CITY LOSING THOUSANDS OF DOLLARS IN STREET WORK: GENERAL TAXATION OFFERED; REMONSTRANCE METHOD

Correct Evil. Says Councilman Burgard.

Believing the city is losing thousands all the work connected with street improvement in one contract, Councilman John H. Burgard is investigating the feasibility of doing such work in two separate contracts, one for excavation and grading, the other for hard surfac- street improvement.

"I have spoken to some of my colleagues about this matter," says Mr. Burgard, "and they have agreed with me that the method should be changed. I intend to look into the matter carefully, but I do not believe that a charter amendment is necessary .All that is necessary, as I understand it, is to instruct the engineer to draw plans and specifications for the work in two con-

"As the work is now done, the paying contractor names virtually his own price for excavation. Experience has shown that in independent contracts for grading the city pays from 25c to 35c er cubic yard. But in contracts for hard surface streets we find the cost of excavation rises as high as 60 cents per cubic yard, and even higher.

"Thinking this thing over, I have come to the conclusion that street improvement contracts should be let in two sections. I do not believe there is any good reason for not doing so. The contractor for excavation and grading can be allowed a certain length of time in which to complete his part of the work. He will get the street ready and the hard surface man will come along where he left off. There will be little additional expense in the engineer's office, and should be no delay. "Property owners should not be required to pay twice as much for excavation in connection with a street improve-

ment contract as they pay on any other

QUITS EDITORIAL DESK TO RUN OWN BUSINESS

After nearly a quarter of a century of newspaper work in Portland, E. W. Wright, one of the best known writers on the Pacific coast, has retired from the Oregonian and tonight will leave for San Francisco for a brief outing before engaging in his new work, that of real estate and investments. Asido from the immense volume of newspaper material which Mr. Wright has written, he compiled a history of Pacific coast shipping, which was published in 1895, and is considered authority on the sub-

ject. Mr. Wright entered newspaper work in Portland in 1888 as a special writer on the Oregonian. He "covered" the session of the legislature in 1892 for that paper. In March, 1896, he became market and marine editor of the paper. which position he held until 1901, when he assumed a place as editorial writer on the Oregonian. It is this position that he leaves to give his time to his private interests. His 16 years' record made him the oldest man in point of continuous service in the editorial department of that paper.

Mr. Wright has been unusually successful in a number of ventures in land investments, and more and more of his time has been demanded in the care of his property. Finally he is compelled to give up the newspaper work and devote himself to his private business.

Parties wishing to purchase must file a bid with the local Indian agent, who will transmit the bid to the department of Indian affairs. If the amount offered is recommended as adequate, the sale will be confirmed by the department. Other lands on the reservation cannot be purchased, unless the Indian holding the allotment can show that he is fully capable of self government. If this is established, he may, with the approval of the Indian department, dispose of
