## CHALLENGE TO GO TO EVERY STATE

State Superintendent Thinks Oregon Has Best High School Percentage.

Salem, Or., June 10.—Challenges to show a higher record of high school attendance than exists in Oregon will be sent to the superintendents of all the states of the United States by L. R. Alderman, superintendent of public instruction. Mr. Alderman believes Oregon is breaking the record. In Lane and Linn counties 80 per cent of the eighth grade graduates are attending high school. In the entire state the number of full four year course high schools has increased from five to 154. The law lending state aid to rural high schools is responsible for the increased number of schools and is swelling the enrollment.

## MRS. HANNAH B. LOWELL DIES AT PENDLETON

Pendleton, Or., June 10.—Mrs. Hannah B. Lowell, mother of Judge Stephen A. Lowell, died at the family home in this city last evening. Mrs. Lowell was almost 87 years old and death followed failure of the vital forces. Her last illness extended only from April 30, but her strength had been failing since an attack of grip last December. The funeral will be held tomorrow afternoon with temporary interment in a local cemetery. The body will later be shipped to West Minor, Maine, to rest beside that of her husband.

## GRIEF FOR SISTER BELIEVED CAUSE OF SUICIDE OF BRIDE

Mrs. Rosa Holt Was Sister of Miss Murphy of Portland, Whose Death in Denver Was Pathetic.

Salem, Or., June 10.—After a brief two months of wedded life, untroubled by any known trouble, Mrs. Rosa Holt, bride of W. A. Holt, shot herself through the head after bolting the doors of her home at Gooch's sawmill in Linn county, 35 miles from here, Thursday night. The young husband went home from behind the planer in the Gooch mill when the day's work was over only to find the doors barred. Breaking in he found his wife dead on the floor in a pool of blood with a revolver, one empty cartridge in the cylinder. Linn county officials were notified immediately. The case was pronounced suicide.

A tragedy occurred in the family a few months ago when Mrs. Holt's sister, Miss Murphy of Portland, died in Denver, where she had gone for her health. The death of Miss Murphy attracted much attention because of a controversy over her jewels, which she had signed over to the landlady in the

lodging house where she stopped. The landlady was accused of unduly influencing the dying girl. Grief over the death of this sister may have proved upon the mind of young Mrs. Holt. The Holt's had been at Gooch's mill since their wedding early in April.

## COUNTY'S PROFIT IN MAY \$4965

This Is Third Highest Sum Reported in History of the County.

The report of County Clerk Fields for his office last month shows the office produced a profit of \$4965 for the county. This is the third highest month in the history of the county. May is not considered a heavy month for receipts, but the high mark last month was reached largely by office system and curtailment of unnecessary expenses.

The receipts of the office were \$3347. The county court department contributed \$1740, the circuit court department furnished \$2436 and the recording of instruments amounted to \$4161. The expenses for the month were \$3381, of which amount \$3121 was for salaries and \$260 for supplies. This shows the county clerk's office made \$4965 profit. The profit for May, 1910, was \$2013. The expense for May, 1909, was \$4011; May, 1910, \$4711, and last month the expense was reduced over the corresponding month the previous year \$1420.

The greatest profit the office ever produced for the county was in April, 1910, when \$6358 was turned over to the county treasurer. The second highest profit for one month was in March, 1911, when \$5014 was placed in the hands of the treasurer.

## TWO POLICE CHIEFS BUT ONLY 1 FORCE

And Worse Than That, San Francisco's Charter Provides for Only 1 Salary.

San Francisco, Cal., June 10.—San Francisco tonight has two chiefs of police, with only one force and one salary. Besides that, there are several injunctions and a threatened contest over the police commissioner'ship.

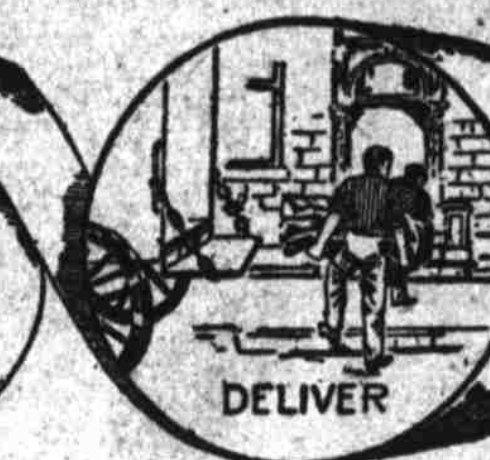
Chief Seymour is busily issuing orders to the district captains to pay no attention to any orders issued by Chief Augustus White. Seymour holds his office by virtue of two injunctions, one of which prevents the police board from trying him on charges of incompetency and neglect of duty, the other of which prevents White, who was named when the first order of suspension was issued, from interfering with him.

White holds office by virtue of an injunction specifically permitting him to call himself "chief," and to perform the duties of chief, "so far as they do not interfere with Seymour."

Just now the captains are up in the air, wondering who they had best obey, while the lieutenants are laughing because they can put it up to the captains. It is generally conceded that the real struggle will come when both chiefs claim the one salary.

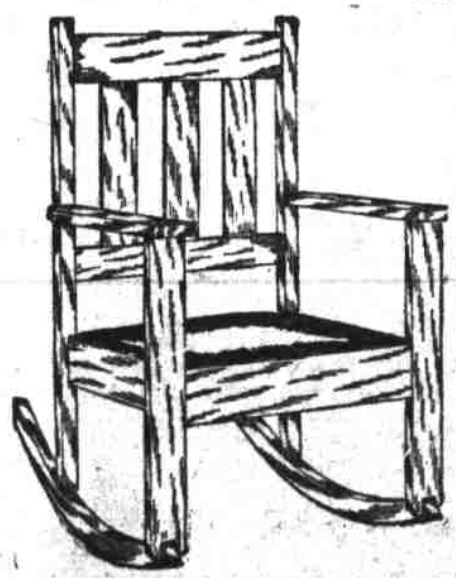
