Weather Conditions.

The barometer is relatively low in the Pacific states, and a high pressure area of considerable strength overlies the eastern United States. A storm of decided character is central over the Lake region. General rains have fallen in the Mississippi valley, and in Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, northern Texas, northern Louisiana and Arkansas.
 Conditions are favorable for showers in this district tonight and Tuesday, with southerly winds; and no marked change in temperature.

Cat Sets Fire to House—Fire at the home of Thomas Stevens, at 523 East Fourteenth street North, yesterday afternoon did \$1000 damage to the building and furniture before the arrival of the fire department, and the family cat, which is now reported missing, is responsible for the blaze. At 8 o'clock last night the family left the house for a nearby movie picture. The cat, which is a light brown tabby, was seen on the table in a frolic, and overturned the lamp, which exploded.

Woodmen Will Parade—The Woodmen of the World will parade over 3000 men today during the Pacific festival, according to plans made yesterday at a meeting of representatives of the various camps in Portland. It is anticipated that many members from the lodge in the larger Willamette valley cities will be present and help swell the parade. It is believed that nearly 4000 may be in attendance. Further plans will be made at a meeting to be held Wednesday night.

Judge Bean Extends Time—An order was granted by United States Judge Bean today granting defendants in the 45 Oregon and California land grant suits brought by the government, until June in which to answer the government's complaint or demurrer to the complaint. The defendants in these suits are owners of lands bought from the Oregon & California's grant which Judge Wolverton held last week was forfeited to the government.

Waverly-Michmond Club—A musical and literary entertainment is planned to be given by the Waverly-Michmond Improvement club Tuesday, May 2, at Waverly hall at East Twenty-sixth and Clinton streets. In addition to a general program of vocal and instrumental music several speeches will be made on matters of local interest by prominent residents. A large attendance is expected.

These included a gold watch, a silver comb, a gold bracelet and a scarf pin. A silver percolator was taken also, but was left outside the window through which entrance was gained.

Judge Wolverton at Bay City—United States District Judge C. E. Wolverton left for San Francisco Saturday night and is sitting in the United States court of appeals which opens in San Francisco this morning. Judge Gilbert of the circuit court, who has been dangerously ill, will go to San Francisco to assume his place in the court of appeals the last of this week.

Whiskey Stolen; One Man Arrested—Some time Sunday morning a saloon at 410 East Clay street was broken into and several bottles of fine whiskey taken. At 9 o'clock yesterday morning Frank Harold was found asleep in a yard at Eighth and East Clay streets with a bottle of whiskey of the same brand as that taken from the saloon lying empty by his side. Patrolman E. B. Webber happened along at this time and found the man and the bottle and both were sent to police headquarters. Harold had effectively disposed of all the evidence, a laundry charge was not made against him, and he was booked for being drunk.
