

ROSE SHOW GAINS FAME; ITS PRAISE SUNG FROM AFAR

Florida Newspaper Makes Special Mention of Fete—Many Foreign Lands to Be Represented Among Guests.

"Here is something that shows how the fame of the Rose Festival secures it advertising and commendatory comment in the far nooks of the nation," said George L. Hutchins, manager of the Rose Festival, yesterday, exhibiting as he spoke an article in the Washington Verdict, a little weekly newspaper published at Chipley, Washington county, Florida.

The tone of the article was fully as enthusiastic as if printed in Portland, for it reads:

"Old Oregon, originally that section of the northwestern part of the United States now including the present states of Oregon, Washington, Idaho and Montana, is without doubt one of the most wonderful regions in the world, and were it necessary to go to it alone very nicely as a little world by itself. 'Portland, the metropolis of the state, is fittingly named the 'Rose City.' The title is fairly descriptive, for everywhere in Portland one finds early in the spring until very late in the fall these nature beautifiers, blooming in great profusion.

Gala Occasion.

"They prove not only the fertility of the soil, but demonstrate also the salubrity of the climate.

"The festival of the roses held in June is the great gala of the year. The city is literally smothered in fragrant blooms, and the daily parades far surpass in beauty any of the pageants famous in history held in ancient times.

"When water courses were the only trails followed by commerce, Portland was born, and since that day, but without blare or bluster, has steadily kept pace with the progress of the times. A quarter of a million people is a fair estimate of the inhabitants living in and around the city."

Drum Corps Coming.

A. A. Tremp, general manager of the Astoria Centennial, called upon the Rose Festival management yesterday to tell about the completed arrangements for sending 60 of the Astoria Centennial Scouts' drum corps to Portland to participate in the Rose Festival parades and incidentally advertise the centennial, which Mr. Tremp says is now an assured success.

Ralph Hoyt, president of the Rose Festival association, received a letter yesterday from Rev. Edmund E. Mills, president of the Syracuse (N. Y.) Rose society, asking information about the festival, that he might include it in a book on roses which he is writing.

"Entries for the horse and vehicle and automobile parades of the Rose Festival are being received so constantly and in such great number as to indicate that they will be leading features of the festival," said Mr. Hutchins yesterday. Announcements of prospective attendance from every state in the union and from foreign countries are also in large number.

PAVING PLANT IS OBJECT OF ATTACK

Suit Started to Keep Initiative Petition Off the June Ballot.

Suit was filed in the circuit court yesterday afternoon to keep the initiative petition for a municipal paving plant off the June ballot. The action was brought by Tyler Woodward as a taxpayer, but it is generally conceded the paving companies are back of the suit. Lack of names on the petition is the chief point in the case.

Attorneys L. A. McNary and W. D. Fenton represent the plaintiffs. The complaint alleges the petition has many fictitious and forged names and lacks more than 800 legal signatures. It is stated the petition contains only 1876 names that are legally registered, and this is less than 15 per cent of the votes cast at the last city election.

The petition is also declared to be invalid in that it did not have a correct copy of the title of the ballot attached to each sheet for signatures. It is also alleged that the petition provided for a bond issue of \$1,000,000, and the passage of which will be a great burden upon taxpayers. The attorneys ask in the complaint for a temporary restraining order, but they did not go before Judge Gantenbein for the same. This will likely be asked for Monday and a date set for arguing it.

LANE COUNTY BOYS STEAL HORSES; CAUGHT

Moro, Or., May 6.—Two boys, aged about 18, whose parents are living in the Willamette valley, north of Eugene, stole two saddle horses from a barn near Dufur, where they slept last night. They were caught by Sheriff J. C. Freeman about 5 o'clock this afternoon, three miles west of Moro. They had ridden the horses over 40 miles while in their possession.

BOY AGED 12, FISHING, DIES IN MILL RACE

Roseburg, Or., May 6.—A boy, aged 12 years, was drowned this forenoon while fishing in a mill race south of Roseburg. He lost his footing while walking along the slanting wooden wall of the race and sank without outcry. The body was recovered.

