

URGENT LAW AGAINST FAKE ADVERTISING

Oregon Retail Jewelers Adopt
Strong Set of Resolutions
—Officers Elected.

As predicted, the feature of the fourth annual convention of the Oregon Retail Jewelers' Association, which closed last night with a banquet at the Portland Commercial Club, was the adoption of resolutions condemning fake and fraudulent methods of advertising. The resolution was given unanimous support and it was urged emphatically that a bill be introduced at the next session of legislature putting a stop to the methods employed by unscrupulous dealers to defraud the public.

The election of officers held yesterday afternoon shortly before adjournment resulted as follows: President, F. M. French, of Albany; first vice-president, W. F. Delechnider, of McMinnville; second vice-president, L. W. Bruns, of Portland; third vice-president, William Anderson, Oregon City; secretary, C. H. Williams, Condon; treasurer, E. J. Jager, of Portland. The election of the executive board, A. S. Huey, of Roseburg; member of executive board, I. E. Staples, of Portland. The election of a delegate to the national convention was left to the executive board.

The speakers at the banquet last night were: F. M. French, C. H. Williams, E. J. Jager, I. E. Staples, L. W. Bruns, A. Eisenberg, George Smith, E. C. McKean, B. F. Chapman, B. W. Freer, H. S. McCutcheon, H. S. Tutill, H. S. Butterfield and R. E. Fliske.

The convention was attended by about 200 jewelers from all parts of the state, but it was seldom that more than 75 attended the business sessions at one time, owing to the many counter attractions offered by the Rose Festival. The convention was spoken of as very successful in every respect. "We did not pass many resolutions," said Secretary Williams, "but one that we did pass will be given earnest attention. There is no use passing a lot of resolutions and then let them die the moment they are passed. The resolution aimed at fake dealers and fraudulent advertising will be given our closest attention until the time comes for the introduction of a bill before the legislature and then we hope to get the public support, because it will benefit the public. At present we have no law to protect the public against fake jewelers or fakers in other lines. We also need a stamping law. At present a piece of brass can be stamped 18 carat gold, and with impunity."

IOWANS REPUDIATE TAFT'S TREATY POLICY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Council Bluffs, Iowa, June 7.—Complete returns from the special congressional election in the Ninth district today increase the plurality of Judge W. R. Green (Republican) over W. A. Cleveland (Democrat) to 1480. "Regular" Republicans say the result indicates a repudiation of President Taft's reciprocity policy, while the progressive claims that few farmers voted. During the campaign Green spoke against Canadian reciprocity, while his Democratic opponent warmly advocated the adoption of the proposed treaty. Democratic leaders declare the farmers are disgusted with both factions of the Republican party.

Cotton Crushers Meet.

New York, June 7.—The annual convention of the Interstate Cotton Seed Crushers' association met at the Hotel Astor today with the largest attendance in the history of the association. Texas, Georgia, South Carolina, Louisiana, Mississippi, Arkansas, Kentucky, Tennessee and Alabama were represented by large delegations.

The feature of the initial session was the address of President B. F. Taylor of Columbia, S. C. Mayor Gaynor delivered an address of welcome and Vice President R. L. Heflin of Texas responded for the visitors.

Prominent speakers to be heard at the several sessions of the convention include Dr. Harvey W. Wiley, chief chemist of the department of agriculture; Judge Henry C. Hammond of Augusta, Walter D. Nash of Atlanta, Julian L. Brode of Memphis and Henry R. Towne, president of the Manufacturers' association of New York.

The Produce exchange and other commercial and industrial organizations of the metropolis have joined in making elaborate arrangements for the entertainment of the visiting cotton seed crushers and their ladies. This afternoon the visitors were taken on a sight-seeing trip around the city and harbor. Tomorrow night the convention banquet will be held at the Hotel Astor, with President Taft as the guest of honor.

BARBER RUSHES INTO ANOTHER'S SHOP, GRABS RAZOR, GASHES THROAT

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) Centralia, Wash., June 7.—Rushing wildly into the barber shop of Silas Parrott, in Centralia, yesterday afternoon, L. Miller, a Chinaman, seized a razor and inflicted a wound on his throat in an attempt to end his life. Before he could be restrained he repeated the attempt, and an instant later there was blood in every direction. Dr. Dumas hurriedly took up 12 stitches in a wound eight inches in length, barely in time to save his life. Miller was taken to the employees' hospital, where he has a chance for life. He is believed to have had private trouble and to have taken to drinking in his despondency. He was on the verge of delirium tremens when he essayed self destruction.

FRISCO TEAMSTERS MAY GO ON STRIKE

Make Demands for Shorter
Working Hours; Give Draymen Until July 1.

(United Press Leased Wire.) San Francisco, June 7.—George B. Renner, manager of the San Francisco Draymen's association today admitted that the Brotherhood of Teamsters had sent to his association a demand for a reduction from 11 to 10 hours per working day. The teamsters have asked their employers to grant the request by July 1. There are 2300 members of the organization employed here. If arbitration follows, however, the time limit will not be insisted on.

The demand has long been contemplated. The men now reach the barns at 4 a. m. and return at 6 p. m. They are allowed 10 minutes for lunch. A strike, it is understood, is contemplated if the demand is not granted.

