

'OREGON PLAN' FOR NAMING SENATORS GOPHERS' CHOICE

Minnesota Legislators Pass Bill for Direct Election of Members of Upper House—Riot Marks Adjournment.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
St. Paul, April 19.—Amid scenes of the wildest riot the state legislature adjourned sine die at 12:18 o'clock this morning.
Representative Spooner attacked an alleged brewery representative on the floor, and the result was a hasty adjournment and the killing of 400 bills.
The senate yesterday passed a bill providing for the election of United States senators on the Oregon plan. The measure already had passed the house. A law abolishing capital punishment also was passed.

provement league, of which Dr. J. R. Wertheimer is president, just before the closed periods were announced, showed that the worst periods of traffic congestion were during the hours of morning and evening that were afterward scheduled as the close periods. When the government permitted morning closed periods the time was slightly changed, and not to the advantage either of river or transriver traffic.
It is said now, however, that to leave the draws open during the evening closed period—3:15 to 5:45 p. m. and 5:55 to 6:30 p. m.—would block the traffic not only on the draws, but hold all the cars on the loop included by Fifth, Washington and Third streets. This is because of the great increase in traffic, due to increased population.
Council for the county court expect to show, consequently, that the people who are delayed by open draws suffer to a much greater extent than the boats that are not permitted to pass through. They also expect to show that any delay now imposed upon the boats is not unreasonable, and bridge tenders have been authorized to open the draws whenever the delay to river traffic seemed likely to be more serious than to transriver traffic.

The court also expects to produce evidence from among the river men themselves that the draw bridge regulations are not injurious to the commerce of the port.

PROMINENT CITIZENS SIGN PETITION OF GEORGE H. THOMAS

George H. Thomas, candidate for the Democratic nomination for mayor, will file his primary nominating petition with City Auditor Harbur tomorrow morning. The petition contains the signatures of 400 registered Democratic voters, among them being the names of some of the most prominent Democrats in the city. About 50 more signatures may be added to the list today, so 700 names will be contained in the petition when it is filed tomorrow morning.

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upon the defendant's demurrer to the government's complaint. It is possible in case the demurrer is overruled—in other words if the government wins—that some evidence may be taken in the case and it may go to trial. This is unlikely, however, as few of the government's allegations are denied, the chief defense of the railroad being the length of time which has been allowed to elapse before the filing of the government's suit, while all of the legal points have been injected into the demurrer to the complaint.

Whichever way Judge Wolverton decides the case, it will be appealed, but he has given much time and careful attention to the opinion and it is highly probable that it will be reversed by the higher courts. The appeal will require probably a year and a half, so that it will be some time before the ownership of the land is finally determined one way or another.
The 45 suits against purchasers of 1000 acres or over of the land in the original grant are not involved in this proceeding, the government and the defendants having agreed to have these suits continued until after Judge Wolverton's decision on the railroad's demurrer.

Settlers May File.
It is understood to be the government's intention to retain title over all of the land in dispute for the time being at least, if the government wins the suit, although the appeal to the supreme court from a decision favoring the government will act as a supersedeas on the circuit court's action and will leave the land in the control of the company, not subject to sale, until the supreme court has acted on the appeal.
It would require either an executive order or congressional action to throw this land open to public entry should it revert to the government, so there is no chance for squatting or filing upon the land for some years at least. The greater part of the land is timber and will doubtless be placed in forest reserve.

reports received at the railroad offices here.
Burning of the Nacozari railroad station in Agua Prieta today by a small band of rebels was the only sign on the Mexican side of the line of activity by

the insurgents. Half a dozen of the rebels fired the station just after dawn and the great freight depot, filled with all sorts of goods, was entirely consumed before water could be laid down. All the incendiaries escaped.
Not a bit of reliable news is to be had here today of the exact whereabouts of the rebel forces which evacuated Agua Prieta or of the band seen near here yesterday, which is supposed to be that of Juan Cabral.
The latter force, it is believed, is secluded in the hills to the south and west. One band of rebels is reported at Cienzas Springs, 12 miles east of Agua Prieta, but whether they are part of the force which fled from the town after repulsing the federals is not known.
On the boundary line between Douglas and Agua Prieta today no bodies of American troops are patrolling. Colonel Diaz, in command of the Mexican federals, sent notice here today that the closure of the international line had been withdrawn and passage to all persons was free.

White Slavery Charged.
