

MEMBERS OF OLD PORT BODY GIVEN COURT'S DECISION

People Will Have to Amend Act of 1906 Before New Port Measure of 1909 Is Practicable.

(Special Dispatch to The Journal.)
Salem, Or., June 13.—The case of the State ex rel vs. Swigert et al was decided by the supreme court today in an opinion by Chief Justice Eakin in a case brought to the supreme court by the old commissioners of the port of Portland.

The last legislative assembly passed an act providing for the appointment of a commission for the government of the port having a population of more than 100,000, as shown by the last federal census, and further provides that it shall be governed by a board of seven commissioners, to be appointed by the governor. The old commissioners of the port of Portland, holding that this act was invalid, refused to surrender their office, and the action was brought to assert their rights.

The court finds that under an amendment to the constitution passed by the people on the fourth day of June, 1906, corporations may be formed under general laws but shall not be created by the legislative assembly by special laws. The legislative assembly shall not enact, amend or repeal any charter or act of incorporation for any municipality, city or town. The act of the last legislature is special, the court says, and the attempt to amend it by legislative assembly is invalid and beyond its power, so that such act can be amended only by the people themselves.

In the case of Anderson vs. the Miami Lumber company, Tillamook county, judgment was affirmed.

Other decisions were:
Templeton vs. Williams, Clackamas county, decree affirmed.
Andrews vs. Darby from Umatilla county, decision reversed and action dismissed.
Piller vs. Laurelhurst company, dismissed.
In Zierney vs. Zierney, motion to recall action dismissed.

They said Sherman had no right to vote upon such a resolution.

Senator Gallinger (Republican, New Hampshire) defended Sherman's action.

Congressman Underwood (Democrat, Alabama), majority leader in the house, said today that he doubted whether the house Democrats would support the Bristow amendment.

CITY IS READY TO RUN SEATTLE & RENTON LINE

Seattle, Wash., June 13.—City Engineer R. H. Thompson has completed physical valuation of the property of the Seattle, Renton & Southern road, which the city intends to purchase and run as a municipal streetcar line. This action is in accordance with a bond issue of \$800,000, authorized at the last city election. The city will tender the amount Thompson names, although this has not yet been made public. If the owners of the road refuse to accept within 60 days, the city may start condemnation proceedings. The city engineer went thoroughly over the line, but in his estimate made no appraisal of the franchise.

The voters approved the municipal ownership plan following many months of trouble with the owners of the line over poor service.

BULLETS WERE NOT INTENDED TO KILL

No action will be taken against the old German who yesterday terrorized the neighborhood of Sellwood by firing a rifle several times to frighten some boys who were molesting him. He shot a high bank, it is stated, and the bullets were in no way dangerous to life or limb. The boys in that vicinity were warned against irritating the old hermit.

ASSERT THAT COUNTY SHOULD PAY THE BILL

A bill of \$45 for the services of a court reporter retained by Chief of Police Cox in the recent trial of that official in the circuit court came before the judiciary committee of the council yesterday. The members of the committee were of the opinion that, as Chief Cox was acquitted, the county should bear the expense, the prosecution of the case having been under the direction of the district attorney. The bill was referred to City Attorney Frank S. Grant.

MAYOR-ELECT WILL SEEK REAL QUIET

Serious Illness of A. G. Rushlight Does Not Respond to Treatment.

Portland, Or., June 13.—Mayor-elect A. G. Rushlight is seriously ill. Following the recent strenuous municipal campaign in which Mr. Rushlight worked day and night for nearly two months, his nervous system was in shreds. To make matters more critical, Mr. Rushlight suffered a severe attack of stomachic poisoning from ice cream which he ate Wednesday afternoon.

Since then he has not been able to take nourishment, nor to leave his bed. After a consultation held yesterday between his physicians, Dr. M. G. McCorkle and Dr. A. W. Moore, it was decided that the patient should be removed to a health resort not too far from the city, if he can possibly undertake the trip.

Accompanied by Dr. McCorkle, the mayor-elect will leave the city tonight if he is able to do so. The destination of the party will be kept secret, as it is the wish of Mr. Rushlight's physicians that he have absolute rest.

