from which it is hoped peace will come to revolution-ridden Mexico began here this afternoon at the quarters of Provisional President Madero.

"If President Dies quits," the rebel leader said to the United Press, "the rest of the tangle will be easily straightened out.

Judge Carbajal, the representative of Diaz, entered the conference smiling. "Peace in Sight."

"I believe peace is in sight," he said. "I received today a telegram from General Diaz fully authorizing me to act for him. This morning I signed a five days' armistice, which will expire at 11 o'clock on the night of May 22. This afternoon I feel that my signature to that armistice was equivalent to signing the final instrument which will seal the

Dr. Vasquez Gomez, Madero's chief adviser; Gustavo Madero, Alberto Fuentes and Gonzales Garza all participated in the conference with Carbajai.

Despite the expressed optimism of the rebel leaders and of Carbajal that peace is certain the gravest doubts are expressed by uninterested observers as to whether it will be easy for Madero to control his fighting men. His offi-curs make no secret of their dissatis-faction with peace at any less price than the actual assumption of the presidency by Madero

Distrous at End. Distress among the insurrectos is practically at an end. They are taking n about \$7000 daily from the customs here and talk far more of the beginning of the march on Chihuahua than they do of the peace plans. There is a general eagerness for more war, which is strongly fostered by the soldiers of fortune who have embraced the rebel cause. Only the complete and instant abdication of Diaz and the assumption of the presidency by Madero after a march on Mexico City apparently will satisfy the firebrands of the camp and before their arms are finally laid down there is strong probability of further fighting unless the hotheads are quelled with a

### **MADERO REMOVES CASH** FROM JUAREZ BANKS; ARMY TO BE PAID NOW

(United Press Leased Wire.) El Paso, Texas, May 18.—Partly in his character of conqueror of Juarez and partly in his capacity of joint dictator of Mexico with Minister De La Barra, which latter position is secured to him by the peace pact with Diaz, Francisco Madero today has taken into his own possession \$22,000 government money which was in the banks of Juarez and pay day for the rebel arm; is coming soon.

Madero's action in confiscating the government's money was practically forced upon him by his men. For days there have been reports of trouble in the rebel camp and in Juares itself outbreaks of the hungry and discontented men have several times been sup-

pressed with difficulty. Now, however, that the armistice has been signed, Madero is believed to feel ground more firmly under his feet, and he is expected to at once disburse sufficient cash to his troops to keep them steadfast until the agreement of peace with the federals is put into

There is great, satisfaction today among the rebels over the terms of the peace pact. The resignations of President Disz and Vice President Corral, before June 1, the assumption of a temporary presidency by De La Barra with Madero as a practical assistant; the fact that Madero will have a voice in the selection of nearly all the cabinet members-all these points convince the rebels that they are to get a square


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JOAN OF ARC OF THE MEXICAN REVOLUTION.

#### FEDERALS SURRENDER CITY AFTER DESPERATE BATTLE OF 12 DAYS


