

1000 KILLED WHEN REBELS TOOK CITY

Women and Children Struck
Down by Stray Bullets
at Fall of Culiacan.

(United Press Leased Wire.)
San Diego, Cal., June 12.—Details of the fall of Culiacan and Mazatlan in the state of Sinaloa are being told here today by Captain Francisco Miranda and passengers who have just arrived on the steamer Bonito Juarez.
No less than 1000 persons, according to Miranda, lost their lives in the fall of Culiacan, which was accomplished by the rebels May 11. Many of these, Miranda says, were women and children who were without protection and were struck down by stray bullets.
The attack upon Culiacan began at 5 p. m. on May 31 by General Banderas' force of insurgents. With the arrival of the rebel reinforcement General Banderas ordered General Iribide to advance on the town from the east while he divided his force and commenced attacks from both north and south. The rebels swept everything before them. With their entry into Culiacan, the insurgents began to apply the torch and blow up with dynamite less inflammable buildings.
After two days of fighting General Banderas attempted to retreat toward Altamira with 3000 men. They were intercepted, and many slain. The second day of fighting at Culiacan centered about the church of the Sacred Heart, where almost the entire population had taken refuge. Before the rebels were finally routed from the church 500 persons had been killed.
Mazatlan capitulated to the rebels June 2. General Justo Tirado captured the town without a shot being fired. Before they deserted their posts, however, 1000 criminal prisoners were executed by federal authorities.
When the Bonito Juarez left Mazatlan June 4, both places were quiet.

Madero to "Stump."

Mexico City, June 12.—Francisco I. Madero, successful revolutionary leader, today left Mexico City for a speech making tour through the states of Morelos and Guerrero. He departed on a special train at 8 a. m. He reviewed the troops of General Figueroa at Cuernavaca. Tomorrow he will abandon his train and travel for three days by automobile, taking only a small body guard with him.

large salary and promised to get her a pass over the Southern Pacific.
Clark dressed in plain working clothes and always explained that he was working and had not time to change. He never dressed well.
Last Tuesday morning at 1:15 o'clock Clark telephoned to a clerk at the Alhambra yards and gave him a message to transcribe, which was to be given to J. P. Graham, assistant general manager of the O.-W. R. & N. Co.
"Please Send Passes."
The clerk took the message, which read:
"Confirming conversation with Mr. Graham. Please send me three passes to Chicago and return for myself, wife and child."
When Mr. Graham received the message he immediately called up A. William Hinger, Portland representative of the Baldwin Locomotive Works, who informed him that no such man was employed by the locomotive concern. Mr. Graham also wired Philadelphia and received the same reply.
Wednesday Clark called up the shops at Alhambra and informed General Manager Stout that his private car No. 99 would be in the yards shortly and that he would like to have the air brakes inspected. But the car never came.
Seventy-five new engines have just been received at Portland from the Baldwin company, and Clark, it is said, told various people that he came here for the purpose of inspecting these engines.

Turns Up Missing.
He also said that he rode on one of these engines from Philadelphia. This statement is said to be a ludicrous one, since it requires a month to dead-head a locomotive through from Philadelphia, and the company would not send a valuable man on such a trip.
The woman, who says her name is not Wilson, but that she does not desire publicity, so chose a fictitious name, has gone out of the city. She said that Clark did not ask her for money and that a few days ago she told him he was a faker. This is said to have alarmed him, and it is believed that he has fled. His motive for carrying on the deception is not known, unless it was for the purpose of securing passes to Chicago.
Clark, it is said, has knowledge of engines and mechanics, and it is thought that he may have been either an engineer or a fireman. He is said to be about 45 years of age and talks rather intelligently. He was not registered at any of the prominent hotels. It is learned. Nothing has been heard from him for the past three days.

Saturday evening, another effort was made to have the man talk or make signs. All methods known in such cases were used, but there was no response or sign of emotion.

Acts Natural.
The man eats, sleeps and acts natural otherwise. His clothing was removed Saturday evening while investigating the man, and he carefully dressed himself when told to do so. The sleeves of his shirt were turned out in removing it, and he carefully turned them back to their proper position when he put it on. He walks to the water faucet, draws a cup of water when thirsty, and will go into his cell when told to do so.
One physician is of the opinion that the man is in a trance or some peculiar cataleptic condition. Another advances the theory that he has been hypnotized by some person, who left him without removing the spell of hypnotism. Still another theory is advanced that he is self-hypnotized. The man shows signs of having lived in the timber, and in view of this, it is further suggested that he may have been hypnotized by a snake.