ADVENTISTS RAISE LAURELWOOD DEBT

Six Hundred Are Camped at Forest Grove; 128 Tents Are Pitched.

Forest Grove, Or., June 13.—The debt on Laurelwood academy, a denominational institution conducted by the Seventh Day Adventists, was totally wiped out at the session of the western Oregon conference of Seventh Day Adventists, held in the big tent on the campground here yesterday morning. In 15 minutes \$1111.50 was paid or pledged. The debt was \$841.64. The amount contributed yesterday will probably be increased, as an effort is being made to raise \$1500, of which \$550 will be used for much needed equipment.

This report of the denominational school work for the year, submitted by R. W. Airey, showed that church schools have been maintained at Falls City, Hopewell, Laurelwood, Monitor, Montaville, East Portland, Salem and West Salem, with a total of \$40. This is in addition to Laurelwood academy, which had an attendance of 85. Mr. Airey urged that more schools be established. Laurelwood academy's resources are now \$732.37, and the net gain for the year \$112.

The 600 persons who are camped on the ground this year are much pleased with the location. The camp is in a fir grove, six blocks from the business section of Forest Grove. So far 128 tents have been pitched, in addition to the large tent in which the general meetings are held, and the four meeting tents in which are held the young people's, children's, German and Scandinavian meetings. In the dining tent a vegetarian cafeteria is maintained. The campgrounds are also provided with a bookstore and grocery store.

The large tent will seat 1000 persons. Many not camped on the grounds come down from Portland to stay for a few days, and crowds from Forest Grove add to the congregations.

WOMAN ASSAULTED; GUY DENIES HE IS GUILTY

Chicago, Ill., June 13.—It was learned last night that Mrs. Mattie B. Minard, wife of Professor Minard, of the Marquette school, died from drinking carbolic acid. She was found lying before last sitting at an open window looking with unseeing eyes for her husband who had been missing for several hours.

Minard left his home early in the day, and was detained down town and tried to reach his wife by telephone, but could not. When he arrived at home about midnight he was told his wife was dead.

A. D. CHARLTON'S AUTO STOLEN FROM GARAGE

Unknown parties last night stole A. D. Charlton's White gas car from the garage at his residence, 400 Vista avenue. The matter was reported to the police this morning and they are making an effort to locate the missing car. There are no clues.

The case came up for trial this morning and after hearing, Judge Tazewell took the matter under advisement. Britton asserts it is a case of mistaken identity.

P. H. Edelfen, manager of the St. Johns waterworks, who was seriously injured when his buggy was struck by a Woodlawn car Saturday night, is resting at St. Vincent's hospital in practically the same condition today as he has been since the accident, but there is hope for his recovery.

THIRD PUBLICATION \$90,000 ISSUE IS NECESSARY; DOWNTOWN PAVING ORDERED.

Hood River, Or., June 13.—Ulen & Co. of Chicago, reported to the city council last night that it would not accept the issue of city bonds until after the city charter had been amended. However, they failed to state in what particular the city charter was at fault. An ordinance was passed to readvertise the sale of the bonds. This is the third time that the city has gone to the expense of advertising the sale of these \$90,000 worth of water bonds.

An ordinance was passed ordering the pavement of the entire downtown business section. The pavement will be concrete.

An offer to purchase for the city a small strip of waterfront land at the high water landing directly north of the city was turned down by the owners.

CONGRESS OF CONGREGATIONAL CHURCHES IN SESSION AT SUNNYSIDE FOR DAY.

The sessions today of the Pacific Congress of Congregational Churches are being held in the Sunnyside Congregational church, but tonight the convention will return to the First Congregational church, where the sessions will be continued until Thursday evening.

Day of Los Angeles on the "Suburban Districts and Their Relations to the Central Church."

POSTAL TELEPHONE FORCES TO FIGHT BELL TELEPHONE

Northwestern Long Distance Company Leases Postal Wire From Seattle to Spokane.