TECHNICITY MAY DELAY ADMITTANCE

(United Press Leased Wire.) Columbus, Ohio, June 7.—A legal technicality may postpone for two years the admittance to the bar of Robert A. Taft, son of President Taft who expected to take his bar examination today. Young Taft was unfamiliar with the rule requiring students to register when they begin their study of the law. Because of this failure on his part, the examination was denied him today and he may have to wait two years.

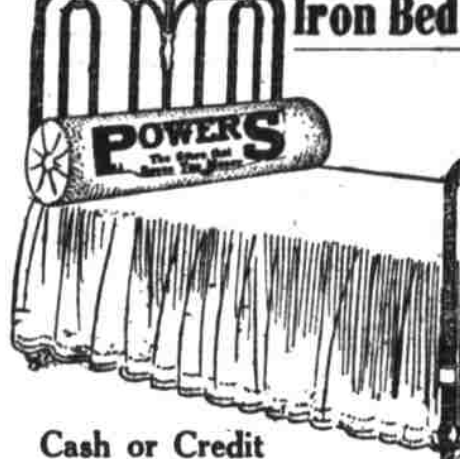

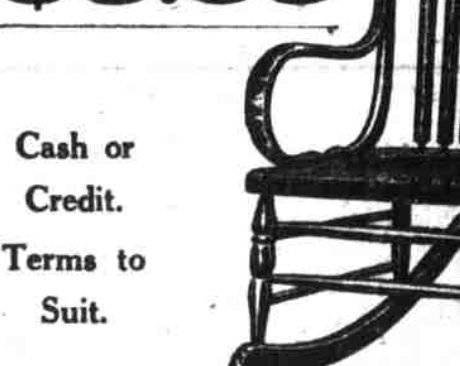

SOUTH HAD RIGHT TO SECEDE SAYS BAILEY

(United Press Leased Wire.) Washington, June 7.—Considerable talk has been created, particularly in G. A. R. circles, by the statement of Senator Joseph W. Bailey before Confederate veterans celebrating the birthday of Jefferson Davis, that the southern states had a right to secede.

"The truth of history was with the Confederates," declared Bailey. "The fathers never would have formed this union if they had not believed it could be dissolved for cause. If the southern people believed they could not remain in the union with honor and safety, they had a right to secede."

Bailey declared that Davis was less responsible for the conflict than any other man and the last man to abandon hope that it might be averted. He introduced Joseph A. Jones, Davis' body servant, an aged negro, whom, he said, "knows where the seal of the Confederacy is but won't tell."

PITTSBURG'S 38 SOLONS GIVEN A WHITEWASHING

Interior Fruit Shipments.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., June 7.—Large shipments of Dalles strawberries and cherries are being made daily to central Oregon cities. Three hundred crates of berries were shipped in one day last week to Madras. Warm weather in the last week has ripened the cherry crop and picking has been going on for several days.

DALLES ENGINEER IS REINSTATED

Councilmanic Charges Un-
seat L. T. Boyle for Only
a Few Days.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.) The Dalles, Or., June 7.—City Engineer L. T. Boyle was reinstated yesterday after a special meeting of the city council, held to consider charges brought against Boyle by members of the council, particularly by Councilmen L. A. Schanno and J. M. McInerney. The engineer was charged with working for private individuals and firms while, at the same time, he was paid by the city. It was further charged that he appropriated money received for this outside work for his own use. Boyle contended that he had worked overtime for the city more than enough to balance the matter and that much of the work for private concerns was done on Sundays and holidays. Witnesses were produced to carry out Mr. Boyle's statements and he was reinstated by the city body. Temporary removal was made by the council at a meeting Saturday night.

Business of Dalles Firms Grows.

Pease company, incorporated, large merchants of this city, will double its floor space. ment dealer, has secured a lease on the building formerly occupied by the O. K. Livery stable, and is having alterations made to increase the floor space of this business.

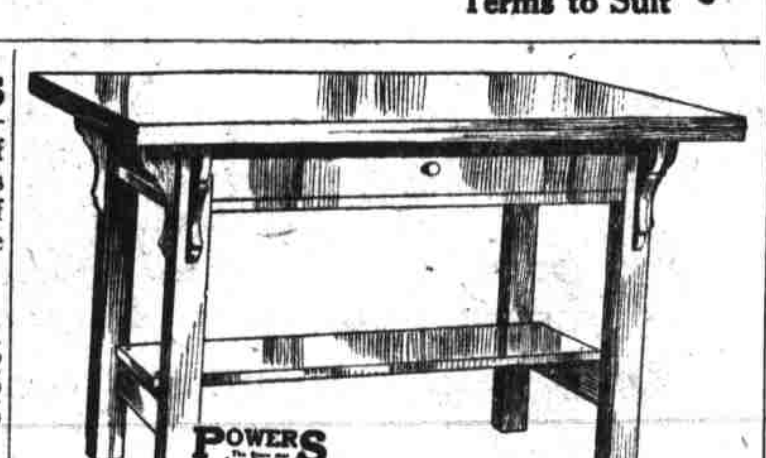
