

"GOD REMEDY FOR EVILS OF TODAY," DECLARES BISHOP

"This is Thoughtless Age, in Which Idols of People Are Convenience," Says Bishop Scadding in Address.

Bishop Charles Scadding, in his address last evening opening the twenty-third annual diocesan convention of the Episcopal church at St. David's church, reviewed the field and opportunities for work and gave some stirring words to the clergy, appealing to them to be more united and calling for efficiency. As a pleasant surprise the bishop announced that through the generosity of Miss C. H. Percival, former parishioner of Rev. C. W. Robinson, in Philadelphia, a library building will be added to the property of the diocese. The corner stone for this building will be laid Saturday afternoon at 4 o'clock at Nineteenth and Spring streets on ground adjoining the site for the bishop's residence now being built at Nineteenth and Spring streets. Miss Percival is giving it in memory of her father, Rev. Henry R. Percival of Philadelphia.

The reports of our church school for girls are most satisfactory," said the bishop. "We have had all the boarding pupils we could accommodate, and an efficient staff of teachers. The one organized rescue work the church is doing in Portland is being carried on at St. Elizabeth's House by the sisters. There are now 11 girls in residence, and our capacity is only 15.

Bishop Scott Academy. "Much interest is felt in the possible reopening of the Bishop Scott school for boys. The board of school trustees is considering the subject carefully, and if the old Bishop Scott school ground can be leased for a term of years, there will then be income enough to warrant reopening. We have 100 acres of slightly property in Yamhill county, and the leading educators of the day tell us that such a school for boys as the trustees have in mind should be in the country."

As to church extension, the bishop said in part: "We have now on our staff 23 priests, and we have 45 parishes. This is a situation that we are still undermanned, and need at once three more clergy. With regard to our policy I am of the same opinion expressed last year. Let us strengthen our stakes before we lengthen our cords. It is better to have a few missions strong and permanent than many weak.

Idols Are Convenience. In dwelling upon some evils of the day and the way to meet them, the bishop said: "Human society clearly evidences an alienation from God which is merely indifferent and uninterested. Consider the type of people who are giving the tone to modern virtues. They neither defy God nor believe in Him. They do not hate the Christian religion. It simply does not interest them."

"The rush of life is the worst evil of the present day. Our idols are convenience and speed, and amusement, our ideals are in danger of becoming commercialized. The vastness of our undeveloped resources, the climate, the fertile soil, the timber, fruit, fishing industries—all are proclaimed to the world with clamorous sound. Let us hold to a proper conservation, which after all is what really impresses thoughtful persons."

Thoughtless Age. "Let us aim to be a God fearing people, a state where Christian home life is emphasized, where each citizen considers the rights of others, and where earnest efforts are made to save the community from feverishness, and reckless selfishness."

"This is not a wicked age; it is a careless and a thoughtless age; careless of principle, unconcerned with great issues, and besotted with delight at its own petty inventiveness. Human society is engaged in a fatal game. But we

can still alter its course if we set to work steadily to change a life of artificial pleasure, unhealthy excitement, vain pursuits, ignored responsibilities into a life of healthy purposes, keen physical and intellectual enjoyment, and responsible undertakings with a sense of duty.

"But how is all this to be done, how are the evils to be met, and what is the remedy? Decidedly not money. Not philosophy and ethics. Not libraries, schools, public baths or soup kitchens, but in God.

"If we are to bring religion to this motor car world, to this nonreligious age, to the rich, to the laboring classes as well as to the poor, we must see that it is arresting. The services must not be dull, and our message must ring with the assurance that the pursuit of God is the divine adventure."

(United Press Leased Wire.) Prince Rupert, B. C., June 15.—At noon yesterday the Grand Trunk Pacific railway inaugurated its regular train service over the first 100 miles of its railway to Copper River.

The train is to be run every Wednesday and Saturday after the arrival of the steamer from the south and connect with river steamers at Mile 100 for Hazelton. The following day the train will come back so as to connect with the steamers going south.
