The American ship St. Nicholas, the last of the vessels of the Columbia River Packers' association's fleet to go to the northern canneries, left the mouth of the river this morning, carrying a large cargo of cannery supplies and provisions and over 100 white fishermen and Chinese packers.

When a constable visited him with election papers he resisted. He was charged with disturbing the peace. His son, 12, who joined in the fight, was taken to the detention home.
