association on "The Commission Form of Government." Mr. Adams is known universally as deep thinker and his writings and lectures have caused a great deal of comment. He is at present on a lecture tour of the United States and has just

completed a tour of Canada. The west, according to Mr. Adams, is far beyond the east in governmental reform and on account of the virile, wideawake spirit of its people is destined to lead in proving the utility and worth

of scientific government. The wonderful progress of Oregon especially appeals to him, as he advocated many of the reforms of the Oregon system 20 years ago and recalls the ridicule heaped upon him when he tried to show their efficiency.

Mr. Adams' hobby is the return of the old "town meeting" system adapted to the present time. He advocates the formation of bodies in different sections of cities which shall consider problems of city government and make recommendations. These should work in close cooperation, hiring experts to investigate conditions.

His idea of city government is to place it in the hands of a manager or mayor and a council, whose duties shall be similar to those of a board of directors of a corporation. The au-thority should be concentrated in one man, who should be an expert, and the

people should be educated to become experts at choosing the experts who compose the city officials.
