## Weather Conditions.

The pressure is increasing over the Pacific coast and the intermediate depression is now over eastern Washington. Montane showers and thunderstorms have occurred in Idaho, Wyoming, Kansas, South Dakota and southern Saskatchewan. The northwestern monsoon is moving slowly up the St. Lawrence valley and has caused light to moderately heavy rains in Tennessee, Kentucky, Minnesota and the Ohio valley. The weather is warmer in eastern Washington, eastern Idaho, Montana, Wyoming, Dakota, Minnesota and southwestern Utah; correspondingly cooler weather in southern Colorado, in the Ohio valley and eastern Kansas, southern and western Oregon. Except on the South Pacific slope in the Puget sound country and in the eastern lake region temperatures are above normal in nearly all sections of the country.

Conditions are favorable for generally fair weather tonight and Friday in this district, except that showers and thunderstorms are indicated for Idaho tonight. The weather will be cooler in the eastern Washington and northern and eastern Idaho.

**Fine Pictures Loaned.**—Through the courtesy of Louis W. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railroad, the Press club, the Commercial club, the Portland hotel, the Oregon hotel and the North Bank ticket office have come into possession of beautiful oil paintings of scenes along the Great Northern road. The pictures have been loaned to these institutions, but will be left with them. It is understood, indefinitely. The picture loaned to the Press club is a wonderfully true-to-nature painting of Lake McDonald, said to be one of the prettiest spots in America. The others are handsome reproductions of scenes that are acknowledged to be among the most beautiful in the entire west.

**Auto Thieves Escape.**—Two unidentified men stole an auto belonging to R. W. Wilbur, an attorney, which was standing in front of the home of Dr. Rocky, 788 Flanders street, last night, and made away with it, crossing over to the East Side. The police are not notified and two patrolmen located the machine on the Montavilla road. They fired two shots at the fleeing thieves and attempted to follow them in an electric car for several blocks, but the men in the stolen car ran it into a field and abandoned it, fleeing in the darkness on foot. They were not captured.

**Four Reindicted.**—Charles Barrett, Orville Caviness, E. I. Wheeler and James Whelan, who were reindicted for passing a bogus check to the Merchants' National bank, entered pleas of not guilty yesterday. The trial of Barrett was set for June 6. The case against Caviness will be heard June 12, and the other men will be tried soon after this date. These four men, it is charged, are implicated in the steamer Humboldt gold bullion robbery. They will be defended by Attorney Jay Bowerman, former acting governor, and Attorney John McCus.

**Woodmere Water Plant.**—The city water board today took over the Woodmere water plant, recently purchased by the board for \$50,000 from George W. Brown, president of the Woodmere Water company, and a member of the city executive board. Superintendent Dodge of the water department issued an order yesterday directing that water consumers of the Woodmere district pay their rates hereafter at the main office of the water department in the city hall, instead of at 106 Second street, as formerly.

**Vancouver Service.**—Effective Monday evening, June 5, 1911, and every Monday evening thereafter, until further notice, a steamer will be provided to carry passengers between Hayden Island and Vancouver, connecting with trains to and from Portland, maintaining the regular weekday schedule, while the ferry is undergoing the required weekly inspection. 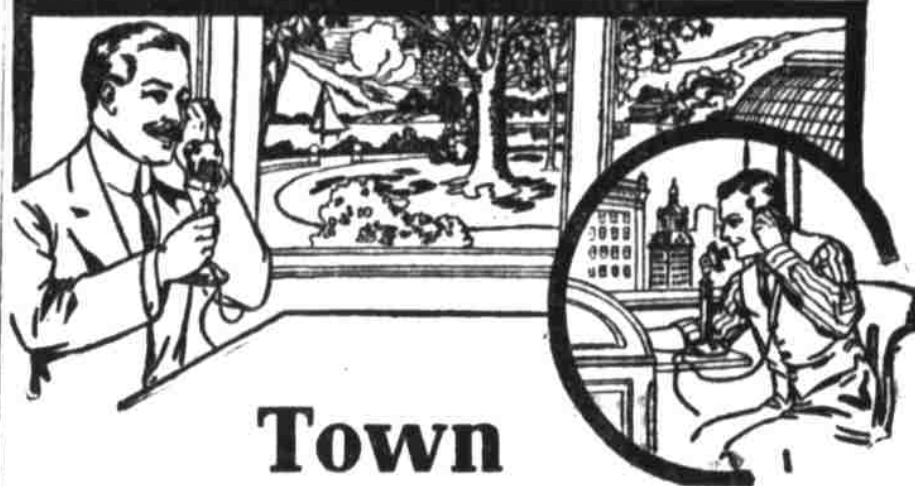
