Gale Frightens Pets on Strathlyon. Which Arrived Here Yesterday: 6 Leap Down Funnel Into Furnace.

Frightened by the pitching and rolling of the steamer during a gale off the Aleutian islands, eight monkeys aboard the Portland & Asiatic liner Strath-lyon which arrived at Banfield's fock from Yokohama this morning, broke from their cages and six of them met their death, according to Captain Shaw The two remaining monkeys frightened one of the Chinese stokers so that he tried to jump overboard, as he thought they were the ghosts of departed coun-

Follow Leader.

When the Strathlyon was in 53 north a gale blew up and as the vessel rolled Low water, 11:27 a. m., -0.4 feet. about the monkeys in their cage under the bridge deck managed to break out. One big fellow, apparently the leader, made a break for the rigging on the foremast with five of the others folstay between the two masts he started along it, the others still following until the leader was over the funnel. There he was apparently overcome by the heat and gas from the smoke and fell from apparently heedless of the leader's fate, dropped one by one through the big flue to the furnaces beneath.

A few hours later one of the stokers ran across the other two monkeys in the bunkers and their chattering as he their gleaming teeth and blazing eyes, frightened him so that he ran from the Diego. bunkers and headed for the rail of the steamer, but was stopped in time to he ran he cried out that he was being regular run. pursued by ghosts. The two monkeys were captured and are now aboard.
