

TWO NEW PLANTS TO PUMP WATER TO BE OPERATED

Efforts Will Be Made to Relieve Water Shortage—Patrons Asked to Help by Stopping Waste.

The city water board yesterday afternoon directed that the pumping plants at Woodmere and Albina be put in operation in order to relieve to some extent the present water shortage and to prevent the depletion of the big storage reservoirs that in ordinary weather hold 66,000,000 gallons.

But all of these expedients will prove of no avail if residents of the city do not heed the warning of Superintendent Dodge of the water department not to waste water.

Engineer D. D. Clarke reported to the board that the new pipe line from Bull Run would probably not be completed before August 1.

Entire Board May Resign. The board yesterday received the resignation of Superintendent Dodge. It was laid on the table till June 30, the date of the last meeting of the present board.

Bids for Hydrants Opened. The board directed the superintendent to advertise for bids for the construction of a \$25,000 branch water office to be located on Russell street between Williams and Rodney avenues.

Bids for 200 fire hydrants were opened by the board. Competition was keen, bidders from all parts of the United States being represented.

HIMES ADVOCATES WEST SIDE SITE

Old Market Block Best Place for Public Auditorium, He Declares.

George H. Himes, assistant secretary and curator of the Oregon Historical society, believes that the old market block should be chosen for the site for the public auditorium.

"The selection of a site for the public auditorium is a matter of great importance to this city at the present time," said Mr. Himes.

"From my point of view block 132, the old market block, should be chosen. If that is not large enough, then half of the next block south, should be secured, and that part of Market street, between Second and Third streets, condemned."

"The location is a slightly one for such a structure, and lends itself readily to the plan for the civic center that is now under consideration, and which is so much needed, by reason of its proximity to other public buildings."

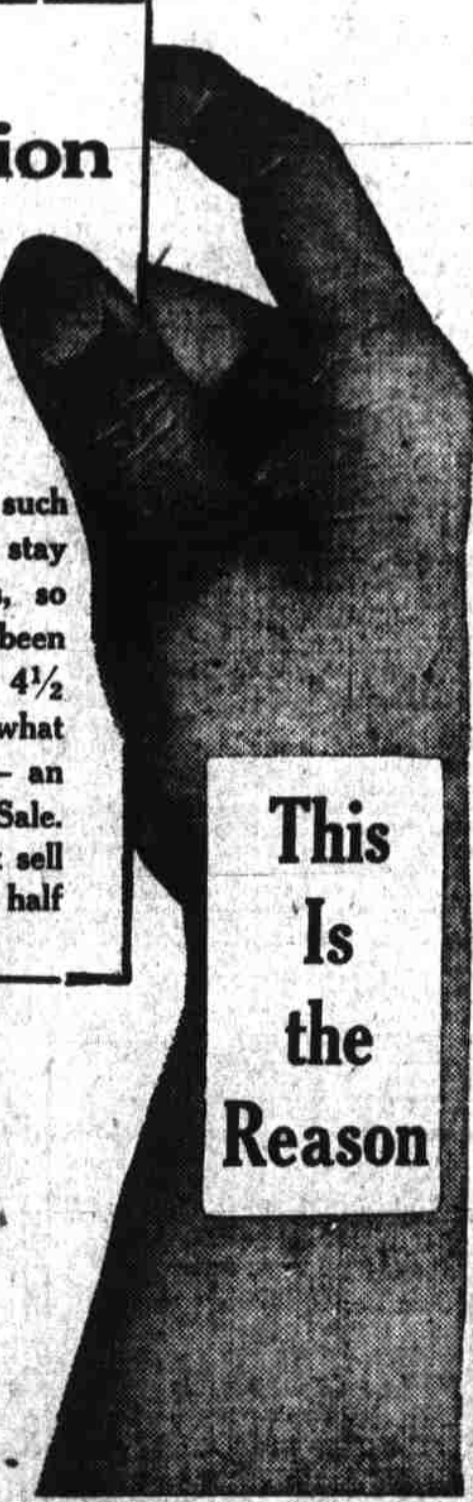
