A further advance of a nickel to a dime is being generally considered by salmon interests over the prices recently asked for the spring pack of Columbia river fish.

Seufert of The Dallas is said to have sold practically all his expected pack to a New York firm on the basis of \$1.20 for haif pound fight as compared with last year's opening at \$1.10. Souter's pack generally consists mostly of half pound tins.

While only 10c advance over last year's opening is being asked and paid for pound flats, the same as for halves with sales of the former at \$2 compared with \$1.90 last year, an advance of 20c over hast year's figures is being asked for pound talls compared with 10c recently asked and accepted for initial shipments.

While no formal opening values have thus far been announced by Columbia river packers all but two packers are seeking the rise and quite a number of sales have been made at the higher advance. Warren Packing company is reported to have said two large lots to Armsby & Co. on the basis of \$1.20 for haif pound flats. The heavy purchases by this interest which controls practically the output of Alaska, means that the market is in better position to take this year's pack of Columbia river fish at the advanced prices than ever before. The heavier advance in the price of pound talls as compared with flats is due to the fact that canners are readjusting their basis. Heretofore it has been customary to pack most of the fish in talls and those that wanted a neater package, such as flats or a neater package, such as flats or ovals, were quite willing to pay the premium to get it. It is not figured that it cost only about 5c a dozen more to pack pound flats than for talls of similar size, therefore leading packers have decided to ask the higher price for the latter.

PEA MARKET DOWN AGAIN

Offerings From Local Points Are Very Much Better.

Market for peas is down again. Local offerings are much more liberal and while there is not sufficient stock coming from home places to fill the wants of the trade, the market is crowded with supplies on account of the liberal receipts from California. Sales of California are made at 4½ to 5c a pound while local sells at 7c.

GOOSEBERRIES IN PLENTY

Southern Oregon Shipments Gradually Increased.

Marketing of the gooseberry crop is well under way by southern Oregon points and receipts here are increas-ing. Best quality is offering at 8c a pound. Local stock is expected to ar-rive in abundance within a few days.

New local potatoes are expected in a limited way by the middle of June. The crop never looks in better condition than it does today. The acreage is larger than usual and the abundance of moisture after planting time has given the product a decided advantage over previous years.
