CHURCH FACTIONS UNITE ON LATHROP

Hood River Agitation to Get Dr. E. L. House as Pastor Dropped.

Hood River, Or., June 13.—The Methodist church folk of Hood River are now smoking the pipe of peace. Several weeks ago one faction of the church was making a strenuous effort to secure the appointment of Rev. Dr. E. L. House of Spokane, while the other faction desired to retain the present pastor. Petitions and remonstrances were accordingly drafted, signed and forwarded to Dr. Skipwith, superintendent of The Dalles district.

At a recent meeting of the quarterly conference of the local church, however, it was decided to extend a call to Rev. Dr. A. H. Lathrop of Croton, Iowa, to accept the pulpit of the Hood River church. Dr. Lathrop was at one time pastor of the Hood River church, and is regarded as one of the leading divines in the denomination. It is generally believed by the members that he will accept the call and be appointed at the annual conference that meets in September.

A new stone church is being planned by the denomination.

SITTING HEN HAS HER OWN WAY, PREFERING PIGEON TO DUCK EGGS

About two months ago Mr. Witte placed a dozen wild duck eggs under a perfectly motherly hen, but the eggs failed to hatch. ANTI-TREAT LAW IS UNDER ARGUMENT

Whoever Side Wins Tacoma Issue in Superior Court Will Appeal.

(United Press Local Wire.)
Tacoma, Wash., June 13.—The validity of the anti-treat ordinance which prohibits treating in saloons, is being argued today before Superior Judge Chapman. The case is that of George W. Keisel, a saloonkeeper, convicted in Police Judge Arntson's court of violating the ordinance and fined \$50, and who, appealed, along with several others similarly convicted, to the superior court. Whichever way judgment falls, whether on the city or on the defendants, an appeal will be taken to the state supreme court, according to attorneys interested.

John Berkhart, proprietor of one of the leading hotels, testified that his bar business had been cut down nearly 80 per cent by the enforcement of the anti-treat ordinance. Like evidence was given by other liquor dealers. One saloon man declared that under present stringent regulatory laws it would soon be impossible for saloons to exist in Tacoma.

The anti-treat ordinance was passed by the council on December 3, and was ratified by referendum vote of the people on March 21 last.

PIONEER WEATHER MAN COMING TO PORTLAND

O. C. Youcum, for 15 years, keeper of the weather records at Government Camp, on the summit of the Cascade mountains, has resigned his position and sold his land to take up his residence in Portland. Mr. Youcum came to Oregon in 1847.

After going to Government Camp 20 years ago, Mr. Youcum became connected with the weather bureau and his are among the most valuable records of the bureau because of the high altitude, the station being situated in the pass at the summit on the old Barlow trail.
