With the final approval of the order of the coronation service, the rehearsals of the ceremony have begun in New Westminster Abbey. To the Duke of Norfolk, as earl marshal, falls the duty of "stage managing" the great spectacle. Under his direction the office of works carries out the actual arrangement. He has to school and train each participant in his role; he arranges and regulates all details of robes and dresses; he controls and directs the rehearsals; and on the great day is responsible for every item of the ceremonial. The sovereign himself is instructed and rehearsed by the Archbishop of Canterbury, assisted by the dean and chapter of Westminster. At the rehearsals the principal functionaries go through the duties in every day attire, with walking sticks for swords

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