Can Talk But Won't.
While there are many theories over the man's silence, it is generally agreed that he has the ability to talk, but will not. It is also generally accepted that his mind is centered upon one subject and even physical torture cannot draw it away. When he was found, there was \$5 cents in his pockets, and a page torn from a magazine. This contained a short story. He also had a pair of lightweight shoes tucked inside the waist on his trousers. These shoes are too small for him, and the report that Mrs. Hill wore a pair of men's shoes around the little home caused the officials to think the man was the one who committed the murder. The man is about 40 years old, medium size, inclined to be fair or sandy, has a short, stubby growth of hair, and has been smooth shaven.

SEEKS TO PROTECT MONEY ON DEPOSIT

Judge Bean Overrules Demurrer in the Cornucopia Mines Case.

To protect the interest of the Cornucopia Mines company of Baker county in money on deposit in a Baker bank and prevent its being taken under a judgment by Valentine Laubenheimer.

Judge Bean in the United States district court today overruled a demurrer to a supplementary bill filed by the company. Early in 1908 Laubenheimer leased the Cornucopia mines, under the terms of which he was to operate them, pay all expenses, market the product and take 10 per cent of the net proceeds. Late that year financial difficulties came and Laubenheimer attached money in the bank at Baker. He won a suit against the bank, obtaining judgment for \$13,500, which he claimed was due him.
The company's supplementary bill alleged that Laubenheimer is financially irresponsible and asks to have the judgment he obtained arrested and held in abeyance until a full settlement is made of its account with him. The effect of the court's decision is to allow a restraining order to issue, preventing the payment of the Laubenheimer judgment, until a settlement is made of the account the lessee of the mines and the lessor.

200 SEARCHING FOR MISSING AUBURN MAN

Auburn, Cal., June 12.—Summoned by the fireball at dawn a searching party that for two days has been scouring the hills and the shore of the north fork of the American river for trace of Harold T. Power, 38, former assemblyman, member of the conservation board of control, today resumed their quest.
Two hundred men and boys set out for the search. Not a square yard of country in the vicinity where Power was last seen will be overlooked. One half of the party started up the north fork of the American. The other half will follow down the river for miles.

Purse Offered for Plane.

Paris, June 12.—A purse of \$50,000 for an aeroplane capable of carrying in addition to its equipment 2000 pounds of war munitions for 300 miles without stopping, has been offered by financial agents of France in the French colony of Algeria. The prize, it is announced today, is offered in memory of Maurice Bertheaux, war minister of France, who was killed recently at Issy in an aeroplane accident.

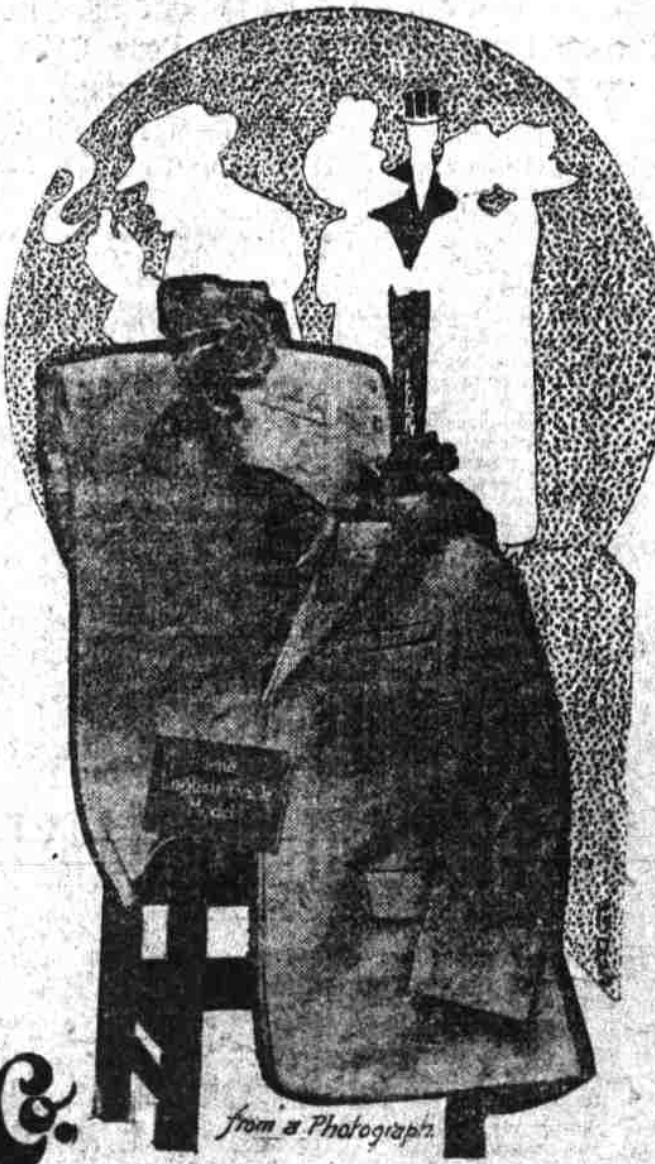
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