CLEANUP WEEK ENDS MAY 31

Seven Days Suggested as Time to Get Rid of Rubbish in the City.

The seven days ending May 31 has been suggested by the civic committee of the Woman's club of Portland as "Cleanup Week" for the purpose of removing all rubbish and purifying the city in preparation for the Rose Festival in June. A strong appeal for all the organizations of the city to endorse the plan and the date is made by the committee in the following letter:

"Portland, Or., May 6, 1911.—In view of the approaching festival season, when it is expected that this city will be visited by thousands of guests from other parts of the world, the civic committee of the Woman's club urges upon every householder and property owner of Portland the crying need for a systematic and general cleaning up of the whole city before festival decorations are placed.

"The thousands of visitors will not content themselves with viewing the pageants and the gay decorations. They will note the condition of our streets, of our street cars, of our vacant lots, of our back yards. Their conclusions as to the desirability of Portland as a home will be based upon such practical details as these, rather than upon the temporary entertainment provided them. Let us build up our system of decorations upon the sure, safe and sane foundation of cleanliness, order and health.

"Our Rose Festivals have passed the experimental stage, and by means of the coming one, Portland should be conceded its rightful position as one of the most beautiful cities of the world. But no matter how appropriate or how carefully planned our decorations might be, if their background exhibited a lack of cleanliness and care, if slovenliness and indifference to health were the most salient characteristics of the citizens of this community, then, indeed, would our festivities be a mockery and our decorations a travesty on the natural beauties of our home.

"Let us devote the last week in May to a real and serious attempt to improve our material conditions. For the sake of the public health, a thorough cleaning out of all basements, both of private houses and of business or public establishments, should be the order of the day before the warm season is established. The typhoid fly would thereby be deprived of a favorite breeding place, and race suicide would be his only recourse. Vacant lots should be cleared of rubbish, the grass and weeds should be cut and removed from them. Furthermore, let us see what transformations can be worked by means of soap and water, fresh paint, earnest effort and a little money, combined with intelligent zeal for our city's good.

"We hope that your organization will endorse these suggestions for a 'Cleanup Week' May 24 to May 31, and will make an active, personal campaign in their behalf.

TRUST DEED MUST STAND SAYS COURT

Mrs. Moffett Cartwright Defeated in Attempt to Get Control.

The trust deed given by Mrs. Charlotte Moffett Cartwright to her son, James Peter Moffett, for the Moffett estate was held binding yesterday by Judge Gantenbein of the circuit court. The mother sought to break the deed given the son and recover absolute control of the property. The judge held that he found the deed was given in good faith and with a clear understanding, and should stand. He said the trial of the case showed no deception had been used by James Moffett. The amount involved aggregates about \$400,000. Mrs. Cartwright retains the income from the property during her lifetime, and at her death the property goes to the two sons.

WENDLING, OR., DEPOT LOSES \$160; NO CLUE

Wendling, Or., May 6.—The Southern Pacific depot at Wendling was entered by burglars last evening between 6 and 7 o'clock while Agent Beede was at supper, and \$160 was stolen from the cash till at the ticket window. Entrance was effected to the building through the warehouse and the lock on the outside door was broken. Sheriff Brown examined a number of laborers who had been hanging around the depot but no trace of the money was found.

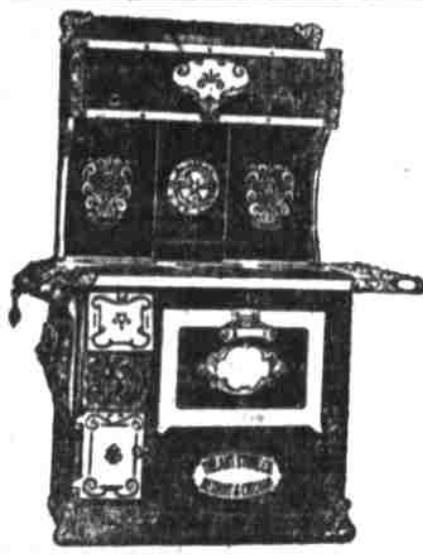
