

BRIBERY CHARGED IN ELECTION OF WISCONSIN SOLON

State Senate Judiciary Committee Recommends Adoption of Joint Resolution Calling for Investigation.

(United Press Special Wire.)
Madison, Wis., April 27.—Charging that the election of Senator Isaac Stephenson was the culmination of wholesale bribery and other acts in violation of the corrupt practices law, the state senate judiciary committee of the Wisconsin legislature today recommended the adoption of a joint resolution requesting the United States senate to investigate "the manner, means and methods by and through which Isaac Stephenson secured his election to the senate."

It was freely predicted today that when the resolution comes up in the legislature tomorrow it will be adopted, although adherents of Stephenson are expected to do everything in their power to defeat it.

Incorporated in the resolution was a resolution that the United States senate start prosecution against the persons guilty of alleged corrupt practices in connection with Stephenson's election.

Governor Oglesby to issue writs for contempt against George M. Benedict, cashier of the Drovers' Deposit National bank, and for W. C. Judge Nathaniel Sears, Tilden's attorney, is preparing to seek a habeas corpus in Chicago to prevent Tilden's arrest. The senate has retained John J. Healey to force Tilden, Cummings and Benedict to appear before the bar of the senate.

Armed with the warrants for the arrest of Tilden, Cummings and Benedict, Assistant Sergeant at Arms Hatfield of the state senate started this morning for Chicago.

TURRISH SURPRISED ABOUT STORY ANENT LORIMER INQUIRY

"I was dumfounded when I saw that story in the dispatch yesterday," said Henry Turrish, the St. Paul lumberman, who is registered at the Imperial, referring to the statement of William H. Cook, a stockholder in the Edward Hines Lumber company of St. Paul, before the Lorimer investigating committee in Chicago, which he said "Edward Hines said that 'it is all fixed and Lorimer will be the next senator from Illinois,' and that Turrish was present at the meeting when Hines made the statement."

"But I can't say anything," continued Mr. Turrish. "Cook and Hines said to me and neighbors of mine and it would be suicide for me to give an interview at this time. No, I am not associated with Cook and Hines in a business way, only that we are in the same line of business."

Asked if he would not be called before the committee for the purpose of corroborating the testimony of Cook, Mr. Turrish said that he thought not.

"Look here," he said, "I'd like to give you fellows something, but I can't. Ask me anything else and it will be all right, but on that other question I have nothing to say; you can see how it is, can't you?"

"What do you think of the Lorimer investigation?" was asked.
"Nothing to say," he said, "absolutely nothing to say." And he said it from that time on.

The lumber business in Minnesota is improving," said Mr. Turrish. "The big operators control most of the timber, and there is plenty to last for many years yet."

Mr. Turrish expects to remain in Portland about two weeks, he said, and he feels no apprehension about being called before the committee.

such that the verdict was a general surprise to those who had followed the case, but it justifies the opinion of the United States attorney. It would seem that public opinion is so strongly in favor of closed bridges during the run hours that a conviction of the court ordering the closed periods is practically impossible.

It is understood the technicality upon which the jury based its verdict is that the government had failed to show the condition of the bridges as regards traffic at the time the boats had been delayed by the refusal of the engineers to open the draws. The federal regulations governing the operation of drawbridges allow a "reasonable" delay in opening and it was considered that this delay might be reasonable or unreasonable—dependent somewhat upon the amount of traffic crossing the bridge at the time the steamers signalled.

The closed period in the morning, which has received the sanction of the war department, will be maintained as usual, but the afternoon period from 3:15 to 5:45 will be abandoned.

To Modify Statute.

The county court will now center its efforts upon President Taft, the secretary of war and congress to secure a closed period in the evening. The following statement was issued at noon today by County Judge Cleaton and Commissioners Lightner and Hart.

"We regard the result of the trial as a great victory in the interests of the people of this city, and indeed we might say of the entire state. The effect of the verdict in a large measure indicates the position we have taken in operating the draws the traffic over the bridge is entitled to consideration as well as the traffic on the river. It is important, however, to point out to the public that the court in construing the federal statute differed in some respects from the views we have held and as we are all law abiding citizens we must respect the judgment of the constituted authorities and of course in the future we shall endeavor to keep strictly within the law as announced by the court. The court held as we understood it, that while we cannot prescribe rigid rules for closing the draws during any particular period, yet the men operating the draws are nevertheless vested with authority to consider the condition of the traffic at the particular time when a boat whistles for the opening of draw and if at that particular time the draw cannot be opened promptly with safety to the traveling public then congested at the bridge the operator has a discretion that he may properly exercise and refrain from opening the draw until he can safely do so, the condition of the traffic being considered."

Observe Law in Future.

"We will endeavor to observe the law in the future in the operation of the bridges in connection with the instructions of the court, as we understand them. This will, of course, prevent us from prescribing any rigid rules and while we feel and indeed know from the investigations we have made that some specific closing hours should be provided yet if people interested want such rules promulgated they must aid us in an effort to secure modification of the rules now kept in force by the war department, for we cannot and shall not attempt to disregard the statute as construed by Judge Bean. This is not only due from us as law abiding citizens but we are prompted thereto the more strongly because of the high regard and respect we entertain for the judicial learning and fairness of Judge Bean and the appreciation we have of the courtesy he uniformly extended to us at the trial."

ELLIS SEES PLOT BY PAVING MEN

Believes Petition Circulators Were Won Over and Induced to Testify.

Councilman Joseph T. Ellis hurried charges of fraud back at his accusers this morning. In an interview he repeated what it is said he testified before the grand jury yesterday, using these words:

"The effort to discredit my paving amendment petition is a plot of the paving companies who, I am sure, won C. A. Rowland and Charles Cleveland over to their side by some means and induced them to testify before the jury, as I understand they did yesterday, that I directed them to forge the names on paving amendment petitions."

"As a matter of fact I did not direct any of those names to be forged. I thought the names were being secured properly. I believe that but few of the names were forged. I believe Rowland and Cleveland was induced to testify that the signatures were forged in order to discredit my paving amendment."

"I understand that I am said to have been 'conveniently out of town' while the names were being forged. This is not true. I was called away on business. I. O. Naylor had hired me to verify the title of some land at Boise and this was only one of a number of trips."

"Everything," concluded the councilman, "that has been said to the discredit of myself or the paving amendment is false."

Ellis was before the grand jury for an hour yesterday. Following his appearance the jurors excluded District Attorney Cameron from the room and debated earnestly for some time. It is understood that they argued among themselves as to whether Ellis should be indicted upon the charge that he had guilty knowledge of the forging upon the paving amendment petition which he filed. Ellis said this morning that he took sheets with 40 names which were said not to be registered voters, and found that 27 of the names were legal.

The grand jury received this morning the evidence of F. L. Perkins, a newspaper reporter, who is understood to have testified that in his presence Ellis directed his solicitors to go out and get "phony" names on the amended Hickey petition and sell, then, the petitions.
