

CITIZEN MADERO TAKES UP WORK OF RECONSTRUCTION

"Bullet-Work Over," Says Conqueror; "Now Comes the Hardest Part of the Work—the Brain Work."

Mexico City, Mex., June 8.—While the municipal authorities were burying the dead, caring for the injured and clearing away the debris of yesterday's earthquake, Francisco I. Madero, Jr., head of the revolutionary party, who arrived on the heels of the disaster which visited Mexico City, paying little heed to the suffering about him, planned the work of the government he hopes to establish.

With the thundering "Vivas" that greeted his entrance still echoing in the streets today, Madero plunged into the work of constructive statesmanship.

Statement of Plans.
Today he gave the following exclusive outline of his plans to a staff correspondent of the United Press, who had accompanied him from Juarez to the capital:

"The bullet work is over," said Madero, "and now comes the hardest part of the work—the brain work. Now we must reconstruct and improve the public. We must improve the public schools, in fact, we must overturn the whole school system of Mexico. To Vasquez Gomez this duty has been assigned."

Suddenly changing the subject of his interview Madero turned to the approaching presidential election.

"I shall not campaign for the presidency," he said, "I will let the people campaign for me."

"American and foreign capital will always be welcome in Mexico. My triumphal trip through Mexico has shown me that the people understand the problems we are facing. I shall always favor universal suffrage."

"This revolution has cost me \$500,000, and not a single cent of American money was represented in this sum."

Time for Serious Work.

"I think the time has now come when Mexico once more may get down to serious work."

Authorities here today made efforts to get in touch with the districts south and southwest of Mexico City. Wires are still down and communication is practically cut off. Reports have been received placing a heavy death toll in the larger towns and villages in this district. The destruction, these advisers say, has been heavy. However, no positive confirmation of these reports is as yet obtainable. In the city itself estimates today place the number of dead at 15. Two hundred injured are in the hospitals. That the death list may increase as the search of the ruins continues is generally believed.

Soldiers in the Santa Maria district are today razing the tottering ruins of homes and shops to prevent further loss of life.

FOUR ARRESTED FOR PLOT AGAINST MADERO; ONE IS OLD OFFENDER

El Paso, Texas, June 8.—That a plot against the Madero regime formed by the Magon branch of the Mexican Liberal party has been discovered, was intimated here today following the arrest of Thomas Yarram, Prillano Silva and his sons, Benjamin and Reuben Silva, on information furnished by secret agents of the Mexican and American governments. Rifles and ammunition found in the house where they were arrested were confiscated. The four prisoners will probably be charged with violation of the neutrality laws. Other arrests are expected today.

Preciliano Silva once served three years in prison for a similar offense.

It is asserted that the Magonists have been meeting secretly in El Paso for weeks and that many of the most prominent men in the faction are here. The Maderistas allege that a plot against law and order in Juarez had been formed. Over a thousand insurgent soldiers are in Juarez all more or less dissatisfied because they have received only 50 pesos each for their military services. The Maderistas claim that a "fire brand" could start trouble and they think the presence of so many Magonists could mean only one thing.

Significance is attached to the arrival last night of Juan Sarabia, released from the military prison, San Juan de Ula, through the intervention of Madero. He was arrested five years ago in Juarez on the charge of conspiracy. He is a member of the Magon faction and was at one time editor of La Regeneracion. He has been confined in a dungeon and is nearly blind but mentally is unimpaired. Jesus Flores Magon, Ricardo's brother, accompanied him here.

Denies Plot.

Los Angeles, June 8.—Ricardo Flores Magon, head of the Mexican Liberal party, here, emphatically denies that there has been any plot or conspiracy against Francisco I. Madero Jr., and disclaims knowledge of stores of ammunition alleged to have been seized in the house occupied by Preciliano Silva in El Paso.

The arrest of four men in El Paso was probably brought about by Madero himself, says Magon, because Silva on several occasions refused to recognize Madero as provisional president.

TIMBER-PORTLAND RATE
FIXED AT SEVEN CENTS

Salem, Or., June 8.—Seven cents per 100 pounds was ruled to be just through rate from Timber to Portland by the state railway commission yesterday.

Four cents is to go to the Pacific Railway & Navigation company and 3 cents to the Southern Pacific, making the joint through rate.

June 29 has been fixed as the date for a hearing at the union stockyards in Portland regarding the service given the stockyards by the Oregon-Washington Railway & Navigation company.

Count Has Narrow Escape.

Victoria, B. C., June 8.—News was brought by the steamer Kamakura Maru that Count Okuma, the retired politician and head of Waseda college, had a narrow escape from death in a runaway accident at Kyoto. He sustained but slight injuries, the runaway horses having been arrested by some pine branches at the roadside.

GOVERNOR LIKES REFERENDUM IDEA

Solution of Alleged Abuses Is to File Petitions With County Clerks.

Salem, Or., June 8.—Suggestions have been coming to Governor West along the line of getting a law passed to correct alleged abuses of referendum privileges.

One of these, which the governor says seems to him to offer a solution, is a plan to require referendum petitions to be filed with county clerks over the state, permitting voters who wish to sign them to do so by going to the clerk's office. After the date of signing has passed the clerk will be able to certify to the petitions. Only registered voters are to be allowed to sign these petitions under the proposed law.

This plan will probably soon be framed into an initiative measure to be submitted to the people.

WILL TURN \$5500 OVER TO STATE TREASURER

The First National bank will turn over to the state treasurer approximately \$5500 in obedience to a judgment taken this morning in the circuit court by the district attorney. The case was brought by the state to recover all deposits in this bank to which there had been no additions or withdrawals within seven years.

The question of the law was threshed out on a demurrer, in which Presiding Judge Gantenbein of the circuit court, held that the law applied to national banks, and this case in particular. The judgment was taken this morning without contest. The bank contested the original complaint on the ground that the law does not apply to national banks. The deposition in question are those in which the depositors fail to keep up, and are in small amounts.

ROCKEFELLER AND TAFT
CHECKS NOT NEGOTIABLE

Berkeley, Cal., June 8.—Victims of the invasion of Berkeley by the families of Rockefeller and Taft were rudely shattered today when Edward Lynn, real estate agent, found that two checks, one for \$250 signed by "Mrs. John D. Rockefeller" and the other for \$200 signed "Mrs. William Howard Taft," were not negotiable. The first check was given Lynn by a woman as a deposit on 200 acres of land in North Berkeley. When the same woman appeared later with a check purporting to be signed by the wife of the president, Lynn started an investigation.

SEYMOUR BEARDS BOARD
THAT SUSPENDED HIM

San Francisco, June 8.—Chief Seymour, instead of the "acting" chief, White, will attend the meeting of the police commissioners today when routine matters come up for settlement. At the last meeting of the board Seymour was suspended, but the order of suspension was blocked on an injunction. Seymour said he anticipated "no further blow up today." The whole dispute will be threshed out in superior court tomorrow, when final hearing on the injunction matter comes before Judge Seawell.

CHINESE EXPEL HEBREWS
FROM NORTHERN MARKETS

Victoria, B. C., June 8.—The Tokio Asahi publishes telegrams from Harbin that the Chinese chamber of commerce there has decided on the expulsion of Jews from the markets of north Manchuria, according to news brought by the Kamakura Maru. The Jewish merchants are now engaged in petitioning the chamber to revoke its decision. It is stated that the decision is the result of investigation on the part of certain Russian merchants.

Drop Off at Buffalo.

The election of officers will be held tomorrow and on Saturday the new officers will be formally installed.
