

MODERN PYTHIAS FORGES FOR SICK FRIEND; PAROLED

Princeton Graduate, Son of
Ex-Mayor of Cleveland, O.,
Gets Not Only Liberty, but
Job, at Coquille.

Marshfield, Or., April 28.—That he passed a forged check for \$11.62 in order to provide for a sick companion was the plea made by a fine looking young man in the circuit court at Coquille. The plea won him clemency from the court.

Mystery seems to surround the young man. He answers to Ray Brown but admits that is not his real name and is alleged to be the son of an ex-mayor of Cleveland, Ohio, and is a graduate of Princeton college. On account of his family connections he refused to give his real name.

"Brown" was indicted by the grand jury on a charge of passing the forged check on the Hub Clothing and Shoe company at Bandon. The story he told in connection with his plea of guilty was that he came to Coos county, together with two other companions. They were traveling on foot and were "broke." They were unable to secure work in Marshfield and went to Bandon where one of the three was taken sick. He needed clothing and medicine. Efforts to get employment were fruitless and Brown stated that he did not want to appeal to his father, so he told the others he would forge a check. He did so and claims that the money was used to get medicine and necessities for the sick man and to buy him a ticket to San Francisco. The other companion told the same story and the assistant district attorney, being unable to break down the witnesses, entered a plea for clemency, asking that "Brown" be sentenced under parole. Judge Coke complied.

"Brown" must remain in Coos county until given permission by the judge to leave and must report to the court every month. Fred Powers of the Smith-Powers Logging company arranged to give work to the young man. Brown is over six feet tall and has every indication of good breeding, education and refinement. DAIRYMEN ADMIT MILK SUPPLY BAD

Dr. White Deprecates Political
Motives Said to Actuate
Bailey's Rule in Office.

The dairymen who met at Gresham yesterday asserted that Portland has had a real "kick coming" against the milk supply. Not one of the 50 or more present representing most of the producers even intimated that the city's milk supply has been what it should be. Chairman Brugger of the meeting admitted that he with others have not measured up to the standard in equipment and cleanliness that was due the health of consumers, but that he was sure the sentiment among dairymen hereafter will be sufficient to put the uncleanly dairymen out of business.

The dairymen met at the call of C. E. Fritz to plan for the establishing of a cooperative milk selling agency, where the profits that now go to the dealers might be saved to themselves so that improvement in equipment and methods might be paid for.

Action Deferred.
After listening to a recital of the difficulties of delivery from John Lusher of the Portland Dairy association, they decided not to take action until after at least one other meeting has been held. A committee on investigation was appointed to report at the next meeting and it consists of John Lusher, C. E. Fritz, H. E. Davis, A. B. Conrad and H. G. Mullahoff.

The most startling address of the day was delivered by Dr. Calvin S. White, state health officer. He told the dairymen that the agitation in Portland for pure milk was not malicious or inspired, but was the outgrowth of evil conditions in dairying and delivering. He condemned the so-called pasteurizing of milk in Portland, saying it was all humbug.

Dr. White approved the dairymen's get-together plan and said the dairy industry had a great future if properly conducted, but poor administration of the dairy business in Oregon, he declared, is responsible more for lack of profits and prosperity than the agitation for pure milk and against the dirty and unhealthful product.