Officials of the Postal Telegraph company and the Northwestern Long Distance Telephone company announced today that arrangements had been completed whereby the Northwestern Long Distance Telephone company, an independent concern, will lease the Postal's new telephone line from Seattle to Spokane. The Northwestern company has a line of its own in operation between Portland and Tacoma and Seattle so that the independent service between Portland and Tacoma via Tacoma and Seattle.

The Spokane-Seattle line of the Postal Telegraph company was built a year ago and the wires were transferred so that they could be used either for telegraph or telephone service. A similar circuit was built by the Postal between San Francisco and Salt Lake.

It is believed to be the intention of the Postal company to ally itself with the independent telephone companies in the tremendous struggle with the Western Union and the Bell telephone companies throughout the west. District Superintendent John A. Forehand of the Postal company is in Portland today and confirmed the lease of the Seattle-Spokane wire to the independent telephone company.

Rev. Mr. Burbank is charged with entering the home of the little girl in Coburg February 1, 1911, while the father was away at work. Her mother is dead. She told her story to the jury last night.

Burbank stoutly denies the charges. He is aged about 80 years.

AVIATOR FREY FALLS; IS SERIOUSLY INJURED

DELMAS DEFENDS WIFE OF BAKING POWDER KING

Los Angeles, June 13.—Delphin Delmas, who officiated as chief counsel for Harry K. Thaw at his first trial, for the murder of Stanford White appeared in the superior court here today in defense of Mrs. Robert Davis, who is being sued for divorce by her aged husband. Davis is a multi-millionaire and is the active head of the so-called baking powder trust.

Davis alleges in his complaint that his wife confined him to their Summit, N. J. home for weeks, claiming he was insane, in an effort to gain control of his property.

SEARCH SHOWS NO TANGIBLE RESULTS

Efforts to Capture Hill Murderer Involve Numerous Suspects.

Reports regarding suspicious characters who might have been implicated in the murder of the Hill family continue to pour into police headquarters. Patrolman Ben Peterson reported that a suspicious character had been seen near Graham on the O. W. & N. company's line, near Tracy Bros. shops, Sixteenth and East Glisan streets, where he is said to have insulted women and girls.

Alfred J. Dwyer, dairyman at Ardenwald, reports that his hired man heard two men in the brush talking regarding the murder but when search was made for them they could not be found.

Jailer Oelsner this morning arrested a man giving his name as O. P. Anderson, at Front and Couch streets. This man was covered with dry blood but he explained that by saying he had been in a fight. He was not held for further investigation.

SUICIDE INSANE, SAYS BROTHER

Will of Man Who Drowned Self Being Contested—Friend Was Beneficiary.

The will of Fred Ladak, railroad contractor, who is supposed to have committed suicide in Duncan lake, near Butler, Wash., early last year, is being contested today in the county court on the ground that the deceased was mentally incompetent to make the instrument. The greater part of his property was willed to George Cook of Butler, whom he was visiting at the time of his death.

Ladak made his headquarters at the Hoyt hotel in Portland. His mother and sister lived in Poland, Russia, and a brother in Detroit, Mich. Cook was an old friend of Ladak, and they visited each other frequently. It was generally understood that Ladak was in love with Emma Cook, daughter of George Cook, and many of his visits to Butler were to see her.

In April, 1910, Ladak went to Butler. He spent the evening with the Cook family. During the night, he left the house at which he was staying, walked a mile to Duncan lake, and walked into the water. From all appearances, the man waded into water that reached his chin, and then sat down. When his body was found, he was in a sitting posture. He had written two letters, one to Emma Cook and the other to her father. He left a will in which his property was given to Cook. Jewelry consisting of several valuable pins and a ring was left to the girl.

The brother from Detroit began an investigation soon after the death of Ladak, and came to the conclusion that he was insane at the time of the suicide and was incompetent to make a will. The value of the property left Cook is about \$10,000.

