Attrac-tive 'young women have consented to ride in the parade Tuesday morning and to sell tags during the day. At headquarters, Selling building, thousands of the tags are ready for sale at 10 cents each. They represent a baby peeping from a rose bud and constitute attractive souvenirs of the rose festival and the festival spirit. Mrs. D. C. Burns, president, and oth-ers connected with the Baby Home, have asked that the people of Portland and the visitors within the city show their generous disposition to ald misfortune and neglect this year as they have other years.

Many of the babies cared for at the nome are considered as deserving of help as is Teddy, the half blind Baby help as is Teddy, the half blind Baby Home waif, for whose education and care the kind-hearted people of the city have contributed more than \$400. The tag day parade will be led by the Oak Grove band of 19 little girls, directed by Mr. Armstrong and Pro-fessor Driscot.
