest and that a thorough reorganization of all branches of the army is taking place. The medical reserve corps is a necessary adjunct to war and it is being placed on a war footing."

"I shall decline the offer of a commission, however, as I can not afford to regard to the front on a practice expedition. Officers in the medical reserve corps may be called upon to enter the government service any time the war department sees fit to declare an emergency and I would not be disposed to give up my private practice unless actual service in the field was required. However, I would gladly respond to the invitation to join the reserve. I formerly held the same position that is now offered me."

A press despatch from Washington, D. C. today states that Dr. Edmond Avery Norton, of this city, was nominated by President Taft this morning to be a first lieutenant in the medical reserve corps.

**CAMPAIGN FOR OPEN
SHOP BEING PLANNED**