EUGENE HOLDS BIG R. R. CELEBRATION

Eugene, Or., June 13.—Public demonstration on Eugene streets was the celebration of the beginning of actual construction on the Eugene-Siuslaw electric railway yesterday afternoon. The Lane County Asset company, which is promoting the enterprise and which has the sole franchise, had invited all automobile owners to take part in the street parade preceding the speech-making, but not half the number was expected. The parade was nearly a mile in length and consisted of 50 or 60 automobiles, besides numerous horse drawn vehicles. All business houses closed for two hours. Mayor Berger and members of the city council followed in the parade, which was accompanied by a band, which discoursed stirring music to West Fifth and Blair streets, where the exercises were held and where work has been begun.

Mr. Shelley Senator W. W. Calkins, Honorable S. H. Friendly, ex-Mayor J. D. Matlock, Attorney A. F. Campbell and M. J. Duryea, president of the Commercial club, all spoke enthusiastically. It is estimated that 2000 people gathered in the busy street where the exercises were held and where Contractor Perry first began his work inside the city limits, although he has been grading further out for a week.

The Asset company was organized two years ago last October for the purpose of promoting a railway from Eugene to the coast, and finally, after many discouragements and delays, has reached a point where it is justified in going ahead with the work. The stock holders of the company consist largely of business men of Eugene, although a number of sawmill owners and farmers along the route proposed have taken stock.

The ultimate destination of the road is Coos Bay. The company has made a preliminary survey to that point, by way of the mouth of the Siuslaw river, and has completed a permanent survey from Eugene as far as Chinahollow, a tributary of the Siuslaw river, 3 miles distant. A large part of the right of way from this city to the coast has been secured and the company has 1800 feet of waterfront at the mouth of the Siuslaw river and several valuable lots in Eugene, besides franchise on a number of streets of the city.

The officers of the company are: M. Svarverud, president; Alton Hampton, vice president; John Baird, secretary and treasurer; A. F. Campbell, counsel, and H. D. Fornell, chief engineer.

AMERICANS LIBERATED

Washington, June 13.—Fourteen Americans who served in the insurrectionary army were liberated from prison in Chihuahua, according to official advices received from the consul there today. They were captured in the battle of Casas Grandes.

SOLDIERS TAKE UP COMRADE'S CAUSE

Sergeant Rowan Causes Arrest of Constable Who Shot Private Jones.

Astoria, Or., June 13.—A charge of assault with a dangerous weapon was filed yesterday afternoon with Deputy District Attorney H. M. Brownell against Constable John Mayer for the shooting of Private Roy Jones on Saturday night. Sayer, who was allowed to go upon his own recognizance, will be arraigned before County Judge Judd, as Justice of the Peace Goodman, of whose court Sayer is an officer, has deemed it advisable to have the case tried by some one other than himself.

The complaint is sworn to by Sergeant John V. Rowan, 93d company of coast artillery, of Fort Stevens. The 93d is Jones' company also.

The wounded man is still at the hospital in this city, but it is expected he will be taken to the fort today. His wound is not serious and barring complications he will be out in a few days.

LAND IS SOUGHT FOR GAME REFUGE

Asylum Farm and Other State Lands Inspected by Warden Finley.

(Salem Bureau of The Journal.)
Salem, Or., June 13.—For the purpose of looking over with Governor West the state lands surrounding public institutions with a view of establishing a state game reserve of 3000 acres, State Game Warden W. J. Finley and Chief Deputy T. J. Craig arrived in Salem today.

The new law provides two means for establishing game bird refuges. The governor may issue orders affecting lands under jurisdiction of the state, or the state game warden may enter into contracts with private land owners to have their farms or holdings controlled by the game warden for a term of years. The state has 1340 acres in one tract here in the asylum farm and this added to other state tracts surrounding the penitentiary, asylum, training school, etc., will make a big reserve. Private lands may also be included in the reserve.

These bird and game refuges will be protected by penalty against hunting of a fine of from \$50 to \$300. Where private lands are included the contract will in no way interfere with tilting of the soil.

The state tuberculosis commission also is making a tour of the state institutions with the governor and game warden.

HERMISTON POWER PLANT WORKS

Hermiston, Or., June 13.—After nearly a week's tieup, the Hermiston Light & Power company has its plant in operation. It closed to put in the permanent concrete dam. At present it has only the wood form in, but this divers enough water to run the plant with a full head. Other work will be pushed now in the way of extending power lines.
